

Weekly Torah Portions for April

Week ending April 7, 2012 Parashat Bo Exodus 12:21-51

This chapter is re-read during Passover as it relates the story of the final plague and the Exodus from Egypt. It includes God's instructions to the Israelite people regarding the laws of the Passover offering and the commandment to "observe this as an institution for all time."

Week ending April 14, 2012 Parashat Shemini Leviticus 9:1-10:20


Shemini refers to the eighth (shemini) day of the ordination ritual. The priestly ordination of Aaron and his sons is described. A fire from God consumes Aaron's sons, Nadab and Abihu, when they offer "alien fire" to God on their own initiative.

Week ending April 21, 2012 Parashat Shemini Leviticus 11:1-11:47

In this segment of Shemini, the dietary laws concerning which animals are fit and which are unfit for consumption are described. The parasha concludes with a rationale for being holy and distinguishing between the impure and the pure.

Week ending April 28, 2012 Parashat Tazria-Metzora Leviticus 12:1-15:33

This double *parasha* is concerned with various types of unclean conditions. Tazria begins with a discussion of defilement and purification following childbirth, and continues with a discussion of tzara-at, which denotes a variety of skin rashes and blemishes. Metzora contains descriptions of other forms of uncleanness, which are thought to refer to various molds or mildews that could discolor surfaces of fabric or stone, and the laws concerning the purification of clothing and houses.



This Passover, take action for the millions of men, women and children who suffer from hunger every night.

Passover is a magical time when we gather with family and friends to retell the story of our people's freedom from bondage. We read from a prayer book, perform rituals that are thousands of years old, and eat. We eat A LOT. Many of us eat far more than we should, but the food is so delicious, it's nearly impossible to resist. Unfortunately, not everyone is lucky enough to have that luxury.

Hunger in America is at an epidemic level, despite how it might seem at first glance. 50 million Americans – including 17 million children – struggle with hunger every day. One out of every six people in this country can't be sure

when or if they'll have their next meal. Hungry people live in every community in the country and come in all colors, shapes and sizes. They wrestle with impossible choices no one should have to make: buy my daughter's asthma medication or feed my family? Whose turn is it to eat: the children or the adults? It breaks our hearts – it should break yours.

There is another way — an end to hunger is within our reach. Early in the seder we say, "All who are hungry, let them enter and eat." More than an invitation to join us at the dinner table, we at MAZON see these words as a rallying cry — a call to do more to help those who so des-

perately need it; to fight for responsible government policies that promote the health and security of everyone in our nation; to provide access to resources that allow people to pick themselves up and build (or rebuild) their lives; to give every man, woman and child a chance not only to live their lives, but to thrive.

Join us in asking a Fifth Question at your Seder: Why on this night are millions of people still going hungry?

Ritual Riches: Reform Jews and Divorce

The answer to a commonly asked question: Yes, there is a Reform document and ceremony for divorce; but no, it is not the traditional Get required in the more orthodox Jewish world. The historical document of divorce mandated in the orthodox Jewish communities are a central element of the legal process of divorce. But due to the extremely misogynistic aspects of traditional divorce, the Reform Movement long ago stopped requiring the Get and instead accepts the documentation of civil divorce as all that is required for person to remarry.

Unfortunately, there is potentially a very complicated reality for the Jew who does not obtain a traditional Get, and then later seeks to marry within the orthodox world. If that is your situation, then I would strongly recommend that you sit with one of our rabbis and work that through, to avoid getting all caught up in that "potentially complicated reality".

But for our purposes here, I want to share with you the existence of the very powerful "Document of Separation and Release" that we have in the Reform Movement. Still recognizing that the civil, legal issue divorce is fully recognized by our Movement, we are also well aware that there remain powerful emotional and spiritual issues when a marriage comes to an end. The simple ceremony of signing The Document of Separation and Release can play a great role in the closure needed to begin moving forward in your life. We recognize that there are elements of two people ending a marriage that are beyond the legal and financial settlements of civil divorce.

During the ceremony, the Rabbi may say, "What existed between you, both the good and the bad, is ingrained in your memories. We pray that the good that once existed between you may encourage you to treat each other with respect and trust, and to refrain

from acts of hostility. And may the love that you have for your children, and the love that they have for you, increase with years and understanding." (Rabbi Simeon Maslin)

Is this ceremony appropriate or realistic for everyone? Perhaps not. But for those who would find any bit of comfort, closure or healing from this ceremony of release, please know that we are here for you, and would be available to share your thoughts and questions at any time. Just stop us in the hall, call or come by the Rabbis' Study.

From the Religious School Principal



What a day we had on Wednesday, March 14! Feeling inspired by the incredible weather and anticipating how our students would feel, we decided to bust out of the traditional walls of our class-

rooms and immerse our 4th and 5th graders in being outside. Being outside? At Religious School? What could you possibly learn outside that has to do with Religious School? Well, we took the challenge to do just that and I think a good time was had by all.

It was definitely not a normal day in our school. Here's the low down:

4:00pm: Our students entered the Sanctuary, expecting the usual *T'filah*, and they were greeted by Moses, playing the guitar. (Okay, it was Rabbi Shira and she plays an awesome and convincing Moses!) By 4:10pm, we had moved everyone outside to the area just in front of the main entrance.

4:30pm: Our 4th and 5th graders were broken up randomly into the 12 Tribes of Israel, each with a standard to carry. Two Tribes were paired with a teacher who then moved the



students through 6 stations, each themed and constructed around Pesach learning. The energy of moving from station to station was created to be frenzied and frantic, as Tribes sometimes did not have time to complete a task. We wanted them to feel what it was like to not have enough time...students only had 8 minutes at each task! Here's what each station did...

• Learning the Four Questions

Tribes learned and practiced the 4 Questions in Hebrew, discussed the meaning of the words and had a chanting competition

• What to Bring to the Promised Land Tribes reviewed a number of items and together had to determine the 5 most crucial things to pack. One tribe member was then responsible for carrying the "pack" through the rest of the stations. Otherwise, they wouldn't make it through the Sea of Reeds!

· A Taste of Slavery

In each tribe, one student was appointed Pharaoh, the task master. In a limited amount of time, tribes had to gather sticks and construct a pyramid using all materials gathered. Once all materials were used, the task was stopped. The tallest and biggest pyramid was declared the winner!

• Miriam's Motivation Station

Using clues on their standard, tribes had to write a motivational cheer to keep their tribe going through hard times.

Hide from the "Angel of Death"

In the woods, tribe members had to make sure they could not be seen by the Angel of Death by camouflaging themselves right nearby!

• The Art of the Four Children

After a text study together, tribes created visual depictions of the Four Children: the Wise, the Wicked, the Innocent and the Child Who Cannot Ask. These beautiful drawings were displayed in the trees.



We used almost the entirety of Kol Ami's outdoor space, from the grass lawn at the front to the trails in the back. Everything concluded with Tribes presenting their tribal cheers and 90 students bursting through the Sea of Reeds!

We hope our students brought home the excitement and shared the learning that took place. As we have more beautiful spring days, I'm hopeful we will continue to be creative in our approach to teaching our students. Making Jewish learning fun is our best way to make it meaningful for our kids.

Please make sure there will be blood available when someone needs it. YOU can save lives. Give the GIFT OF LIFE. There is no substitute for blood. There is only one source—us! Money and insurance are useless if the right blood type is unavailable in an emergency. Blood donors must be at least 17 years old (16 with written parental/guardian permission) and weigh 110 pounds. People over 75 can continue to donate blood if they meet all donor criteria and present a physician's letter allowing them to donate. There are, however, some medical conditions that can keep someone

The Kids Got It! A Look Back at Jewish Disability Awareness Month

Well it was a success! In honor of February Jewish Disability Awareness Month, the inclusion committee ran three programs for various age groups. In the Early Childhood Program, "The Kids on the Block" puppet show was arranged through the Westchester Disability Office and was well received. Puppets and puppeteers with disabilities performed for our children. After the puppet show the kids had the opportunity to ask questions about how people live with a disability. They asked and learned about how someone who is blind tells time (by having a talking watch) and how a seeing eye dog is trained to work (when dogs wears a harness with a handle, they learn they are working and are trained not to get distracted). The kids even had the opportunity to pet the guide dog! One puppeteer, Scott, who uses a wheelchair, explained that he likes to swim, play baseball and that he has a lift to get him into his car to drive. We also sent out resources to parents about how to speak to kids about disabilities. Please check out some tips about talking to kids about disabilities below and see the pictures from the show.



The high school program with our Yad B'Yad kids was an exciting and eye opening experience for us all. A couple of amazing Yad B'Yad teens spoke and answered questions from the general body of our high schoolers. They spoke about their life experiences and it was easily noticed by all that teens with disabilities share many similarities with "typical" teens. They experience frustrations, good days, bad days, can get bullied and feel happiest when they are around friends that support them. Following the presentation and panel discussion, we broke up into small groups and had very insightful conversations and sharing. When both groups of teens were asked at what age children should begin to learn about disabilities, the general consensus was "as young as possible"! By the end of the evening everyone questioned why there are not more programs at Kol Ami that allow all our teens to experience our programs as a united community. There was no question this program was a huge success! We look forward to exploring



additional programs to get ALL our teens together more often. We also hope to present this program at the middle school level in the near future.

For the adult population, we distributed emergency preparedness packages during Shabbat services. The package allows emergency responders to access vital information in an organized format that hangs on the person's door. If you would like more information about this or to get a copy, please contact Gene Kava.

As a committee, we look forward to planning year-round disability awareness programs and programs that include all congregants despite our varying abilities!

Tips for Speaking to Kids about Disabilities:

Kids may not notice people with disabilities, such as a person in a wheelchair, until around the age of 4, but at this time they may start to stare or blurt out questions. Your reaction may impact what your child thinks about and how they treat people with disabilities for years from that moment. Below are some tips on how to be prepared.

Watch for an opening – when your child notices someone with a difference or disability, take the opportunity to acknowledge the differences and start a conversation. Explain how we are all different (hair, eyes, height) and then explain what you know about the person. For example, "he is using sign language because he cannot hear". Try to foster an attitude of inclusion and not otherness.



Answer questions directly – you don't need a long, drawn-out answer but go right to the point. For example: "he is probably using a wheelchair because he is having a problem walking."

Watch your choice of words – try to use people first language. For example, say "a person with a disability" not a "disabled person". When you interact with someone with a disability, try not to avoid the person or to tell your child "don't stare". That may make your child feel as if they can't ask questions or there is something to be scared of.

Emphasize what is the same – point out the similarities to your kid. For example, he has the same color eyes and he likes to play with his friends. If your child likes sports, you can use Youtube to show how their favorite sport can be played in a modified way. Having social interactions can help the kids to realize the similarities on their own.



Offer reassurance — sometimes kids are concerned that they will "catch" the disability. In privacy, explain to them that it doesn't happen that way.

Teach respect – if you hear language or teasing, explain how the words can be hurtful to people.

Reflect on your own thoughts and assumptions. This may give you insight into how you want your child to be the same as you or different depending on your comfort level.

Congregation Kol Ami Article VII Nominations
