Weekly Torah Portions for Ganuary

Week ending January 7, 2012 Parashat Vayehi Genesis 47:28-50:26

The final *parashah* in B'reishit, brings the first book of the Torah full circle. The family stories of patriarchs and matriarchs culminate in the blessings of Jacob to his sons and grandsons. The centerpiece of the portion is a sequence of twelve blessings, delivered by Jacob to each of his sons. Jacob brings his entire family together to hear his words.

Week ending January 14, 2012 Parashat Shemot Exodus 1:1-6:1

This week we begin the book of Exodus. In Hebrew, the name of the book and its first *parashah* is *Shemot*, meaning "names," referring to the names of the Israelites who come to Egypt with Jacob. A new Pharaoh who does not have direct experience with Joseph took control of Egypt. The Israelites are enslaved. Moses is born and in turn "gives birth" to the people of Israel.

Week ending January 21, 2012 Parashat Vaera Exodus 6:2-9:35

God speaks to Moses, confirming the covenant that was made with Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. The pleas of the enslaved Israelites have been heard by the Eternal, and God instructs Moses to promise them redemption. God also commands Moses to speak to Pharaoh and demand that he liberate the people of Israel. Pharaoh refuses to release the slaves and God causes plagues on the Egyptians in order to change Pharaoh's mind.

Week ending January 28, 2012 Parashat Bo Exodus 10:1-13:16

This *parasha* begins with a reiteration of God's challenge to Pharaoh to change his behavior while at the same time making it more difficult for him to do so; and it concludes with the freeing of the Israelites from bondage. God tells Moses and Aaron that the people must remember how God freed them from bondage.

You Have to Let Go...

You have to let go of hate if you want to be free."

This quotation is from Rabbi Jonathan Sacks of England (Chief Rabbi of the United Hebrew Congregations of the Commonwealth), extracted from an interview together with the Dalai Lama. It ended an article in the last issue of Reform Judaism, a magazine sent to all the households of our congregation and Reform congregations across North America. He mentioned it in the context of interpreting a verse from Deuteronomy, "Do not hate an Egyptian, for you were a stranger in his land." Rabbi Sacks adds, "Had the Israelites continued to hate their enemies. Moses would have taken the Israelites out of Egypt, but he would not have taken Egypt out of the Israelites. They would be slaves to their past, slaves to their feelings of pain, injustice and grievance. This is what we have to repeat, day after day, in this difficult, dangerous, 21st century. You have to let go of hate if you want to be free."

The months of January, February and March will open up for us many opportunities to learn with and from Muslims—American Muslims, Palestinian Muslims and others. Our featured speaker at the February 10th Synaplex is Dr. Izzeldin Abuelaish. Called a Palestinian Martin Luther King, Dr. Abuelaish, an obstetrician/gynecologist and fertility expert, was born in the Jabalia Refugee Camp. Through sheer determination and hard work, he became the first

Palestinian doctor to complete a formal residency and receive a staff position at an Israeli hospital, where he continued to treat both Israelis and Palestinians. In January 2009, during the three-week-long war in the Gaza Strip and a mere four months after losing his wife, Nadia, to cancer, an Israeli tank mistakenly fired two shells into Dr. Abuelaish's home, killing three of his daughters and his niece. His new book *I Shall Not Hate* is part of his ongoing work to create a lasting peace between Palestinians and Israelis.

The March Synaplex features Dr. Sayyid Syeed, the National Director of the Islamic Society of North America's (ISNA) Office for Interfaith and Community Alliances. ISNA and the URJ (the Union for Reform Judaism) have partnered together to create a curriculum of study for Jews and Muslims and to address concerns of both anti-Semitism and Islamophobia in the United States. As 5,000 Reform Jews gathered in Washington DC in mid-December, we also celebrated the 16 year tenure of Rabbi Eric Yoffie as president of the URJ. Dr. Syeed was among those whose tribute was printed in the honorary journal: "There was a time when Muslim and Iewish communities in America had no formal communication with one another, and the only things we knew about each other were filtered through negative stereotypes and demonized caricatures. It was difficult to find partners in this environment who would step forward and choose a path of reconciliation and dialogues. When I met you in 2007, I realized that I had found a faith leader who embodied those higher values of reconciliation and understanding so admired by the prophet of Islam."



Beginning in January, our "Facing the Legacy of September 11th Ten Years Later: Jews and Muslims in America" series will meet on four Thursday evenings (1/26, 2/9, 3/8, and 3/22) from 7:30-9:00 pm at Kol Ami. During these winter months, we will have the chance to study about Islam with Muslim teachers: Imam Shamsi Ali of the Islamic Cultural Center of New York. Dr. Kareem Adeeb of the American Institute for Islamic and Arabic Studies in Connecticut, and Zead Ramadan of CAIR New York (Council on American-Islamic Relations). These evenings have been inspired and created by members of our Interfaithful Committee and I hope that as we learn from these courageous teachers we also will learn more about what we share as great religious traditions, and perhaps more about the uniqueness of our own.

So, a Happy New Year. I hope that 2012 begins for us as a community with wisdom, insight and new ways to see our world and our place in it.

Ritual Riches: Tu b'Shevat

The "roots" of *Tu b'Shevat* can be found in the third book of the Torah. In Leviticus 19:23-25, the Israelites are told, "When you enter the land and plant any tree for food, you shall regard its fruit as forbidden. Three years it shall be forbidden for you, not to be eaten. In the fourth year all its fruit shall be set aside for jubilation before God; and only in the fifth year may you use its fruit—that its yield to you may be increased." In the fifth year—and all subsequent years—the farmer would be able to harvest the crop for his own use.

In order to determine how the "birthday" of a tree could be marked, the early Rabbis established the 15th day of the Hebrew month Shevat as a general "birthday" for all trees, regardless of when they were actually planted. By this time, the majority of the annual rainfall has usually fallen in Israel, providing a healthy, water-logged soil in which to plant new trees. The holiday, *Tu b'Shevat*, derives its name from its date. "Tu" is the pronunciation of the Hebrew letters (tet + vav) that have a numerical value of 15; and the holiday occurs in (b') the Hebrew month of Shevat. This year *Tu b'Shevat* falls on February 8th on our calendar.

In current times, *Tu b'Shevat* is considered to be a Jewish Arbor Day or "Earth Day" that teaches about Judaism's attitudes towards responsible stewardship of God's creation. Some observe this holiday by planting trees and promoting environmental activism. It is also traditional to eat fruit associated with the land of Israel. Another custom is to eat a new fruit or to eat from the "seven species" The "seven species" mentioned in Deuteronomy 8:8 are wheat, barley, grapes (vines), figs, pomegranates, olives and dates (honey).

The new fruits of the season fall into four categories. The first, hard on the outside and soft on the inside, symbolizes the protection that the earth gives us and reminds us to nourish the strength and healing power of our own bodies. These include walnuts, coconuts, or almonds. The second fruit is soft with a pit in the center (such as olives, dates, peaches, apricots, etc.) and symbolizes the life-sustaining power that emanates from the earth. It reminds us of the spiritual and emotional strength that is within each of us. The third fruit is soft throughout and is completely edible (figs, grapes, and raisins) and symbolizes God's omnipresence and

our own inseparable ties with the earth. The fourth fruit has a tough skin on the outside but sweet fruit within (mangos, bananas, avocados, or sabra) and symbolizes the mystery of the world and the Torah.

Another tradition, developed by the Kabbalists, is the *Tu b'Shevat Seder*. The seder begins with the recitation of the *Shehecheyanu*, thanking God for bringing us to this joyous time of celebrating rebirth and change. Modeled on the Passover Seder, the Tu b'Shevat Seder includes eating fruit and drinking four cups of wine. These cups of wine contain varying percentages of red and white wine, possibly representing the shifting of the four seasons. The seder may also include readings on trees and fruit from a range of Jewish literature.

However you celebrate *Tu b'Shevat*, it is a time to reflect on our connection to the land of Israel, as well as to the land and nature throughout the world. *Happy Birthday Trees!*





THE MAIN EVENT - A Plea for Peace from the Gaza Doctor

Dr. Izzeldin Abuelaish known as "the Gaza Doctor," is the author of the bestselling book I Shall Not Hate, which chronicles his life growing up in Gaza and the development of his outlook on life and peace in Israel and Palestine. Dr. Abuelaish's three daughters were killed during the War on Gaza in January 2009, minutes before he was to speak live on an Israeli TV program.
