Zackary Drucker

Transparent on Identities: Transgender and Jewish

TV Producer ~ Artist ~ Teacher ~ Speaker ~ Filmmaker ~ Actress

Zackary Drucker is a transgender performance artist who breaks down the way we think about gender, sexuality and seeing. Her participatory art works complicate established binaries of viewer and subject, insider and outsider, and male and female in order to create a complex image of the self. She has performed and exhibited her work internationally in numerous museums, galleries, and film festivals from Venice to San Francisco, from the Whitney to Lausanne. Drucker uses a range of creative devices that all strive toward the portrayal of bodily identity, her own and that of others, obsessively infusing visual media—photographs, videos and performance art—while helping us to understand and embrace the "T" in LGBT.

Ms. Drucker's most recent success has been as a producer and actress in the Golden Globe award winning TV series "Transparent", an American comedy-drama television series that debuted on Amazon Prime on in 2014. The story revolves around a Los Angeles Jewish family and their lives following the discovery that their father is transgender.

Weekly Torah Portions for March

Week ending March 7, 2015 Parashat Ki Tisa Exodus 30:11-34:35

Moses lingers on Mount Sinai for forty days. The people become agitated during Moses' long absence and persuade Aaron to fashion a golden calf in Moses' absence. Upon returning with the 10 Commandments, Moses sees the Israelites cavorting around the calf and smashes the tablets of God's law. Joined by the Levites, Moses executes a campaign to root out the offenders. Moses then pleads with God to secure divine mercy for the people. The *parashah* ends with a restoration of mutual faith and with Moses carving a second set of tablets inscribed with Ten Commandments.

Week ending March 14, 2015 Parashat Vayak'heil-P'kudei Exodus 35:1-40:38

This double *parashah*, brings us to the end of the Book of Shemot (Exodus). In *Vayak'heil*, Moses reminds the people that God commanded them to keep Shabbat, not to perform any work on the seventh day, and to make the day holy. The *parashah* continues with Moses asking the Israelites to donate materials for the building of the *mishkan* (sanctuary). Moses describes every object that is needed, every attribute of the structure, every manner of work, and every detail for the altar in building a *Mishkan* to God in *P'kudei*, the second part of this double *parashah*. As the building of the sanctuary and its holy objects are completed, Moses blesses all of the people who took part in their creation

Week ending March 21, 2015 Parashat Vayikra Leviticus 1:1-5:26

We begin the third book of the *Torah Vayikra* (Leviticus) with a description of five types of sacrifices offered in the Temple. They are: burnt offering, meal offering, sacrifice of wellbeing, sin offering, and guilt offering. While the first three are voluntary, the last two are mandatory for guilty individuals.

Week ending March 28, 2015 Parashat Tzav Leviticus 6:1-8:36

Tzav, the second Torah portion in Leviticus, continues with the regulations for sacrifices, and then outlines the ritual of priestly ordination for Aaron and his sons.

A Kol Ami Food Bank?

Let them build Me a sanctuary, that I may dwell among them." V'asu li mikdash, v'shachanti b'tocham. The Torah's call to build a sanctuary begins with these words: "Let the Israelites build Me a sanctuary, that I may dwell among them." We might have expected, "Let them build Me a sanctuary that I may dwell in it." But no, not in it. Among them. It is a beautiful phrase, often commented upon. The way we build a sanctuary brings God among us—not in it.

Alice Walker, in *The Color Purple*, writes in this conversation between Shug and Celie:

"...tell the truth, have you ever found God in church? I never did. I just found a bunch of folks hoping for him to show. Any God I ever felt in church I brought in with me. And I think all the other folks did too. They come to church to share God, not find God."

Build Me a sanctuary, that I may dwell among them. We come to share God.

We are now in the the month of Adar, the month of Purim. There is a wonderful—and sad—Purim custom that takes place at services. We pass the plate. This is the only service of the year where this takes place. Yes, we collect money. We collect money on the eve of Purim for Maot Chittim—for Jews in poverty who are not able to buy foods for Passover. (We don't collect money on Shabbat or other festivals—as they are money-free, business-free zones. Purim is not a "religious" holiday in the same way.)

Last month, women gathered at the Women's Roundtable Breakfast heard a moving presentation by Jeanne Blum, Director of Advocacy and Strategic Partnerships at the Food Bank of Westchester. You know the stats: one out of five Westchester residents will go to bed hungry tonight. It is our col-



lective shame that this is still the case. (Your contributions of non-perishable foods that you bring to the temple help supply the Westchester soup kitchens and food pantries. One can can make a difference.)

Following the breakfast presentation, one of the participants came over to me and said, "It is possible—even likely—that some of our own congregants are going hungry."

If we are a sacred community, if we are here for one another, we must do something about that. We are putting our heads together on a Sunday morning between Purim and Passover to figure out what we can and will do. If you are interested in being part of this conversation, please speak to me or to Jess Lorden.

After all, we come here to share God. If we build it, God will dwell among us.

Introducing: Wednesday Night in the Cantor's Office

It has always been very interesting to me the assumptions that people make about clergy. This is especially true when it comes to one's perception about the role of a cantor. People who are not particularly engaged in Jewish life, but know what a cantor is, have been known on occasion to say something like the following to me:

Fortunately the modern cantorate has evolved beyond the bima over the past few decades. I am blessed to be a part of a community with so many different things happening within its walls. I am blessed to work with wonderful clergy partners and a dedicated and devoted staff who are always coming up with new and innovative projects to engage our community. While I do love to sing and music is an integral part of my life and my job, I am happy to report that there are many other things that keep me occupied during the week.

One of my greatest joys is teaching 11th and 12th grade here at Kol Ami. Aside from having a great group of students, I especially enjoy connecting with these young adults who are applying to colleges and about to venture off on what will arguably be one of the most exciting adventures of their lives. I feel fortunate to study and learn with them on a weekly basis, confident that they will carry their Judaism with them as they join the "real world". Some of our most profound learning and connections emerge when we aren't studying something specific. Rather, it just comes from talking about something as simple as what they had for lunch that day.

As human beings, we all crave connection. It is one thing to go out to dinner with a complete stranger but it is quite another to have a meal with your three closest friends. In our president's "Connection" article back in June, Hank spoke about the need for our congregation to become more "relational" in everything we do. For those of you who have been a part of Kol Ami for many years, you know the deep friendships and connections you have made with people over the years. It is these relationships that ultimately define us as a communi-

From Our Exeutive Director

K ol Ami is often described as a warm and welcoming community and I so appreciate the warm welcome you have extended to me. Thank you for calling, dropping by, scheduling appointments, sharing your ideas, sending cards and introducing yourself to me at events and services. These first few weeks have been wonderfully invigorating and exciting.

So, in the spirit of these open communications, I wanted to share some of the things on which I've been working. Some changes are readily apparent such as cleaning and reorganizing the main office. These changes were made to enhance our efficiency and effectiveness so we may better serve you.

Other changes are more subtle. As mentioned last month, listening remains my first priority. But, the flip side of listening pertains to enhancing our communications within the Kol Ami staff, with congregants, and with the local community. Since both are essential, this month I have tried to focus on both aspects of communication.

How can we more effectively communicate with congregants? With the help of Ellen Bittner, Staci Krantz, Ilene Miller and Rebecca Reuben we restructured and simplified *This Week at Kol Ami*, updated and streamlined the *Order of Service*, and revised lifecycle notices. With Judy Sarch's help we've begun the process of updating the Kol Ami Website. Over the next few months we plan to restructure *The Connection*.

In the interest of making our communication more relational, with full support of our clergy, we have begun making weekly calls to congregants who, observing a *yahrzeit*, will have the name of a loved one read aloud at Shabbat services. These calls provide a wonderful opportunity for us to make a connection and find out more about the loved one who is being remembered. At staff meetings we share information gleaned during these calls noting where follow-up may be appropriate. After these conversations we are able to update congregant information in our database. We anticipate installing new software to help us more effectively track important congregant information.

Communication is also fostered, and meaningful relationships formed, by spending time together. With the clergy, I am seeking opportunities to visit with congregants. For example, we are planning a congregant luncheon at the Osborne. In addition, I am always willing to meet a congregant for coffee, breakfast, or lunch. Starting in February, I will be hosting an Executive Director's table at every Synaplex. If you'd like to join me for coffee or breakfast or

sit at my Synaplex table, please let me know. I would love the opportunity to spend time with you.

As much as you, our congregants, are my first priority, the Kol Ami professional team can't properly address your needs if we aren't operating cohesively. It has been a pleasure to get to know



our wonderful staff. I have had team meetings and individual meetings with everyone on the team to share my expectations and to start building the trusted relationships needed for individual and collective success. The team is working hard and smart and I appreciate the new ideas they are bringing forward. I'm also meeting weekly with the clergy and Hank to ensure we share short-term and long-term priorities. I have been meeting with key Kol Ami suppliers and contractors pertaining to important matters such as our insurance, snow removal, security, HVAC, and payroll needs among others.

In addition, I believe that strong community ties forged by regular communications with community leaders make us stronger. Accordingly, I met the Director of Habitat for Humanity to see how we might participate in rebuilding certain areas in lower Westchester. I have been communicating regularly with our partners at the Coachman Family Center to ensure we continue to meet their needs. Furthermore, I have been participating in the Executive Director's Roundtable discussions so that I may learn from the Executive Directors of other Westchester synagogues. Perhaps most importantly, I have been meeting with leaders of the White Plains Police Department to see how we may partner together. This last relationship is helping me address simple issues such as improving the traffic flow in our parking lots as well as more critical ones such as enhancing our security and emergency preparedness.

If you would like to meet for coffee, have an idea you think we could implement to enhance our congregational relationships, or if you would like to volunteer at Kol Ami, I would welcome hearing from you. Ritual Riches

In Reform Judaism, is what we as individuals choose to practice only what seems important to us personally? Could we step out of "who we are" to practice what we haven't felt any compelling need to practice? Is it possible to open our own personal world to additional religious practice?

We live in a world of Jewish friends, Catholic friends, secular friends, and a wide variety of friends of other ethnic and religious backgrounds. Could we be someone who is not just coasting along on the entire gamut of our relationships and sometimes just be a Jew?

It's easy it is to be a Jew in Temple on Rosh Hashanah, it's very different than being a Jew at a party of mixed friends at a friend's house. I don't wear a kipah outside of Temple. I will put it on in my home on Shabbat when I'm having a Shabbat meal and saying the *Motzi*. I will put it on in my home when I read *Kaddish* for a *Yarzeit*, I will put it on when I light Chanukah candles and say the blessings. It doesn't make me orthodox, it doesn't make me anything other than the Jew I want to be. I don't eat treif but I don't claim to be Kosher. My friends know that I won't have pork or shrimp or even cheese-burgers and they respect that.

As we bring more traditional Judaism to Temple services, I wonder about people who joke about creeping orthodoxy. I wonder more about creeping assimilation. How often do we remember the pride or joy of being part of a tradition that goes back thousands of years? Couldn't we stick a toe within the circle of our long heritage and see how it feels?

For the first 15 years of my marriage to Susanne, my beautiful Catholic Italian wife, being Jewish had never required anything of me other than to know I wasn't Catholic. I wanted to find who I was so I decided to at least stick my toe into a Temple for the first time in twenty years. My first experience at a Shabbat evening service at a local Reform Temple convinced me that it wasn't me, I was lost, but I wasn't ready to give up

trying, I knew there was something out there and I felt compelled to find it.

I found Kol Ami, I found friends, and I found a rabbi whom I loved listening to every Saturday morning. I came at a time that fit my life and others. The "Lift" had a committee that had been planning and working on a Prayer book they had dreamed of having for years. They asked if I was interested in getting involved? I could barely read any Hebrew. I did remember that you read from right to left. However, they wanted to print a book and I knew printing production. They needed a few drawings and I could draw and even write a little. I soon found my toe, and the rest of me, in the circle of our long Jewish heritage. I was the "Lifts" missing piece and they were mine. A good marriage but what about my other marriage? When I asked Sue to stop ordering pepperoni pizza she knew something was going on that I didn't want to talk about. This was a complex, if not scary, moment for me. Sue respected my involvement and didn't mind the changes on the kitchen table. The Temple was welcoming to her and we grew our friendships. Our older son, Justin, converted to Judaism and Sue drew great pride in his making a monumental-sized life decision at seventeen years old. Then after a year of study, off he went with NFTY on a trip to Israel with the confirmation
