Weekly Torah Portions for March

Week ending March 2, 2013 Parashat Ki Tisa Exodus 30:11-34:35

Moses lingers on Mount Sinai for forty days, and the people persuade Aaron to fashion a golden calf in Moses' absence. Upon returning with the 10 Commandments, Moses sees the Israelites cavorting around the calf and smashes the tablets of God's law. Joined by the Levites, Moses executes a campaign to root out the offenders. Moses then pleads with God to secure divine mercy for the people. The parashah ends with a restoration of mutual faith and with Moses carving a second set of tablets inscribed with Ten Commandments.

Week ending March 9, 2013 Parashat Vayak'heil- P'kudei Exodus 35:1-40:38

This double parashah brings us to the end of the Book of Shemot (Exodus). In Vayak'heil, Moses reminds the people that God commanded them to keep Shabbat, not to do work on the seventh day, and to make the day holy. The parashah continues with Moses asking the Israelites to donate materials for the building of the mishkan (sanctuary). Every article needed, every attribute of the structure, every manner of work, and every detail for the altar in building a Mishkan to God are described by Moses in P'kudei. As the building of the sanctuary and its holy objects are completed, Moses blesses all of the people who took part in its creation

Week ending March 16, 2013 Parashat Vayikra Leviticus 1:1-5:26

We begin the third book of the Torah Vayikra (Leviticus) with a description of five types of sacrifices offered in the Temple. They are: burnt offering, meal offering, sacrifice of well-being, sin offering, and guilt offering. While the first three are voluntary, the last two are mandatory for guilty individuals.

Week ending March 23, 2013 Parashat Tzav Leviticus 6:1-8:36

Tzav, the second Torah portion in Leviticus, continues with the regulations for sacrifices, and then outlines the ritual of priestly ordination for Aaron and his sons.

Week ending March 30, 2013 Parashat Bo (Chol Hamoed Pesach) Exodus 12:21-51

This chapter is re-read during Passover as it relates the story of the final plague and the Exodus from Egypt. It includes God's instructions to the Israelite people regarding the laws of the Passover offering and the commandment to "observe this as an institution for all time."

Autumn in Krakow and Berlin

As Jews in the 21st century, we are bequeathed the task of making sense of the enormity of the human capacity for evil. What can the Holocaust teach us about human nature? Who are we as human beings? What about our capacity for courage? What is our truest nature?

In the fall of 2013, immediately after the fall holidays, Kol Ami is traveling to Krakow and Berlin. What better way to face some of these questions than with people we trust—and with whom we are building a community of courage and joy back here at home. Our days in Krakow will take us into the depths of Auschwitz; we will meet with members of the Jewish and non-Jewish communities who are struggling to deal with this history. Everywhere, we will face the

split-screen of painful memory—and a presenttense of charm, music, food, life and joys.

Berlin makes the split-screen easier to bear. Everywhere, the legacy of the Shoah expresses itself in museums, memorials, plaques on bus stops, signs in front of fancy department stores, daily conversation. Our guides in Berlin include the minds behind the Jewish Museum and artists whose installations have travelled from Berlin to NYC and back to Berlin again. Berlin has also been called one of the last great cities, and its museums and cafes and bars and galleries will beckon in between our serious encounters.

I hope and trust that our experience in Berlin will challenge our assumptions about what it

means to be Jewish—what it means to be human—what it means to be forgiving—what it means to affirm life—what it means to be honest and courageous. I



don't know exactly how we will be challenged—that part will be up to each of us.

I also expect that it will be an amazing – fantastic – interesting – fabulous trip. Space is indeed limited – there are some spaces left. Please call Suzanne Fromm, 949-4717 x 114, if you are interested in joining us.

Mourning Practices

Tn this article penned by Hank Rouda, we are $oldsymbol{1}$ offered an insightful overview on our mourning practices. Within each time marker of mourning rests the central liturgy of the Kaddish. While the Kaddish is recited in memory of the departed, it contains no reference to death. Rather, it is a statement celebrating God's dominion while celebrating the renewal of our faith in the great gift of life. There is nothing somber about the liturgy. In fact, within the Kaddish we express God's love and justice while praying for the ultimate blessing of peace. In addition, this piece of liturgy has been echoed in Christianity through "The Lord's Prayer." In my view, the Kaddish allows us to simultaneously mourn our loss while we express our great fortune to live another day. Thanks to Hank for a beautifully written snapshot of our mourning practices. "Judaism, with its long history of dealing with the soul of man, its intimate knowledge of man's achievements and foibles, his grandeur and his weakness, has wisely devised graduated periods during which the mourner may express his grief, and release with calculated regularity the built-up tensions caused by bereavement. The Jewish religion provides a beautifully structured approach to mourning."

When I first faced the reality of losing a parent, it dawned on me that I didn't know what do, meaning, what I "had to do" as a Jewish mourner. Of course, I knew about sitting shivah, covering mirrors, tearing of clothes (now done symbolically with a piece of black cloth typically provided by the funeral home), and

other "typical" mourning practices. I just didn't know what our Reform tradition considered necessary and appropriate. Fortunately, I was able to spend an amazing and revealing hour with Rabbi Shira who helped guide me through what was to come.

The first thing that I learned is that there are a wide variety of mourning practices and that, within the structure of these rituals, it was up to my family to decide what was appropriate for us. The second thing that Shira explained to me was the beauty of the Jewish mourning cycle. Judaism has created a framework to help the mourner (technically, only a father, mother, sister, brother, son, daughter and spouse) gradually recover during several periods of decreasing intensity. There are four periods of mourning: Aninut—the time between death and burial; Shiva—the seven day period following burial; Shloshim—the thirty day period following death; and Shana—the twelve months following death. These mourning periods allow the full expression of grief, while discouraging excesses of grief and enabling the mourner to gradually return to a more normal life.

Shiva refers to the seven days of intense mourning after the funeral when mourners remain at home and accept comfort from friends, neighbors and their community. While shiva is traditionally observed for seven days (the word literally means "seven"), it is up to the family to decide how many days they will actually sit. It is followed by shloshim when the mourners leave their home and begin to return to society. Typically, mourners do not

participate in a full social life during this time. Shloshim is followed by shana when the mourners continue to recite Kaddish on a daily or weekly basis. With each successive mourning period, the mourners have made it through another cycle without their loved ones and have begun to experience their lives with this new reality.

Our traditions have wisely provided two different ways to continue to celebrate our loved ones after shloshim has concluded. The first is Yizkor where families can join with the congregation for a shared memorial service. There are typically four Yizkor services during the year, which are on Yom Kippur, the last day of Sukkot, the last day of Passover and Shavuot. In addition, on the anniversary of the death of the loved one, the family can observe yahrzeit, by lighting a memorial candle at home on the anniversary of the death and by attending services on that Shabbat and saying Kaddish. If you have not already done so, please let the office know the name of your loved one and the date of their passing and we will add them to the yahrzeit list which is read on Friday night and Saturday morning.

And the stars were aligned in our favor as our partner organization, Costa Rican Adventures, sent us the best, brightest and warmest of their staff, making sure we understood the country, its nature and its challenges. They also made sure we got to hang out with sloths, monkeys, raccoons, tarantulas and we even milked cows.

once March arrives, spring can't be far behind. I've just returned from a 10 day, intense community service experience in Costa Rica with a group of our Kol Ami teens. We filled bags of dirt to be planted with seedlings to re-forest areas where trees have been cut down; we mixed concrete and created 2 sidewalks for a local high school and we created a new trail in the cloud forest, which involved carrying bags of rocks up the mountain. Not glamorous work by any standards!

Our kids were amazing. They began each day with Tefilah, dug into each work project with enthusiasm and encouraged each other when it got tough. They never complained. Not even a little.

The theme of our journey to Costa Rica was

"Becoming a Responsible Jewish Global Citizen." We studied and discussed, questioned and challenged. What does this even mean? Why should we be responsible for anyone besides ourselves and our own family and friends? How can spending a week in another country actually make a difference in the world? In our lives? Well... I'm here to tell you, it does and it did. We are all changed as a result of the work we did and the time we spent together. This group of teens is more than amazing. They are exceptional. We actually can change the world and with the leadership and guidance of young people like these, I transition back into the "real world" with such hope for our future. Ritual Riches: Counting the Omer

"And from the day on which you bring the sheaf of elevation offering — the day after the sabbath — you shall count off seven weeks. They must be complete: you must count until the day after the seventh week — fifty days; then you shall bring an offering of new grain to the Lord." LEVITICUS 23:15-16

"You shall count off seven weeks; start to count the seven weeks when the sickle is first put to the standing grain. Then you shall observe the Feast of Weeks for the Lord your God, offering your freewill contribution according as the Lord your God has blessed you." DEUTERONOMY 16:9-10

According to the Torah, it is a mitzvah to count the days from Passover to Shavuot; we call this the Counting of the Omer or Sefirat Ha-Omer. An omer is a biblical unit of measure, which literally means "sheaf". In the days of the Holy Temple, the Jewish people would bring a barley offering on the second day of Passover, and this was called the Omer. This time marked the beginning of the barley harvest when Jews would bring the first sheaves to the Temple as a means of thanking God for the harvest. So, in its biblical context, this counting connects the first grain offering (second day of Passover) to the wheat offering made at the peak of the harvest (Shavuot).

However, as the holiday of Shavuot became associated with the giving of the Torah, rather than solely being viewed as a celebration of agricultural bounty, the Counting of the Omer came to serve as a symbolic link between Passover's commemoration of the Exodus and Shavuot's celebration of the Israelites' receipt of the Torah. While Passover celebrates the initial liberation of the Jewish people from slavery in Egypt, Shavuot marks the culmination of that process of freedom, when the Israelites became an autonomous community with its own laws and ideals. Counting up to Shavuot reminds us that our redemption from slavery was not complete until we received the Torah at Sinai.

From the second night of Passover to the night before Shavuot, we recite a blessing and state the count of the Omer. The Omer is counted every evening, approximately thirty minutes after sunset. In the synagogue it is counted toward the end of the Ma'ariv or evening service. We begin this ritual by standing and saying the following blessing:

"Barukh ata Adonai Eloheinu Melekh ha'Olam asher kid'shanu b'mitzvotav v'tizivanu al sefirat ha'omer."

"Blessed are you, Adonai our God, Sovereign of the Universe, who has sanctified us with your commandments and commanded us to count the omer."

We then recite the appropriate day and week

of the count. For example, on the 23rd day, we would say, "Today is twenty-three days, which is three weeks and two days of the Omer".

Sefirat Ha-Omer is a time of partial mourning in the Jewish calendar. In the Talmud, we read that a plague struck during the time of Rabbi Akiva, and 24,000 of his students tragically died during this seven-week period because they did not treat each other with sufficient respect. Over the centuries, the Jewish people experienced massacres and pogroms during this time as well. Therefore, in traditional communities, weddings, parties, and dinners with dancing are not conducted during this period. Listening to live or recorded music and haircuts and shaving are not allowed. The one exception to this is the 33rd day of the Omer, or Lag Ba'Omer (Lag being an acronym of the Hebrew letters lamed and gimel which have the combined numerical value of 33), a minor holiday commemorating a break in the plague. This date is also the anniversary of the death of the great sage and mystic Rabbi Shimon bar Yochai, a leading disciple of Rabbi Akiva, who taught Kabbalah and authored the "Zohar".

Watch La Rafle (The Roundup). On July 16, 1942, French police carried out an extensive raid on Jews in greater Paris, resulting in the arrest of more than 13,000 people — including 4,000 children. After spending several miserable days in the Vélodrome d'Hiver stadium at the apex of summer with little food or water, families were deported to internment camps elsewhere in France and then, finally, to Auschwitz. With its emotionally astute and sensitive exploration of a long taboo subject in France — Jacques Chirac issued a public apology to the citizens of France only in 1995 — the raid, its political backdrop and the exquisite and poignant beauty of Paris during war time are brought to stirring life in writer-director Rose Bosch's new French cinema classic. Kol Ami takes pride in its long standing core value and practice, that no one is turned away from our Congregation on account of financial need. Anyone who desires to become a member of our Congregation may become a member, irrespective of financial circumstances. In fact, currently close to 25% of our congregants receive some form of financial assistance. In aggregate, the financial assistance Kol Ami provides annually totals in excess of \$400,000.

However, preserving and implementing this core value places significant pressure on our operating budget. Every year, expenses increase and the number of congregants receiving dues relief in this challenging economy has risen. We do not want to sacrifice our robust programs, events, educational and social action activities, which are the backbone

of our temple.

So what's the solution? In a nutshell, it's premium dues members. In order to fully uphold our charitable values without sacrificing programming, we need those congregants who are able to pay in excess of our base dues to strongly consider becoming premium dues paying members. In addition, those who are already premium dues paying members should consider elevating to a higher premium dues level. We owe a huge debt of gratitude to all of our existing premium dues members. However, we need more. The additional revenue generated from the premium dues members pales in comparison to the amount of dues relief Kol Ami currently provides its members. This ratio needs to be reversed.

A task force of Trustees, led by Gerri

Sommers and Elizabeth Ward, analyzed and made recommendations to our Board to create a clear definition of




