Weekly Torah Portions for May

Week ending May 3, 2014

Parashat Emor Leviticus 21:1-24:23

Emor provides details about the lives of the priests and their families. The priestly role was both an honor and a burden. This parashah also includes the most comprehensive holiday calendar in the Torah.

Week ending May 10, 2014 Parashat B'har Leviticus 25:1-26:2

This parashah presents a vision of a society guided by God-given principles of human freedom, human dignity and concern for the most vulnerable in society. It includes laws regulating the sabbatical year, giving the earth a complete rest; and the jubilee year, in which land and vineyards must not be worked. It also provides for the granting of liberty to all Israelites enslaved during the previous fortynine years.

Week ending May 17, 2014 Parashat B'chukotai Leviticus 26:3-27:34

The book of Leviticus is completed this week with B'chukotai, which is filled with God's promises and warnings to the people depending upon whether or not they faithfully follow or disobey God's commandments. The parasha also includes brief discussions of the payment of vows and gifts made to the sanctuary.

Week ending May 24, 2014

Parashat B'midbar Numbers 1:1-4:20

This Shabbat we begin reading the book of B'midbar, (in the wilderness). The book is called "Numbers" in English because it begins with a census of all male Israelites in the camp who are eligible to bear arms, as well as those responsible for the duties in the Tabernacle.

Week ending May 31, 2014 Parashat Naso Numbers 4:21-7:89

The second parasha in the Book of Numbers completes the census with a counting of the Levitical families and the enumeration of their responsibilities in the porterage of the Tabernacle and the Tent of Meeting. The parashah's concluding section begins with the Priestly Blessing, and ends with a list of the offerings brought by the tribal heads for the ceremony of the dedication of the Tabernacle.

The Next Genna-Ration

ongregation Kol Ami is an amazing place—and an amazing community. Chief among the incredible things that happen within the Kol Ami community is the annual retreat that takes place the Shabbat of Memorial Day Weekend. The Retreat begins Friday, May 23rd, at 6:00pm and ends Sunday before lunch. You can come up for the day (Saturday), or stay over one or both nights. There is programming for children—from toddlers to teens—giving parents the chance to be with other adults, to relax, to learn, to sit by the lake and read, to renew old friendships and meet new people. You can come alone, with a spouse or partner, with kids or grandchildren. Saturday night campfire and Havdalah, complete with s'mores and guitars, wine and cheese reception before dinner, BBQ, lakeside services, art with Avi, community soft ball games, I could go on and on.

This will be the 21st year of the Retreat—and in true coming-of-age fashion—for the first time the Retreat is being directed by the next generation. Genna Farley grew up at the retreat, from a little kid, to a teen, to a

counselor, to head counselor—and now to running the retreat. She will have the chance to tell us directly about the impact the Kol Ami Retreat has had on her life.

And to think that it all started when two children asked their parents to provide them with a Jewish education that would be comparable to the education that their Christian friends were getting. From such a simple request, an entire community came in to being and has flourished for the past 90 years, first as the Jewish Community Center of White Plains and now as Congregation Kol Ami – The Voice of my People.

We titled our current capital campaign, L'Dor va Dor – From Generation to Generation, because it is the obligation of each generation to provide for the next generations. As a congregation, we support each other in the good times (the countless simchas that we have experienced) and the bad times. Bequests Made Easy: Kol Ami's Legacy Fund

When making a bequest to the Kol Ami Legacy Fund, not all bequests are treated equally. Traditional IRAs and qualified retirement accounts like 401(k)s or 403(b)s ("retirement accounts") can be one of the best assets to use when making a charitable bequest as they generally provide the best tax planning opportunities.

As year end approaches, you may wish to consult with your tax-planning specialist to see if it makes sense for you to make a bequest to Kol Ami directly from your IRA, or to name the Kol Ami legacy Endowment Fund as a beneficiary of your IRA. This type of bequest is not taxable to the donor. By virtue of its tax-exempt status, Congregation Kol Ami is also not subject to income tax upon receiving distributions from retirement accounts.

Accordingly, if a donor's estate plan seeks to benefit both individuals and non-profit institution, it is most efficient, from a tax standpoint, to direct that the retirement distributions pass directly from the IRA to the institution (in this case, Kol Ami).

Naming The Kol Ami Legacy Fund as a beneficiary of your retirement account will have no bearing on your right to receive lifetime distributions but it can save your family significant estate and income taxes.

From the Religious School

The Kashkesh Hebrew program was born of several conversations. One day, Kindergarten teacher Debbie Yablow gave me a ride to the train station. She said she was interested in the experiential, project-based education we had implemented for the youth group and grades 3-6, and wanted to know how we could do more with our younger children. Coincidentally, and unbeknownst to me, our generous sponsors Paul and Susan Davis approached Religious School Director Felice Miller Baritz, saying they were interested in providing funding for a project related to Hebrew education. If this was not enough, parents of a group of younger children approached Felice and asked if it would be possible to provide their children with the opportunity to learn more Modern Hebrew. It seemed that the faculty, the community and parents at the school had all identified a need—a need for exciting, enriching Hebrew learning. It was a fortuitous moment, where we were able to figure out exactly what people in the community wanted and had resources to make it happen.

Kashkesh set out to achieve a few disparate goals: First, we wanted to provide our students, who had been learning primarily prayer-based written Hebrew with the opportunity to have enrichment in spoken, modern Hebrew. In addition, since I am an art educator and believe in the arts as a powerful way of learning and understanding the world, it was important to me to use the arts throughout the curriculum to bring learning to life. Finally, the curriculum was designed to be age-appropriate and draw on themes we thought would be compelling to the community: The Jewish Home, Holidays and Israel.

Kashkesh has been incredibly rewarding and has brought up many points for me as an educator. It is invaluable when you can identify and respond to the needs of a community through creative curriculum design. I was actually surprised how quickly and how much the students learned. Initially, I was not quite sure how high we could raise our expectations. But as the year draws to an end, we are hearing from teachers that students in the Kashkesh program are advancing much faster than their peers in Hebrew. In class, these kids who

had limited exposure to Hebrew are now able to understand basic stories in Hebrew and have an expanding vocabulary of words. The students have enjoyed the interactive, project-based nature of the program and are eager to come to class on Sundays. But what was amazing was how parents partnered with me to reinforce learning at home. Parents are provided with weekly e-mails describing what was learned in class, and actually attaching all handouts. Many of the parents are learning along with their kids, and collecting the handouts to compile a personal vocabulary that grows each week.

I will leave you with a taste of what it looks like to be in a Kashkesh class. This week, as part of our Israel unit, the students were learning about the Negev. In one hour, they learned 9 new Hebrew words related to the desert. But more important is how they learned. We created a Bedouin tent in the classroom and practiced the Mitzvah of welcoming others by handing out tea and acting out short conversations welcoming others in Hebrew. Students heard the biblical story of Abraham and the visit of the three angels at his tent, again in the language of their forefathers. And they learned about Ben Gurion moving his whole life to a small kibbutz in the desert to make the desert bloom. They finished by making their own tiny greenhouses and planting sprouts in them to learn about Negev agriculture. This was just one hour, and each week is different. It is this kind of high-energy, immersive learning that gets students and parents excited about their Jewish education.

As this year draws to a close, we are excited to begin our plans to expand our pilot for Hebrew learning into all our Kindergarten through 2nd grade classes. It is our hope that exposure to Hebrew, with project based learning through art, dance and music will form the foundation for early Hebrew reading while also giving our students a taste of the modern language of Hebrew. With Timna as our curriculum developer we are ready to soar and our students will be the beneficiaries of an exciting new model for learning Hebrew!

The children work all year on this event and our 4's will be showcasing their very own 3-dimensional "Community of Friends." We invite all of our families to join us for breakfast and a special "viewing" of the children's work needless to say this is always a special morning.

Monday, June 2nd will not just be another day at the ECP. This day will be special, as we will again have the privilege of hosting our friends from the Children's Early Learning Center in New Rochelle. Some of the children who attend the Early Learning Center live at the Coachman Family Shelter in Westchester or come from less fortunate families in our local neighborhoods. We have invited this



school's 3 and 4 year olds to join our 3 and 4 year olds for a morning of play, friendship, and of course ice cream! This is the fifth year we have extended an invitation to this school.

In our effort to teach the children in our nursery school the concept of Tikun Olam, repairing the world, we have introduced the idea of giving of oneself at a level we know they will understand. Congregation Kol Ami Article VII **Nominations**

Section 1. A Nominating Committee shall be appointed each year by the President with the consent of the Board of Trustees at its November meeting. The committee shall consist of nine Members: at least five members shall not be present Trustees.

Section 2. The Nominating Committee shall present a slate of prospective Trustees and Officers to be voted on by the Congregation at its next annual meeting. The slate shall be presented to the Secretary for publication in the April issue of The Connection. No member of the Nominating Committee or any member of his or her family unit may be nominated to be a Trustee or Officer.

Section 3. At least 75 days prior to the annual meeting, the Nominating Committee shall hold at least one meeting open to the Congregation. Notice of the time and place of the open meeting will be published in The Connection or will be mailed to each Member by first class mail not less than 10 days before the open meeting date.

Section 4. Additional nominations may be made in writing, signed by at least 25 Members, and delivered to the chair of the Nominating Committee or any Officer of the Congregation at least 20 days before the annual meeting of the Congregation. In the event of additional nominations, a list of all nominees will be sent by first class mail to each Member at least 10 days before the annual meeting.
