

## WEEKLY TORAH PORTIONS FOR MAY

## Week ending May 7, 2016

Parashat Ahare-Mot Leviticus 16:1-18:30

This *parasha* begins with a reminder of the death of Aaron's sons, and is a reminder of the magnitude of the priests' duties and responsibilities. The *parasha* also includes God's instructions to Moses and Aaron on the procedures surrounding Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement.

## Week ending May 14, 2016

Parashat Kedoshim Leviticus 19:1-20:27

Parashat Kedoshim continues with the practical and interpersonal applications of holiness. God explains to Moses the many ethical and ritual laws aimed to help people live lives of holiness. The laws described include some of those recorded in the Ten Commandments, such as respecting one's parents, keeping the Sabbath, and not stealing.

## Week ending May 21, 2016

Parashat Emor Leviticus 21:1-24:23

Emor provides details about the lives of the priests and their families. The priestly role could be seen as both an honor and a burden. This parasha also includes the most comprehensive holiday calendar in the Torah.

## Week ending May 28, 2016

Parashat B'har Leviticus 25:1-26:2

This parasha presents a vision of a society guided by God-given principles of human freedom, human dignity and concern for the most vulnerable in society. It includes laws regulating the sabbatical year, giving the earth a complete rest; and the jubilee year, in which land and vineyards must not be worked. It also provides for the granting of liberty to all Israelites enslaved during the previous forty-nine years.

## Congregation Kol Ami Article VII Nominations

**Section 1.** A Nominating Committee shall be appointed each year by the President with the consent of the Board of Trustees at its November meeting. The committee shall consist of nine members: at least five members shall not be present Trustees.

Section 2. The Nominating Committee shall present a slate of prospective Trustees and Officers to be voted on by the Congregation at its next annual meeting. The slate shall be presented to the Secretary for publication in the April issue of The Connection. No member of the Nominating Committee or any member of his or her family unit may be nominated to be a Trustee or Officer.

Section 3. At least 75 days prior to the annual meeting, the nominating Committee shall hold at least one meeting open to the Congregation. Notice of the time and place of the open meeting will be published in The Connection or will be mailed to each Member by first class mail not less than 10 days before the open meeting date.

Section 4. Additional nominations may be made in writing, signed by at least 25 Members, and delivered to the chair of the Nominating Committee or any officer of the Congregation at least 20 days before the annual meeting of the Congregation. In the event of additional nominations, a list of all nominees will be sent by first class mail to each Member at least 10 days before the annual meeting.

# A Message from Our Executive Director



As I write this article, Earth Week is coming to an end and our flowers and trees are finally starting to bloom. Accordingly, this article concerns our Green Team and green initiatives. Our Green Team was formed just one year ago. The team,

chaired by Bonnie Hagen, includes Rabbi Ilyse Glickman, Pam Millian, Daryl Moss, David Seicol, Murray Shapiro, Abdul Tubman, and me. This dedicated team is making a difference and having a positive impact on Kol Ami and the world.

Our first significant project was intended to address energy conservation and reduce energy costs. After an energy audit and an engineering analysis led by Bonnie Hagen and her colleagues at Bright Energy Services and Atlantic Westchester, we secured a grant from Con Ed for \$85,000 to help pay for upgrades to our HVAC units, retrofitting the fluorescent and incandescent lighting to LEDs and installing controls. The project is expected to yield an annual energy bill reduction of more than \$80,000.

With an eye on raising awareness of conservation, the Green Team turned to the creation of a "Green" Shabbat. We joined together with our second grade families and our choir for a wonderful service on April 15th. The service

featured special readings by the Green Team. During the oneg we served exclusively local and organic food and drinks and served the food using recyclable plates and utensils. Our goal for the evening was zero waste.

Below you will find a photo of the Green Team (missing Pam Millian) in the main sanctuary and another of the Green Team with White Plains Mayor Tom Roach and NY State Assemblyman David Buchwald, both of whom attended the evening's festivities.

Over the next few weeks you will see new bins throughout the building with separate units for garbage, recycling, and composting. Thereafter, we will continue our exploration of solar energy options.

The enthusiasm of the Green Team is contagious. The team is focused on important projects, both financially and spiritually, intended to improve the sustainability of our synagogue and community.

If there is a social action initiative about which you are passionate, I would welcome hearing from you.

Why did I come to Kol Ami?

The first time I came to The Lift, I came with my friend, Barbara Wexler. We had met at Dorry's Diner and the Walkabout Chorus.

I was impressed with how friendly everyone was and how knowledgeable they were during the discussion of the Torah portion. It fascinated me and made me want to come back and learn more from the congregants and the clergy.

## Women of Reform Judaism

## Serach bat Asher

As I write this article, we have just completed the second day of Passover. Within the context of the story of the Exodus, I recently learned about a female Torah heroine about whom I had no previous knowledge, Serach bat Asher, who is counted among those who went down to Egypt (Genesis 46:17) and who is later enumerated among the Israelites who escaped from Egypt, at the steppes of Moab (Numbers 26:46). Having been listed as a granddaughter of Jacob and having participated in the Exodus from Egypt, she is often referred to as the oldest woman in the Torah. Although nothing further is written about her there, the fact that she is the only one of her gender to be mentioned in the genealogical lists, indicated to the Rabbis that she must have been very worthy to be singled out for special mention; thus Serach bat Asher is the subject of many midrashim which portray her as a fascinating personality. This month, I thought it would be interesting to introduce our congregation to a little-known woman in the Passover story. Here is just a snapshot distilled from the many narratives passed down about Serach bat Asher.

Serach bat Asher is described as a woman of great beauty and wisdom who could play the lyre. A midrash tells us that when Joseph was reunited with his brothers in Egypt and sent them back to Canaan to bring their father Jacob to him, Serach was chosen to break the news to Jacob that Joseph was still alive; through her beautiful music and song, she revealed the news in a gentle and loving manner. Jacob is said to have been so pleased that he responded by blessing her, "May you live forever and never die". And she was allowed to enter Heaven alive (joining the ranks of only Enoch and Elijah).

Serach's immortality and wisdom are part of a story set in the time of the Rabbis when Rav Johanan is teaching in the beit midrash, discussing verse 22 from Exodus 14 regarding the waters of the Sea of Reeds parting, "forming a wall for them on their left and on their right". When asked how water could become as a wall, Rav Johanan describes it as a sort of net. However, Serach appears in order to resolve the disagreement, describing herself as having been there, and that "the water was not as a net, but as transparent windows". She is perceived as able to comprehend and to participate in learning in the beit midrash, and her answer is the preferred one because of her first-hand knowledge.

In yet another midrash, when the Israelites are ready to leave Egypt, Moses searches for Joseph's coffin all over Egypt as Joseph had had his brothers swear that they would bring his bones from Egypt to Canaan upon their departure from Egypt. When Moses cannot find it, he turns to Serach for help, the only one of that generation still alive. She leads Moses to the bank of the Nile and tells him that Pharoah had Joseph's body placed in a lead coffin and thrown into the Nile to bless its waters and so that the children of Israel would never be able to find it and fulfill their promise to Joseph, and thus

would not be able to leave Egypt. Moses pronounces some wellchosen words, and Joseph's coffin rises to the surface.

According to another tradition, Serach lived until the destruction of the First Temple and was one of the exiles who went to Babylon, where she died, nearly 1000 years old. Her grave is said to be located in Pir Bakran, a small town about 30 km southeast of Isfahan (now in Iran). The site consists of a small synagogue and a huge cemetery which is probably 2000 years old.

Serach, who accompanies the Israelites to Egypt and enters the Promised Land with them, is considered by some to be the guardian of Israel's communal memory. She is inextricably linked to the leaders of our people and is said to embody the history of our people as well.

In decades past what we understood as "Jewish" such as what Jews wore, what Jews ate, what Jews looked like, was a small variety in many peoples' minds. Some of those beliefs were real and many were stereo types. However many people were not uncomfortable with the stereotypical Jewish image. This may be due to a fear of assimilation. Today what some fear as assimilation can now be described as rainbow like in its' colorful variety of images. This beautiful array of more colors than a Pantone color book includes skin color, hair color, clothing color, even food color. Today we live inside a kaleidoscope of life but still Jewish.

Our ideals our belief in repairing the world, our pride and joy at hearing the Shofar blown, or wrapping ourselves in a Talite are still at our center of belief. We still study Torah, we still name our sons at their Brit Milah and now many name their daughters on the Bima. Men and women can choose to wear a Talit and a Kipah. We sit together in the Synagogues and our leaders and clergy are incredible women and men. Our mates may not be Jewish, but if we choose that our children will be raised Jewish, our family is part of a welcoming Jewish world. We are welcoming to same gender couples. We are welcoming mixed faith or mixed nationality.

We in liberal Judaism would strive for an almost utopian Jewish world. A world that doesn't try to impose beliefs on those outside of our lives. Why then do the people outside of our view choose not to act conversely towards us? In particular our brothers and sisters who share our DNA but not our ideals. We see a Jewish world in colors other than black and white.

Fundamentalists in politics or religion walk a narrow path often with blinders on. Their etched in stone male dominated society is tearing our world apart. They are attempting to rule not just our beliefs and ideals but our very rights to a Jewish life.

When God, as the Exodus song says' "gave this land to us" God did not amend it to mean Jewish men with beards wearing black and white clothes. Liberal Jews strongly say "God meant all Jewish men and women". This certainly means in the land or at the Wall. Freedom to have liberal Temples serving Reform, Reconstructionist and Conservative Jews in numbers that represent the liberal Jewish view. Jews with the desire to find an equitable way to share in the land with those that were here when we returned seventy years ago. We have to be a light unto the world. A light that shows a variety of choices and a multitude of freedom for a multitude of people in a multitude of color.


