WEEKLY TORAH PORTIONS FOR NOVEMBER

Week ending November 7, 2015 Parashat Chayei Sarah Genesis 23:1-25:18

The first words of this parashah translate as "the life of Sarah," but it begins with her death. Abraham purchases land in which to bury her, and then sends his servant to the village of his brother to acquire a wife for his son Isaac. The servant observes Rebekah, who offers water to him and to his camels to drink. Rebekah follows Abraham's servant back home and becomes Isaac's wife.

Week ending November 14, 2015 Parashat Toldot Genesis 25:19-28:9

Isaac marries Rebekah, and after 20 childless years they become parents to twin boys, Esau and Jacob. The brothers are quite different from one another and are at odds with each other well into adulthood. Rebekah favors Jacob, whereas Isaac seems aligned with Esau. Rebekah and Jacob conspire to deceive Isaac into giving the blessing due his firstborn son Esau, to Jacob. The sibling rivalry between Esau and Jacob reaches a feverish pitch, and becomes a recurring theme in Genesis.

Week ending November 21, 2015 Parashat Vayetze Genesis 28:10-32:3

Vayetze, meaning "and he went out," refers to Jacob's journey to Haran, his mother Rebekah's birthplace, to escape his brother Esau's wrath. On his journey, he dreams of a ladder reaching from earth to heaven and is given the same promise that God gave Abraham and Isaac, i.e., that he will inherit the land and be blessed. Jacob meets Rachel at the well and works for her father (his uncle Laban) for seven years in order to marry her. Jacob, who deceived his brother Esau, is himself the victim of deception. Laban substitutes Leah (his older daughter) for Rachel. Jacob must serve Laban an additional seven years in order to wed his intended spouse Rachel. Jacob eventually has a total of twelve sons and decides to return to his homeland.

Week ending November 28, 2014 Parashat Vayishlach Genesis 32:4-36:43

Jacob is now ready to return home after fleeing twenty years earlier, and realizes he will have to reconcile with his brother Esau. On the way, he has a dream and encounters a divine messenger. After the dream, Jacob is renamed Israel, meaning "struggles with God." Our narrative leaps forward in time to the moment when Jacob's children are now adults and his daughter, Dina is raped. Two of Jacob's sons, Simeon and Levi, avenge the crime.

LGBTQ INCLUSION, "HOW'RE WE DOIN?"

A vital synagogue community always has to be moving forward. The world changes, often for the better, and we have to grow and adapt to fully be there for each other. Working to be ever more welcoming to our LGBTQ members is one key area of ongoing growth.

With that in mind, I am looking for your help. To paraphrase my favorite New York City Mayor, "How're we doin?" I'd really appreciate hearing your thoughts and ideas on how effective we are in our inclusion work. In the past few years we have done the following:

- Reviewed all Synagogue documents, applications, etc. to try to make sure our language is welcoming and embracing of all of our members.

- Offered High Holiday sermons exploring LGBT issues.
- Presented several Synaplex keynote programs with gay and transgender themes.

A Message from our Rabbi

Some of us were together just a few weeks ago as the Torah was unfurled around the entire sanctuary. The entire exquisite scroll, gently and lovingly held and suspended in the air in the hands of adults and teens as children sat on the floor in the middle. We read the last words of the closing verses of Deuteronomy – and the opening words of the book

of Genesis. The Torah is the gift of the Jewish people to all humanity. But the Torah doesn't open with a story about the Jews; it opens with a story of the universe, and a story about all human beings. All of us created, equally, in the divine image.

It is not until three weeks and twelve chapters later that we hear the beginnings of the Jewish story. Lech I'cha. God said to Sarai and Avram – to Abraham and Sarah – Lech I'cha. Go forth. "Go forth from your native land, from the place of your birth and the land of your ancestors, to the land that I will show you. I will make from you a great nation, and I will bless you. I will curse those who curse you, and bless those who bless you – and through you all the families of the earth will be blessed."

In the story of our origins as a people, God asks us to leave the comforts of home and known civilization (the Tigris and Euphrates valley was the cradle of civilization) – to head out for the desert and for the unknown. "It is a great experiment," says God. (This is an imagined paraphrase.) "Being part of the Jewish people will bring curse and blessing – it has great risk and opportunity. But if you do it right, if you will partner with me," says God, "then through you, all the families of the earth will be blessed."

Being Jewish means not remaining satisfied with the status quo. It means heading out for the unknown and taking risks. It means being a blessing.

It is difficult these days to follow the news about Israel. It is difficult to see the violence against innocent men, women and children. It is also difficult when we find ourselves in serious and worried disagreement with the policies of the government of Israel. Many of you were in our sanctuary on Yom Kippur day, as Bassam Aramin, a Palestinian Muslim man, and Robi Damelin, a Jewish Israeli woman, stood side by side on our bima. They spoke as two bereaved parents, as two who have faced the chasm of pain left by the violent deaths of their children – and they want peace. They are not alone – not in their bereavements and losses, nor in their passion for peace.

Those of us who want peace must speak.

This past week, I, too, was in the desert. Not the desert of the Ancient Near East – no – the high desert and canyons of northern Arizona. On occasion, David and I connected to the internet, and we learned that the Jewish Federations of North America declared the Shabbat of

October 16/17 for congregations across the country a Shabbat of Solidarity with Israel.

A Shabbat of Solidarity with which Israel?

There are many possible Israels. There is an Israel of fundamentalism, of haredi ultra-Orthodoxy, of occupation, of continued war. There is also an Israel of hope, of democratic and progressive values, of tolerance, of working for peace, an Israel of blessing.

There are extraordinary people – some of whom we've met – and some whom we will – (both here and when we travel to Israel) – who are defying the status quo, who are taking risks for peace. This is the journey of blessing."L'chi lach – to a land that I will show you. Lech I'cha, to a place you do not know. L'chi lach, on your journey I will bless you – and you shall be a blessing."

Life's a Journey not a Destination

A few weeks ago during Sukkot, I found myself with fellow Kol Ami staff sitting around Rabbi Milgrom and her husband David's dining room table for a delicious breakfast, celebrating the end of another High Holiday season. David and Shira had asked each of us at the table to share our personal story of how we

came to this table, in other words, what was the path that led our family to come to White Plains and to be a part of Kol Ami.

It was fascinating to hear from many of our staff about the journeys and often risks taken by their ancestors that allowed them to be here today. It made us realize that each and every one of us has an interesting story (whether or not we consider it to be) and no matter how different that story is from each other we all have something in common.

As I sat down to plan my curriculum for the 11th and 12th grade class for the coming year, I had this breakfast and journey sharing exercise in my head. How fortunate I was to be facilitating a classroom of 21 post-confirmands all who chose to continue their Jewish education beyond what is typically expected of them. What is it about this group of teenagers that brought them all together? What was unique about their journeys that led them to be sitting in a classroom in a synagogue when they could be at the mall or hanging out with each other in some other environment?

One of the highlights of a service celebrating Bar/Bat Mitzvah at Kol Ami is when the Torah is passed through the generations of a particular family. It is at that moment where Rabbi Weiner often refers to the personal journeys that were travelled by members of the family, which has resulted in the Bar/Bat Mitzvah student reaching their special day. That student's journey is intertwined with an intergenerational story that is so unique and special to an individual family and its members. Each journey is filled with struggles and achievements and each journey is left with a story still to be told.

Our journeys are what shape our lives. Our journeys help to strengthen our identities and how we relate to each other.

As I write this article, it is this coming Shabbat that we will chant from the Torah portion Lech L'cha. If there is any Torah portion that highlights the concept of journeys, Lech L'cha is the quintessential journey story of the beginning of our people. Abraham's journey was unknown and he could have never known or imagined how it could have changed his life, the life of his family and the destiny of an entire people.

As we reflect upon on journeys, remember to celebrate what is unique and special about your own. There is a beautiful quote by author John Steinbeck that reads:

"A journey is a person in itself; no two are alike. And all plans, safeguards, policing, and coercion are fruitless. We find that after years of struggle that we do not take a trip; a trip takes us."

May we all continue to share our journeys with each other and remember to enjoy the ride in the process...

A Message from Our Executive Director

My Jewish Journey Everyone has a story.

Each of us has a reason for being a part of Kol Ami.

Each of us has our own unique connection to Judaism.

Commencing in December, we will be featuring a monthly column entitled "Jewish Journeys". This column will be devoted to sharing congregant journeys to Judaism, the importance of religion in

their lives, and the events which brought them to our community. This is my Jewish Journey.

I was born and raised in Great Neck, NY, where my great grandparents and grandparents were founding members of Temple Israel, a conservative temple in Great Neck, and where I received my Jewish education. My immediate family was culturally Jewish, enjoying a Shabbat meal every Friday night and celebrating all the Jewish holidays with our extended family, however our synagogue attendance occurred only "three times a year". Nevertheless, I have wonderful memories sitting with my Nana during services (she always carried Mentos and other candy for us), sitting next to my Dad and playing with the tzittzit on his tallit, and attending Hebrew School with my best friend. I don't know exactly why, but I did not celebrate becoming a bat mitzvah as a teenager. My formal Jewish education ended after seventh grade.

Fast forward to my college years at Binghamton University where I met and fell in love with Dave. By the time we both graduated, we realized we had each found "the one". As we seriously considered marriage, we discussed religion. Marrying someone Catholic was never a concern to me, but it was vitally important to me to raise our children as Jews. At one point Dave and I met with a conservative Rabbi who looked me in the eye and told me that a good Jew does not marry out of the faith. We also met with a young Priest who was new to Dave's church. Thankfully that Priest was more supportive of our marriage, and he remains a friend to this day.

Dave and I were married in 1985 while we were in graduate school. A Rabbi and a Priest performed our ceremony combining the most beautiful aspects of each religion. It may sound strange to those not in an interfaith marriage, but marrying Dave made me a better, more committed Jew. Why? It didn't seem fair to so fervently insist upon raising children Jewish if we were not going to be active and engaged members of a temple.

Positions with IBM brought us to Westchester and we settled in White Plains. We joined Kol Ami in 1994 thanks to Bonnie

Eilen, my doctor and friend, and John Laemle, an IBM colleague and neighbor. When we first started attending services, we joined the Lift on Saturday mornings as that time worked best for our family. In fact, we so enjoyed the Lift service that for my 40th birthday, I celebrated my bat mitzvah with the Lift service with Rabbi Shira's help and support.

We have been blessed with two children, Sarah and Robby, who are Jewish and are very much a part of the Kol Ami family. We have also been blessed with wonderful extended family all of whom embrace our blended family.

Five years ago Dave and I renewed our wedding vows. Both Rabbi Tom and our friend, Father Paul, joined us to share blessings. Both signed our wedding ketubah, definitely a first for Father Paul. We continue to blend religion with every aspect of our life as I now work at Kol Ami and Dave now teaches at The Ursuline School, a girl's Catholic school.

When Sarah and Robby were young and attending religious school I was asked to join the Religious School Committee. Participation on the committee led to co-chairing the committee. I then became a Trustee on the Kol Ami Board and ultimately an Executive Officer on the Board. 
