Weekly Torah Portions for November

Week ending November 2, 2013 Parashat Toldot Genesis 25:19-28:9

Isaac marries Rebekah, and after 20 childless years they become parents to twin boys, Esau and Jacob. The brothers are quite different from one another and are at odds with each other well into adulthood. Rebekah favors Jacob, whereas Isaac seems aligned with Esau. Rebekah and Jacob conspire to deceive Isaac into giving the blessing due his firstborn son, Esau to Jacob. The sibling rivalry between Esau and Jacob reaches a feverish pitch, and becomes a recurring theme in Genesis.

Week ending November 9, 2013 Parashat Vayetze Genesis 28:10-32:3

Vayetze, "and he went out," refers to Jacob's journey to Haran, his mother Rebekah's birthplace. On his journey, he dreams of a ladder reaching from earth to heaven and is given the same promise that God gave Abraham and Isaac, i.e., that he will inherit the land and be blessed. Jacob meets Rachel at the well and works for her father (his uncle Laban) for seven years in order to marry her. Jacob, who deceived his brother Esau, is himself the victim of deception. Laban substitutes Leah (his older daughter) for Rachel. Jacob must serve Laban an additional seven years in order to wed his intended spouse. Jacob eventually has a total of twelve sons and decides to return to his homeland.

Week ending November 16, 2013 Parashat Vayishlach Genesis 32:4-36:43

Jacob is ready to go home after fleeing twenty years earlier, and has to reconcile with his brother Esau. He has a dream on the way and encounters a divine messenger. Jacob is renamed Israel, meaning "struggles with God." Our narrative leaps forward in time to the moment when Jacob's children are now adults and his daughter, Dina is raped. Jacob's sons Simeon and Levi avenge the crime.

Week ending November 23, 2013 Parashat Vayeshev Genesis 37:1-40:23

Vayeshev begins the final extended narrative of Genesis, the Joseph story. The Joseph story functions as a bridge between B'reishit (Genesis) and Sh'mot (Exodus) in that Joseph, his brothers, and eventually his father begin in Canaan but end up in Egypt. The parashah weaves together the themes of family and betraval so evident in the early stories of Genesis with the larger national themes of suffering and redemption that form the backbone of Exodus.

Week ending November 30, 2013 Parashat Miketz Genesis 41:1-44:17

This week's parashah continues the story of Joseph, miketz, "at the end of" his prison term. Joseph has been Pharaoh's prisoner for two years, and is released from jail in order to interpret Pharaoh's perplexing dreams.

Biennial – Don't Miss It!

The New York Times recently reviewed a research study entitled "A Portrait of Jewish Americans." The NY Times summed it up as follows: "A significant rise in those who are not religious, marry outside the faith and are not raising their children Jewish."

This study leads us to believe that we are in a very bad place. This study is thorough in its research and opens itself to interpretation from many different angles. The study is lauded by some as being accurate in all of its shades of American culture and criticized by some as being completely untrue. One might feel very depressed about the future of American Jewry after reading the study.

There are, however, bright spots in American Jewry. One is the URJ Biennial scheduled on Dec. 11-15 in San Diego, California. For those who have never attended, it may not be on the top of your vacation list but attending Biennial is a fantastic experience for any liberal Jew. As the URJ indicates: "Biennial is where Jews gather to learn, pray, share ideas, dance and sing, hear from inspiring guest speakers, reunite with old friends, make new connections and re-imagine Jewish life."

Imagine 5000 rabbis, cantors, educators, lay leaders, musicians—all coming together for several days of explosive Jewish learning and creating. I find Biennial to be extraordinarily engaging for youth group kids, retirees and everyone in-between. Imagine our High Holy Day services and multiply that by a factor of 5 or 6 and you would have a glimpse into what it is like to pray with 5000 Jews. In addition to thematic meals, phenomenal concerts and inspiring keynote speakers, there are several workshops that are places of entry for anyone who has any interest in Judaism. The keynote speaker this year is Prime Minister Netanyahu.

If you are a music lover then Biennial is an opportunity to pray and listen to the likes of Neshama Carlebach, and Rick Recht as well as bands like Jaffa Road and Rocky Mountain Jew Grass. Genres are blended, melodies are revealed and Jewish music is the connecting thread through all of the services and con-



certs and many of the luncheons, which are themselves concerts. This year our own Jonathan Comisar was commissioned to compose a piece dedicated to the Cantorate and performed by hundreds of voices.

It is my hope that, if you are on the fence, you would go to the URJ website: www.URJ.org and check out the different options for Biennial programming. Please come talk to me, Tom or Shira or any of our lay leaders who have attended. Attending Biennial is a true opportunity to connect to one's spirit and to feel the dynamic pulse of Reform Judaism. I hope to see you there!

Words Seem So Inadequate— Our Journey to Krakow and Berlin



R eb Nachman of Bratislav wrote that a person reaches in three directions: upward to God, outward to others, and inward to oneself. The miracle of life, he said, is than in truly reaching in any one direction, we touch all three.

That's what this trip was like; we traveled outward to amazing, horrifying, moving, and stunning places. We took care of each other—listening, supporting, laughing. We prayed and we sang—we turned upward for hope. And for each of us, this trip deepened our journey inward to understand why we are here on earth. It was truly one of the great trips.

From Frank Kaiman: Wednesday: Going first to Auschwitz-Berkinau. It was hard to imagine the pain and inhumanity that was suffered, and even harder to understand how people could inflict it. But I felt that I was now a witness and that is important to me. Saying Kaddish at the literal end of the line was so meaningful. From the low of the camp to the high of visiting a synagogue in the neighboring village of Osweicim which I support and where we read from the Torah –a reaffirmation that we are and we exist despite what happened. So tremendously uplifting. It was so incredible to experience such diametrically opposed feelings in the same day.

Note from Frank to Shira: People have asked me how was my "vacation." I tell them that it was no vacation but the trip was "awesome" in the full sense of the word "awe." I can't thank you enough for leading this trip. It will remain with me for the rest of my life.

From Ruth Goldberg: I only cried twice on my visit to Birkenau. The first time was tears of joy and pride. Waves of young Israeli students, perhaps of high school age, were marching with Israeli flags blowing in the wind. Hundreds of them. Some were approaching us on the long road which would take us to the barracks. Some were walking back along the railroad tracks that brought so many to their last destination. The day was sunny but very cold. As the flags cracked and whipped in the wind, the blue star of David unfurled on its white banner.



This was our new generation; young, high spirited, beautiful. The moment made me think of the Partisan song:

Never, ever say that you are taking the last steps of your journey,

Just because steel gray skies are hiding bright, blue days. Because the hour that we are hoping for, will arrive. And our footsteps, like loud drumbeats, will declare: We have survived. We are here.

The second time I cried that day was in one of the barracks. There was a display of children's clothing. Little girls' clothing. There was a pink sweater. Perhaps for a child 2 years of age. There were little shoes. Someone had left a pink rose on this display case. That's what made me cry. Who was the person who left the rose? It might have been placed there that day. It was wilted, but not dead. What story could she have told me? Did the little sweater remind her of a sister taken at such a young age? Or was it the mother she was thinking of? The terror she must have felt as her child was wrenched from her arms. One story. A story told over and over again, 6 million times.



From Vicki Horowitz: Rabbi Shira has asked each of us to write one memory of the trip to share with the congregation of Kol Ami in the Connection. All of a sudden, it came to me: At Shabbat services (October 11, 2013) on my first night back at Kol Ami, as the congregation began to sing *Ki Mitzion*



with Cantor Mo and Rabbi Tom when we were about to take the Torah out of the ark. I remembered that the last time I sang this was in a small building in the town of Oswiecim (known as Auschwitz, in German). This small building now acts partly as a Jewish museum, partly as a center and partly as the remainder of a synagogue. We entered the building just after having spent several hours at both Auschwitz and Birkenau concentration camps. When we passed into a small room with benches and an ark, we asked a young man if we could take out the Torah and look at it. He was a young student from Austria who had chosen to do his "community service" in this place. Frank Kaiman took out the Torah and we all sang Ki Mitzion as Rabbi Shira and Ellen Kurtz began to take off the covering. The young student said that no one had read from the Torah for a very long time. We expected that we would have to roll it a great deal to find our way to this week's Torah portion.




However, much to our surprise, it was already rolled to NOAH, the "parshah" for this week. We all wondered how that could be that it was rolled to the exact place. It was as if this Torah was waiting for someone—maybe for us—to chant the words or read the text for this upcoming Shabbat. We all sang. Rabbi Shira chanted and for a few minutes we celebrated this "abandoned" Torah for all those who could no longer read or chant – all those who had been murdered at the two camps we had visited that day. Through my tears and through these melodies, I was proud to sing and witness this moment with my fellow travelers from Kol Ami.



From Ellen Bittner: I have been home nearly a week and I

am still processing the numerous sights and experiences that we encountered during our trip to Poland and Berlin. As I began to process our visits to Auschwitz/Birkenau, Wansee, and Track 17 (one of the points of deportation to the camps) where we saw evidence of the horrors that were perpetrated, I was very heartened and gratified to see the young people from Poland, Austria, and Germany who were visiting these sights or working as volunteers at Jewish memorials. I also think of the wonderful 92 year old woman we met, whose family is among the Righteous Gentiles who fed and helped to hide dozens of Jews, saving so many lives. Stories like hers and others we heard about during our trip deepened my faith in the good in people, and in the strength of the human spirit to survive. The Israeli students that I saw when we visited Mila 18 in Warsaw. and those leaving Auschwitz carrying the Israeli flag high, reaffirm that we are here and that "Am Israel chai."



Ritual Riches: Shabbat Services in Berlin!

That's correct. Eighteen travelers along with Rabbi Shira celebrated Shabbat in Berlin. I'm sure not a place any of us ever thought we would be spending Shabbat, yet there we were, attending Kabbalat Shabbat services at the Jewish Community Center of Berlin. (The synagogue is under renovation.)

As we were waiting to go through security (xray, bags/backpacks searched), what struck me were the diverse ages of people coming to services. To accommodate Jews of all denominations, men and women sit separately, but in the same room with no *Mechitza* (barrier).

As soon as we entered the room that served as the sanctuary, I was immediately taken back to my childhood with the sound of the cantor singing the *L'Cha Dodi* of my youth. The service was conducted in the traditional Reform German Jewish manner. The entire service was sung in Hebrew led by the cantor, who wore a black robe and miter (tall round hat) and choir accompanied by organ music. To most of us, the music (tune and organ) was not familiar, but the prayers were: *L'Cha Dodi*,

Barachu, Sh'ma, Mi Chamocha, Amida, Aleinu, Kaddish—the prayers we recite at Kol Ami, the prayers Jews recite all over the world! The only German spoken was when the cantor asked a young family to come to the bimah for *Kiddush, Motzi* and a blessing. This is the custom at the JCC of Berlin.

Following the service, we were greeted Shabbat Shalom by the cantor (an American) and, just like we do at Kol Ami, some people lingered to socialize and catch up and others quickly left, probably to go home for dinner or out with friends. Having spent the prior five days in Poland learning about the life, murder and potential destruction of European Jewry, it was a bittersweet yet triumphant Shabbat. Standing to recite Kaddish had even greater meaning after having been to Auschwitz and Birkenau. But, there we were, 200 Jews celebrating Shabbat—Shabbat in Berlin!!

From Our President

This time of the year always seems to me to be a time of moving from one place to another. We just finished another cycle of the Days of Awe and are now full into the fall season with the winter holidays just around the corner. As I mentioned in last month's *Connection* article, we, as a congregation, were extremely generous this year as it relates to donations of food (4000 pounds this year compared to 2770 pounds last year) and signing up for the Gift of Life Bone Marrow Registry (over 150 people were added to the list). These are two excellent examples of how our congregation engages in *tikkun olam*, healing the world, on an outwardly focused basis.

Yet, when the focus turns inward, we seem to stop short of fulfilling our needs. I recognize that the cost of belonging to any temple in Westchester is not an inexpensive proposition. Many of us look at our dues and say "that's enough for what I get out of it." But that attitude turns Kol Ami into a "fee for service" establishment when, in reality, it's so much more. If we continue to view our obligations as limited to the payment of our dues, we will continue to fall short of addressing the on-going financial needs of an institution with a mostly fixed expense base and an aging infrastructure.

While we would like to think that there are myriad ways to address our financial needs, such as cutting costs, the reality is quite different. The vast majority of our expense budget is either fixed by contract or law, with salaries making up the bulk of these costs. We constantly challenge and encourage the staff to find ways to "do more with less", but the impact of these savings, while important, is minimal.

At the same time that our expense side is fairly inelastic, there is downward pressure on our revenues, as the percentage of our membership which is on some form of dues relief has continued to grow. Currently, approximately 26% of our total member units are on dues relief. Conversely, only about 9% of our member units have generously agreed to pay dues at one of our Premium Dues levels.

There are even more urgent needs when we consider our capital budget. As many of you know, last year we had to take steps to address the ceilings in many of our classrooms. This, along with the on-going tuckpointing needs for the exterior of the building, depleted our capital reserves. The small amount we will receive from this year's Building Fund will do little to alleviate this problem. So, how can we address these issues? First, under the leadership of Jess Lorden, one of our Vice Presidents, we have convened a Members Financial Commitment Task Force to examine every way that our members interact with the temple on a financial basis. This Task Force will be looking for ways to make our giving more effective and consistent with the needs of our members. Second, we are encouraging all who



can afford to do so to contribute at one of our several Premium Dues levels. Besides the benefits of knowing that you are supporting those in need, there are tangible benefits for every Premium Dues payer, such as dinner(s) at Synaplex, extra High Holy Day tickets, house charge accounts, and access to Premium Dues payer events.

And, third, and most directly, our Annual Fund is, as its name implies, an ongoing year-round initiative. The Annual Fund is essential to ensuring that our budget is balanced. Listed below are those members who have already contributed, and we are so thankful for your generosity. While our total contributions of \$108,000 are more than we received as of this time last year, those funds were donated by fewer congregants than last year. And we are still far short of our budgeted goal of \$150,000. We have increased our participation over the past few years, but, in the end, we still only receive contributions from approximately 22% of the total member units. If those who haven't contributed were to donate chai (\$18), that would result in an increase of over \$10,000! If you haven't yet been able to contribute, we hope that you will be able to do so before the end of the year.

As we move along in the calendar towards the fall and winter holidays, I urge you to continue the acts of generosity that we saw at the High Holy Days and to turn that focus inward. We are blessed with such a caring community. It is my hope that we can find ways to meet the financial needs of our congregation so that we can continue to meet all of the needs of our congregants.




This November, unlike any other again in history, we will mark the month of Kislev. We will share the holiday of Thanksgiving with the lighting of Hanukkah candles. Kislev brings us the mystery of the

rainbow. The sign for Kislev is the bow (keshet), an appropriate sign for a month in the rainy season (in Israel). In the Torah, the Holy One offers the rainbow to Noah as a sign that the world will never again be destroyed by flood. The rainbow, light reflected through water droplets, is a sign of the fire concealed in the moisture of winter and a promise of God's compassion toward human beings. In the Zohar, the rainbow is a manifestation of the immanence of the Divine. The Zohar (somewhat unreasonably) asks us not to look at a rainbow out of respect for the Shekhinah, whose radiance appears in its colors. The rainbow is a glimpse of sacred mystery. By looking at it, we catch a glimpse of the radiance at the root of existence. Kisley, the Month of the Bow, is also a month to pursue gevurah (justice), for equity, like the rainbow, is a reflection of the Shekhinah. Hanukkah, the upcoming holiday, teaches the importance of defending freedom. The bow of Kislev is a reminder to be vigilant against those who seek to harm the world and its inhabitants. (taken from The Month of the Rainbow, The Jewish Book of Days by Jill Hammer)

At this time of year, it feels appropriate to express my gratitude to all of you. We truly have a special community, and we continue to work to build a wonderful place for all of us to learn together. I am so grateful to be a part of all that Kol Ami represents. I am grateful to work with such smart, dedicated, sensitive and supportive people. I am grateful for my loving family and friends. There is incredible power in this feeling of gratitude. From this, comes the desire to give.
