It is a long standing tradition to visit the graves of a loved one as part of our season of High Holy Days. Many find that the reconnection with the memory of those they loved can be intensely meaningful, especially around this time of year. As part of our preparation for these Days of Awe, we will hold two brief memorial services on Sunday, September 25th at:

- Mount Hope Cemetery, Hastings-On-Hudson, section 4 at 10:00am, and
- Sharon Gardens, Valhalla, please meet at the main office at 11:45am.

Even if you do not have family members buried in either cemetery, please join us.

Guest Tickets

- We welcome guests of your family to worship with us. To order your guest tickets please fill out the enclosed form and return it to the Temple Office no later than September 16, 2016. Checks payable to Congregation Kol Ami <u>must</u> accompany your request for guest tickets.
- Kol Ami honors the URJ reciprocal guest policy, but please be sure to submit your forms no later than September 16th to allow time for processing. Please list the names of relatives who will be sending us reciprocal forms on your ticket request form.

The High Holy Days and Your Children at Congregation Kol Ami

At Kol Ami, we would like your family to be able to worship together and enjoy age-appropriate prayer. Accordingly, we offer many different formats for prayer on the High Holy Days. All children are welcome to accompany you to adult Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur Services but they will require tickets. Please use the information below to help you make the best choices for your children's participation. Services will be shown on closed circuit television in the Gallery if your child is not able to participate in our main sanctuary services.

Family Service

Family Service (3:15 to 4:00 PM) offers parents and children of all ages an opportunity to participate in High Holy Days worship together. We keep the service short enough so that it is appropriate for young children. At the same time, we include enough of the traditional liturgy and observance to provide a meaningful Jewish spiritual experience for adults and their children. This service does not require tickets.

High Holy Days Youth Services

High Holy Days Youth Services this year will be available for two different groups of students: students in grades K-3 and students in grades 4-6 which will coincide with our Adult Morning Services on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Our Youth Services create dynamic, meaningful and age-appropriate holiday experiences for our students. While we appreciate that students may want to dress up for the holiday, we ask that students also bring a large T-shirt or smock to cover their clothes in case they get messy. Services will be led by our most creative Religious School staff with participation by our Rabbis.

Please note that students not attending one of the special services for their age groups are encouraged to worship with their families.



Infrared Listening Devices

If a member or guest requires an Infrared Listening Device, they may be picked up at the door prior to the service.

Atmosphere

As the sanctuary is a place of prayer and meditation during the High Holy Days, we ask that families respect the mood of spirituality and dignity at all times. Kindly refrain from conversation during the course of worship. Families are asked to be responsible for their children's behavior throughout the services. Unless you are a First Responder, please turn off your cell phone before entering the sanctuary.

Child Care

Our Child Care includes meaningful holiday crafts, stories, and music. Child care is not recommended for children under the age of 3. Child Care will be provided for a fee during our Erev Rosh Hashanah Service, our Yom Kippur Early Evening Service and both of our Morning Services. Babysitting is not available on the Second Day of Rosh Hashanah.

In order that we may provide a sufficient number of babysitters, a safe environment, and a wonderful experience for your child, reservations must be made before September 16th. Please complete the Child Care form, that was included in the HHD packet, and return to the Temple Office. Payment must be received no later than September 16th.

Memorial Book & Yahrzeit Memorial Plaques

If you would like to list your loved ones in our Memorial Book or on our Yahrzeit wall, please fill out the Memorial Book & Plaque form, that was included in the HHD packet, and **return to the Temple Office no later than September 16th.**

Financial Obligations

In order for your High Holy Days tickets to be processed, payment of at least half of current dues, the Building Fund, if applicable, all Religious School fees and full payment of outstanding balances from prior years (or an up-to-date arrangement on file) are required. Tickets will be mailed in mid-September provided all financial obligations are satisfied.

High Holy Days Food Drive Sponsored by Women of Reform Judaism

Bags will be handed out Rosh Hashanah. Please Return them filled on Yom Kippur. Nonperishable food items only. Please - no glass containers. Remember the hungry at this time of year.

WEEKLY TORAH PORTIONS FOR SEPTEMBER

Week ending September 3, 2016 Parashat R'eih Deuteronomy 11:26-16:17

In this week's *parashah*, the people are instructed on how they are to enter and live in the land, and on the behavior expected of them once they have settled there. Rules about sacrifices, tithes, and care for the Levites are discussed, along with regulations for slaughtering and eating meat.

Week ending September 10, 2016 Parashat Shoftim Deuteronomy16:18-21:9

The Israelites remain on the plateau of Moab, across the Jordan River while Moses communicates God's prescriptions and proscriptions for governance. The *parashah* opens with the command to appoint judges and the regulations for choosing a leader, including a warning that this leader should follow the laws of Torah faithfully.

Week ending September 17, 2016 Parashat Ki'Teitze Deuteronomy 21:10-25:19

Parashat Ki'Teitzei contains the greatest number of *mitzvot* of any single Torah portion, 72 in all, dealing with diverse subjects. The portion concludes with a warning to remember how the Amalekites attacked the weary Israelites in the desert.

Week ending September 24, 2016 Parashat Ki Tavo Deuteronomy 26:1-29:8

Ki Tavo addresses the time when the Israelites will settle in the Land of Israel. The Israelites are instructed to express their gratitude to God for their bountiful harvests and freedom from slavery by tithing ten percent of their crops for the Levite, the stranger, the orphan, and the widow. They are also told that if they obey God's mitzvot faithfully, they will receive every blessing imaginable; and if they do not fulfill their brit with God, many curses will descend upon them.



An exciting new element at the heart of our High Holy Day services will be our new prayer book, *Mishkan Hanefesh* (Sanctuary of the Soul). This is the first entirely new High Holy Day *Machzor* created for our Synagogue since the mid-1970s; and it is brilliant, innovative, and grounded firmly in our most cherished traditions and music. We are confident it will profoundly elevate the experience of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur as we welcome in the year 5777.

We have a unique opportunity for *every family* to participate in the new High Holy Day prayer book initiative. How nice it would be for you and your family to sit in temple on the High Holy Days and open a prayer book to see heart-felt dedications!

The new books come in a set – one for Rosh Hashanah and another for Yom Kippur. Through a generous gift from Past President Lisa Borowitz, in memory and honor of her beloved father, Rabbi Eugene B. Borowitz z'l, we have been able to purchase about half of the 1,500 sets of books that we will need. *We would like to honor this generous donation and work together as a community to make it a gift we all support.* We ask that every family participate by purchasing one or more sets of new prayer books into which heart-felt dedication 'bookplates' will be placed.

Because we hope that everyone will be able to participate in bringing these new prayer books to our community, we have created several options for you and your family:

- ❖ For every donation of \$36, a bookplate placed into one book
- ❖ For every donation of \$54, bookplates placed into a set of books (2 book dedications)
- ❖ For every donation of \$180, bookplates placed into four sets of books (8 book dedications)

RABBI SHIRA MILGROM



I could make out the "Hebrew Union College - Congregation Kol Ami" - but I had to trust our Indonesian hosts about the rest. David and I had been invited to speak in Yogyakarta -David about community organizing and advocacy, me about Judaism. We spoke at one of Yogyakarta's several Islamic universities. Indonesia is home to the world's largest Muslim

population, and to date is the only moderate and democratic Muslim government on the planet. But, like everywhere in the world, people there are worried about the rise of fundamentalist religion and the dangers of radicalization. A fledgling organization, the Gusderian Network of Indonesia, is dedicated to preserving Indonesia's commitment to a pluralist, tolerant and moderate Islam. They represent a network of 200+ small organizations throughout Indonesia. It was to representatives of this courageous group that we were speaking. We were forewarned: most Indonesians have never met a Jew. The only exposure they have of Jews and Judaism is the highly skewed (distorted) view of Israel they have through the negative lens of the media. The "conspiracy theory" (that Israel's Mossad is behind the operations of Al Queda, for instance) is rampant. And so the publicity announcing my session, I was told, did not mention that I am a rabbi, or that I was teaching about Judaism. It announced a session about the role of women and peace in the Abrahamic religions. But my task was to introduce Judaism to a group that had never met a Jew - and whose views were skeptical and suspicious at best. If you had two and a half hours to introduce a group like this to Judaism, what would you say? What would you teach? What Torah stories would you choose?

 I would be happy to share my choices with you - and to hear yours. For now, however, I would like to share with you some of their questions.

The first question: What do Jews think of Muslims? (They, too, are worried about how they are perceived in the world.)

- What do you think of Zionism? I answered, "I love Israel. It's a dream that I grew up with. Israel has done remarkable things in the world. Israel struggles like every country to find a balance between preserving its moral core and protecting itself in a hostile world." I also said that sometimes our hopes and dreams leave us disappointed and I left room to talk about heartbreak.
- The question that surprised me the most? One of the participants said, "I learned that Jews are the smartest people. What is your secret?" Okay! What would you say to that?? I used the opportunity to share one of my deepest beliefs. I said that we believe that every human being is created in the Divine Image (b'tzelem elohim), with a spark of the Divine and that each of us has a blessing to give to the world. Our gifts to the world are unique and different: some of us are scientists, find cures for diseases, are authors, poets or musicians, teachers, parents. Whatever our gifts, we must nurture the divine spark within and pass it on. And, I added, a good heart is just as important as being smart indeed, more important.

Sometimes the words of Kohellet (Ecclesiastes) feel like this:

"To everything there is a

season:

- ♦ A time for dying
- A time for uprooting
- A time for slaying
- ♦ A time for tearing down
- ♦ A time for weeping
- ♦ A time for throwing stones
- A time for war
- A time for hating"

I went away for a couple of weeks on vacation. Spent some time in England. You know what the best part of it was? Being away from our 24 hour news cycle. My blood pressure actually went down. Actually, my timing was perfect because I was away for both of the presidential conventions. But of course, there is no real escaping the real world, because I was here for the terrorist attacks here and abroad, the mass murders, the shootings by police and of police.

I thought I'd offer a couple of words of perspective for these tough times. For those of us who have been around for a couple of generations, and therefore lots of presidential seasons, cycles of terrorism and tough economic times, we have been blessed with a bit of the wisdom that can come from time and the observation of cycles.

If you are young, that wisdom of time is harder to come by, obviously. So we listen to kids of 10, youth of 18, young people of 25 years old, and as they look around, and at their own short history, it may well feel to them as if there is only one kind of season:

- A time for dying
- A time for uprooting
- A time for slaying
- ♦ A time for tearing down
- ♦ A time for weeping
- ♦ A time for throwing stones
- ♦ A time for war
- A time for hating

But guess what, each of those come hand in hand with it's uplifting partner. So if you live in the orbit of someone who is young, its' your loving responsibility to remind them that Kohellet wrote and also taught that there was:

- A time for new life
- ♦ A time for healing
- A time for building up
- ♦ A time for laughing
- A time to dance
- A time to hug
- A time to love
- ♦ And a time for peace

After all, there are those of us here who remember the peace at the end of a world war; that as well as the bloody riots of the summer of 1968 there was the summer of love; and we remember the Camp David Accords signed when Sadat and Begin, Egyptian and Israeli, actually shook hands; some of us remember times of real economic growth and the solid opportunity that came along and lasted; we've seen Germany, England, Japan, Viet Nam, heal, rebuild and thrive; we've seen incurable diseases . . . cured. We've lost love . . . and found new love; and we've lost jobs, and found new ones.

Share that news. Share that wisdom. Share the other half of Kohellet's verses!

Now I know, these times of suffering are quite real, and that this election is the most important one of our life times (as was the last one and as the next one will surely be); and there is war, and pain and terror.

So please remind those dear to you, especially the young without those memories, that, again and forever, the pendulum will swing and there will be:

- ♦ the new life
- ♦ the healing
- the building up
- the laughing
- the dancing, loving and hugging, and the peace

A sweet and healing 5777 to you all!

Yizkor and Tzedakah--Are they Related?

Growing up in Toronto and not belonging to a synagogue until my mid -teens, I had the opportunity to attend various synagogues for the High Holy Days.

While there were many differences between the venues and services, there was one tradition consistent among the various congregations, that I found rather disturbing. Yes... that little card stuffed into the High Holy Day Prayer Book that asked me to make some type of extra financial contribution to the synagogue.

Perhaps this has never bothered you, but I have to admit that I was somewhat irritated that there was an additional plea for a donation on what are supposed to be some of the holiest days of the year. We pay our dues, we contribute our time when we can, but why must the High Holidays be a time where we are asked to give tzedakah?

While there are certainly operational budget reasons for the request, I would like to draw your attention to another compelling reason founded in our deepest traditions.

As it turns out, the request for giving Tzedakah is found in our Yizkor prayer, the prayer for remembering our loved ones. Perhaps you have noticed it, but have decided to overlook it seeing as giving money is the last thing on your mind when you are remembering and reciting a memorial prayer on behalf of a spouse, parent, sibling or other close relative. And yet, our tradition teaches us that giving Tzedakah at this tender moment is one of the most appropriate things we can do to remember a loved one. By giving Tzedakah, we are completing an act of kindness; something that the departed can no longer do in the physical world. In essence, we are acting on their behalf to perform acts of love and kindness also known as "Gimilut Hasadim." Our sages further teach us that by connecting the memory of the departed with a mitzvah such as Tzedakah, we are in essence elevating the soul of the departed, as well as making us more righteous people in our community and in the eyes of God.

By pledging our contribution around the time of the Yizkor service, we are taught that not only do we remember our loved ones, but also we ensure that we will not forget to perform this sacred act of generosity and kindness on their behalf.

Our congregation can benefit from your acts of generosity on behalf of the ones that you cared for most deeply. No amount is too little. Imagine the impact we could have on the future of our congregation, if everyone who was remembering a loved one performed this small act of kindness?

Fortunately, there are many opportunities and reasons to "give" to our community this year. From our new High Holy Day Prayer Books to the many programs and services our congregation provides, there are many ways to act on behalf of your loved one who can no longer give.

"Yizkor" means to remember. Let us not forget this congregation, the building and the community that help to sustain and nourish us spiritually and allow us a sacred space to remember our loved ones. Let us ensure that this k'hila k'dosha (holy congregation) will be here for many generations after we are gone, so that our relatives have a place to remember us and to perform acts of loving kindness on our behalf.


The Religious School is partnering with the ECP in a FALL FLOWER SALE!

NEW EREV ROSH HASHANAH SERVICE – PRAYING TOGETHER AS ONE COMMUNITY:

Please remember that we are presenting a new opportunity to pray together as a community this year. Our congregants and guests will worship together as one at our early Erev Rosh Hashanah service which will start at 7:30 PM. Following services, we will have a Community Potluck Oneg, in which members are encouraged to share their favorite dessert. We invite you to linger and visit with our Temple family at this time.

LIVE STREAMING OUR SERVICES: We will be live streaming our services so that members who

are not able to attend services in person are nonetheless able to participate. We will be streaming the following High Holy Day services: Erev Rosh Hashanah, Rosh Hashanah Day Early Service, Yom Kippur Kol Nidre Early Service, and Yom Kippur Day Early Service. Details and passwords will be provided in advance of the services.

TICKETS: New this year, only two ticket formats will be printed – one for members and one for guests. These tickets are color-coded and not transferable. For each service you attend, please show your tickets to an usher.

USHERS: Please keep in mind that our ushers are Kol Ami members who give their time to ensure that our services proceed smoothly. Do treat them with courtesy and respect. Either llene or I will be available during every service. If a problem arises, please ask for our assistance.

PHYSICALLY CHALLENGED MEMBERS AND

GUESTS: In considering your needs, we encourage you to attend the early services. Since there is not a preceding service, you may arrive earlier and face less congestion and easier access to handicapped parking spaces. All entry to the sanctuary will be through the front door. No one will be admitted through the Religious School entrance.

GUEST TICKETS: Guest tickets are available for immediate family members (parent, sibling, child) not residing in your home and for your out-of-town guests. See Reciprocity sidebar for guest arrangements.

CHILD CARE: Child Care will be available at Early Evening Services on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur and at both Morning Services.

Reservations must be made in advance by calling the Temple office or submitting a Child Care form. **MEMORIAL AND NEILAH SERVICES**: Because the Family Service takes place in the main sanctuary immediately prior to the Memorial and Neilah Services, we need at least thirty minutes to reset the sanctuary for these concluding services. If you are planning to attend the Memorial and Neilah Services, please do not arrive prior to 4:30 PM. Our ushers have been instructed not to open the doors until such time.

CELL PHONES: All cell phones should be left at home or in your car. If you are required to carry a phone or pager, please set it on vibrate mode.

A Message From Our President

Change. It's a word and concept that shakes people to their core. It's easy to say that "change is hard" and that "change is inevitable", but the simple truth is that change is hard and it is also inevitable. As much as we think that some things and places don't change, the reality is generally far different. For instance, the music that we sing seems to have been part of our Reform

liturgy since before we were all born. Yet, the reality is that many of the songs that we sing have been arranged in only the last few decades, some just in the last few years. It just seems that the music hasn't changed because we've become so used to it and it's become part of our spiritual lives. We are fortunate to have several significant changes as we embark on another programming year and as we prepare for the upcoming High Holy Days (yes, they're not that far away). The first is the revamped and now digital phone book. We have all gotten used to the small spiral bound book and it's been a familiar aid as we stay in touch with others in our community. But, if you happen to still have an older book, take a look at the differences and you'll see some of the major changes. For instance, it's only been in the last few years that we've added e-mail addresses, which, I think we'd all agree, is a huge benefit, given how we communicate today. The new digital phone book provides so many improvements over the current version - it's accessible on any device wherever you are; you can jump to an advertiser's webpage from a link in their ad; you can open directions to another congregant's home from their address listing; you can see pictures of other congregants so that we get to know each other even better; and you can create a group so that you can communicate with others who have a common interest or task (such as carpooling for Religious School). And if you still want a hard copy (and I know that I will print at least one for my use), you can easily do so. If you don't have access to a computer or aren't comfortable printing it, please contact the office and we'll make one available for you.

For those of you who come on Erev Rosh Hashanah, you've noticed that the sanctuary (as extended) is not even close to full. Many families take that night to have a family dinner or dinner with friends. So, this year, we are combining the two Erev services into just one that will start at 7:30. This way, you can still have an early dinner and make it to services and it won't end so late that it's too late for families with children. But, if you are one of those who gather with family and friends and it's still not conceivable for you to make it to services, we're making it easy for you to still participate. First of all, we will be streaming our Erev Rosh Hashanah services so that you can watch the services from the comfort of your (or your relative's or friend's) home. Second, our clergy are putting together some materials to help you celebrate Rosh Hashanah wherever you choose to worship that will include blessings, prayers and reflections, and links to a few videos. More information will be coming in mid-September.

Maybe the biggest change is the introduction of the new High Holy Day machzor, Mishkan Hanefesh (Sanctuary of the Soul). This two volume set is a wonderful reimaging of our High Holy Day liturgy with language that speaks to the modern soul. While this change could be unsettling, there will be a familiarity to these books that should be both comforting and readily apparent – the books' structure is similar to our very own Shabbat *siddur*. That is, the main text is interspersed with complementary readings many of which will speak to you in ways that our liturgy normally may not. We are able to bring these new books to Kol Ami through the generosity of our members, but it was a generous donation by one of our Past Presidents, Lisa Borowitz (in memory of her beloved father) that enabled us to make the commitment to purchase the over 1,500 sets that we need. There is still an opportunity for all of you to purchase a dedication of a (or multiple) set(s) so that you can honor someone, remember a wedding or b'nai mitzvah or memorialize a loved one. Each dedication will enable you to place a bookplate in a set of (or a single) book(s) that will live on for generations to come – L'Dor va Dor.

Jean and I look forward to seeing all of you over the High Holy Days as we worship together. L'shanah tovah – may it be a good year – a sweet year – for us all.

- it's time to Wake Up!!

Elul is the last month of the Hebrew year, and the month that precedes the High Holidays. This year, Elul begins at sundown on Saturday, September 3rd. Traditionally, it is a time of study and personal reflection on our actions of the past year. It is also a time when we seek forgiveness from those we have wronged or with whom we have otherwise "missed the mark" in our interactions and behaviors.

Some of the customs during the month of Elul that are designed to help us prepare ourselves and our souls for the upcoming High Holidays are described here:

- Selichot (penitential prayers) are often recited during the month of Elul as a means of reflecting on our own relationships and behavior. A special Selichot service takes place on the Saturday evening a week before Rosh Hashanah, Please join us at Kol Ami for the music and prayer of this holiday on Saturday, September 24th, 8:30PM.
- It is a long standing tradition to visit the graves of loved ones during the month of Elul. We remember and honor the memories of those who came before us; and are prompted to think about our own lives and the legacies we will leave to others. For those who would like to share this experience with members of the Kol Ami community, two brief memorial services will be conducted by members of our Worship Committee on Sunday, September

25th. The first service will be at the Kol Ami section of the Mount Hope Cemetery at 10 am, and the second will be held at Sharon Gardens at 3:30 pm (please meet at the main office of Sharon Gardens at 3:15 pm).

With the intent of awakening the soul and kick starting the spiritual accounting that happens throughout the month of *Elul*, another tradition during this month is listening to the blowing of the *shofar* each morning for the 29 days leading up to *Rosh Hashanah*. This year, Kol Ami will be sending a daily email with an inspirational message and a link where you can listen to the *shofar* blast. We hope you will find that these emails are moving and meaningful.

PREPARE YOUR HEART FOR THE HIGH HOLY DAYS

Jewish tradition invites us to hear the sound of the shofar each day of the month preceding Rosh Hashanah, the month of Elul. We hope you embrace the daily "wake up call" and the thoughtfully chosen words of contemplation for each of these days - a gift of spiritual connection.

"Jewish Journeys" will be expanding its horizons to include journeys of various types and destinations. No matter the journey-personal or professional, brief or in depth, spiritual or secular-travel of any kind enriches the mind, body and soul.

"Shabbat Services" by Susan Ross

In the past year, I have attended many Shabbat services but two services were especially memorable.

In one Shabbat service, a sermon highlighted a trip down the Nile River in Egypt. This moving sermon was a reminder that monuments may not always be the embodiment of the one's soul. We are.

We have survived, because we have held on to our traditions, prayers and dignity for thousands of years, while other civilizations have perished and are long forgotten.

In turn, the narration of a physical journey by one may inspire spiritual journeys for others, by a deeper understanding and appreciation of our past.

In another Shabbat service, the importance of accepting others on their own terms and the necessity of looking beyond

one's own misconceptions were emphasized in eloquent sermons. Acceptance should be on many levels-physical, emotional, spiritual, secular and political.

The clergy are advocates of truth and justice and champions in spreading theses ideas in sermons, in classes and with speakers. As citizens of a shared planet, we must learn to exist as humanly as possible and not falter in achieving these goals.

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
