Weekly Torah Portions for November

Week ending November 4, 2017 Parashat Vayera Genesis 18:1-22:24

Parashat Vayera opens with Abraham receiving a visit from messengers who bring predictions of Isaac's birth. Abraham stands up to God to protest the destruction of Sodom and Gomorrah when God threatens to destroy those settlements. Isaac is born and begins to grow. The final scene in this parashah tells the story of the "Binding of Isaac" where God tests Abraham, instructing him to sacrifice his son Isaac.

Week ending November 11, 2017 Parashat Chayei Sarah Genesis 23:1-25:18

The first words of this parashah translate as "the life of Sarah," but it begins with her death. Abraham purchases land in which to bury his wife, and then sends his servant to the village of his brother to acquire a wife for his son Isaac. The servant observes Rebekah, who offers water to him and to his camels to drink. Rebekah follows Abraham's servant back home and becomes Isaac's wife. Abraham dies at the age of 175 years, and Isaac and Ishmael bury him with Sarah in the cave of Machpelah.

Week ending November 18, 2017 Parashat Toldot Genesis 25:19-28:9

Isaac marries Rebekah, and after 20 childless years they become parents to twin boys, Esau and Jacob. The brothers are quite different from one another and are at odds with each other well into adulthood. Rebekah favors Jacob, whereas Isaac seems aligned with Esau. Rebekah and Jacob conspire to deceive Isaac into giving the blessing due his firstborn son, Esau to Jacob. The sibling rivalry between Esau and Jacob reaches a feverish pitch, and becomes a recurring theme in Genesis.

Week ending November 25, 2017 Parashat Vayetze Genesis 28:10-32:3

Vayetze, meaning "and he went out," refers to Jacob's journey to Haran, his mother Rebekah's birthplace, to escape his brother Esau's wrath. On his journey, he dreams of a ladder reaching from earth to heaven and is given the same promise that God gave Abraham and Isaac, i.e., that he will inherit the land and be blessed. Jacob meets Rachel at the well and works for her father (his uncle Laban) for seven years in order to marry her. Jacob, who deceived his brother Esau, is himself the victim of deception. Laban substitutes Leah (his older daughter) for Rachel. Jacob must serve Laban an additional seven years in order to wed his intended spouse Rachel. Jacob eventually has a total of twelve sons and decides to return to his homeland.

A Message from our Rabbi

Stone courtyards, late night drinks, cobblestone lanes, music and mystery, palaces and perfumed trees, mosques and cathedral bells. These are glimpses of nine glorious days we will have in Spain – March 5-14, 2018. Jews flourished in Spain under Muslim sovereignty in what would be remembered by Sephardic Jews as The Golden Age of Spain. More than 500 years since the expulsion of Jews (and Muslims) from Spain, Sephardic Jews continue to speak Ladino (the Spanish-Hebrew language of their communities) and sing Shabbat songs to

Spanish melodies. The tastes, rhythms, sounds and rituals of this richly beautiful culture continue to animate Jewish life today. But Christian Spain (following the edict of expulsion by Ferdinand and Isabella in 1492) did everything possible to eradicate any memory of its Jewish and Muslim past. Traveling as a Jew today in Spain is to feel both the power of that shadow and to peel back the layers of the Spanish Jewish story. This year, adult education is focused on the culture of the Jews of Spain – with music, scholars, poetry and kabbalah. You can find classes on Monday evenings, Tuesday evenings, scholars in residence and a music Synaplex showcasing this phenomenal tradition.

There are still spaces on our trip to Spain, and I would love you to join me. The beauty and layered secrets of Spain are like no other.

A Message from our Co-President

#bethelight

I am a reluctant user of social media. I begrudgingly joined Facebook three years ago because it was the only way I could view photos of my children at camp. I maintain accounts on other platforms so that I can get information I need and, of great importance in this new age of parenthood, monitor the online teen world of which my children are a part. I am intensely protective of my family's privacy. As a result, though I try to live my life with a healthy level of optimism, in the social media arena, where so many see open lines of communication and connection, I see a minefield. I don't post. I don't tweet. I don't publicly share.



But I am fascinated by the hashtag. The simple symbol that we use to call "pound" now is used as a modifier – to sum up a post, to identify with a person or cause, even to start a movement. Placed in front of a single word or a phrase, from the mundane to the most brilliantly witty, the hashtag has power. It can convey messages and connect people instantly, effectively, and forcefully.

So when it came time to find a name for our newly-forming social justice task force this past summer, it is not surprising that the inspiration came from a hashtag. It was critically important to me that the task force name be inspiring and broadly capture the range of responsibilities with which it would be charged: to act to promote and protect human rights, support congregants and those outside our community in the wake of distressing events, and to communicate and connect with those within and outside our congregation on social justice issues, to name a significant few. As I searched for the right words, I kept coming up empty.

... until one day, when I opened an email message from the Union for Reform Judaism ("URJ") in the immediate aftermath of the disturbing events of Charlottesville. The URJ's August 15th message provided a positive response to Charlottesville: "Our world is imperfect, so we respond with hope. Our world is full of darkness, so we respond with light." The email started with a simple hashtag: **#bethelight**

The phrase had a profound impact on me. The three short words simultaneously conveyed hope, power, understanding, and action. **Be. The. Light**.

With the URJ's permission, we adopted the hashtag, and Kol Ami's #bethelight initiative was born. Through our social justice work at Kol Ami, we strive to be the light for others in our congregation, in our neighboring communities, and throughout our country and world. I am deeply proud of the commitment our members have made year after year to better the lives of those in need. We are now poised to do more, to provide timely information on issues that affect our community and to provide support and effect change in our communities and beyond in areas of importance to us. Under the strong, passionate leadership of Ronnie Cohn and Lori Abrams, our #bethelight initiative is prepared to start identifying areas of focus and begin its important work.

As we embark on this journey, we want to hear from you. We will be holding our Informational Meeting on Thursday, November 16th from 7:00 – 8:00 pm in the Gallery. Please join us and share your ideas, the social justice issues you find most compelling, and/or ways in which you would like to be part of our social justice efforts. Together let us spread light where there is darkness.

A Message from our Executive Director

The Connection is introducing a new series of articles this year, giving our congregants an opportunity to honor the relationships that have influenced their "Jewish Journey". I am delighted to be the first to write and introduce you to my Nana, Ethel Chait, who had a profoundly positive effect on my Jewish journey. I was fortunate to be raised in a home with three generations of my family - my Nana, my parents, and my brothers and me. We belonged to a conservative temple,

where my grandparents and great grandparents were founding members. My Nana was a regular Shabbat worshipper and always proudly occupied her "assigned" seat. Although I didn't attend Shabbat services on a regular basis, when I went on holidays or Saturdays I often sat with Nana. I enjoyed listening to her pray and chatting with her friends, who year after year sat in the same section as she did. Nana always carried candies in her pocketbook, and at the end of services, I could count on Nana to share some of her candy, which were usually Mentos. To this day, I still love Mentos candy.

The United States Merchant Marine Academy is located in my hometown, and sometimes a cadet, dressed in a starched white uniform, attended our services. Whenever that happened, Nana was always the first person to offer the cadet a ride home. Thanks to Nana, one of those cadets became a lifelong family friend.

My family shared Shabbat dinner together on Friday nights, and often friends joined us. Nana made the chopped liver, gefilte fish, and matzoh ball soup for our holiday celebrations. She was also a wonderful baker - her specialties were hamantashen, ruggalech and sugar cookies. Passover was one of Nana's favorite holidays (it is also Dave's favorite Jewish holiday). She loved traditions and one of hers was saying "alivei" at the same places in the Seder each year. To honor Nana, we continue that tradition.

Nana often delighted us with stories of the "old" days - how her parents escaped from Russia, how she was raised in South Africa and then moved to the Bronx so Nana would have better marriage prospects, and ultimately how they moved to Great Neck. She also taught us to play her favorite card games, which I in turn taught to Sarah and Robby. Nana played mah jongg, which I learned to play this year. I am now the proud owner of Nana's mah jongg set. Nana volunteered in the gift shop at North Shore Hospital



on Thursday nights. Sometimes I went with her and she taught me how to wrap presents with tight corners and beautiful ribbon. When Nana's shift ended we always shared a Mentos and Nana often purchased a roll of Mentos to bring home for my Dad.

Nana loved family and enjoyed watching her family grow. I was the first grandchild to become married. When Nana was asked if it bothered her that I was marrying a non-Jew she honestly responded that she loved Dave and was happy I was marrying someone terrific. Nana was ahead of her time in so many ways.

I think of Nana often when there are exciting things going on in my life. When Dave and I were married, I carried a small family bible that my family brought from Russia. My great grandmother, my Nana, my Mom, and I carried that same bible at our weddings, and I look forward to offering it to Sarah when she becomes a bride. On the day before Robby celebrated becoming a bar mitzvah I thought about her. Just like Nana used to do, I organized the new outfit I was planning to wear. When I did so, I found that the security tag on the blazer hadn't been removed. Because I made this discovery on Friday, I had plenty of time to go back to the store to have the tag removed. I like to think that Nana was watching out for me that day.

I learned the importance of temple community, Jewish traditions and culture, volunteering, and opening up our home to others from my Nana. She died shortly before we joined Kol Ami - - I often

think about how much Nana would have loved our Friday night and Saturday morning Shabbat services and our amazing community.
