#### **Guest Tickets**

We welcome guests of your family to worship with us. To order your guest tickets please fill out the enclosed form and return it to the Temple Office. Checks payable to Congregation Kol Ami must accompany your request for guest tickets.

Kol Ami honors the URJ reciprocal guest policy, but please be sure to submit your forms no later than September 16th to allow time for processing. Please list the names of relatives who will be sending us reciprocal forms on your ticket request form.

#### The High Holy Days and Your Children at Congregation Kol Ami

At Kol Ami, we would like your family to be able to worship together and enjoy age-appropriate prayer. Accordingly, we offer many different formats for prayer on the High Holy Days. All children are welcome to accompany you to adult Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur Services but they will require tickets. Please use the information below to help you make the best choices for your children's participation. Services will be shown on closed circuit television in the Gallery if your child is not able to participate in our main sanctuary services.

#### **Family Service**

Family Service (3:15 to 4:00 PM) offers parents and children of all ages an opportunity to participate in High Holy Days worship together. We keep the service short enough so that it is appropriate for young children. At the same time, we include enough of the traditional liturgy and observance to provide a meaningful Jewish spiritual experience for adults and their children. This service does not require tickets.

#### **High Holy Days Youth Services**

High Holy Days Youth Services this year will be available for two different groups of students: students in grades K-3 and students in grades 4-6 which will coincide with our Adult Morning Services on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Our Youth Services create dynamic, meaningful and age-appropriate holiday experiences for our students. Services will be led by our most creative Religious School staff with participation by our Rabbis. Please note that students not attending one of the special services for their age groups are encouraged to worship with their families.

#### **Child Care**

Our Child Care includes meaningful holiday crafts, stories, and music. Child care is not recommended for children under the age of 3. Child Care will be provided for a fee during our Erev Rosh Hashanah Service, our Yom Kippur Early Evening Service and both of our Morning Services. Babysitting is not available on the Second Day of Rosh Hashanah.

In order that we may provide a sufficient number of sitters, a safe environment, and a wonderful experience for your child, **reservations must be made before September 10th.** Please complete the Child Care form sent home in the High Holiday mailing and return to the temple office with your payment.

#### **Infrared Listening Devices**

If a member or guest requires an Infrared Listening Device, they may be picked up at the door prior to the service.

#### Atmosphere

As the sanctuary is a place of prayer and meditation during the High Holy Days, we ask that families respect the mood of spirituality and dignity at all times. Kindly refrain from conversation during the course of worship. Families are asked to be responsible for their children's behavior throughout the services. Unless you are a First Responder, please turn off your cell phone before entering the sanctuary.

#### Memorial Book & Yahrzeit Wall

If you would like to list your loved ones in our Memorial Book or on our Yahrzeit wall, please fill out the Memorial Book & Plaque form, that was included in the HHD packet, and return it to the Temple Office.

#### **Financial Obligations**

In order for your High Holy Days tickets to be processed, payment of at least half of current dues, the Building Fund, if applicable, all Religious School fees and full payment of outstanding balances from prior years (or an up-to-date arrangement on file) are required. Tickets will be mailed in mid-September provided all financial obligations are satisfied.

Bags will be handed out during Rosh Hashanah. Please Return them filled on Yom Kippur. Non-perishable food items only. Please - no glass containers. Remember the hungry at this time of year.



An exciting element at the heart of our High Holy Day services is our prayer book, *Mishkan Hanefesh* (Sanctuary of the Soul). This is the first entirely new High Holy Day *Machzor* created for our Synagogue since the mid-1970s; and it is brilliant, innovative, and grounded firmly in our most cherished traditions and music. We are confident it will once again elevate the experience of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur as we welcome in the year 5778.

As last year, *every family* will have an opportunity to participate in the new High Holy Day prayer book initiative. How nice it would be for you and your family to sit in temple on the High Holy Days and open a prayer book to see heart-felt dedications!

The new books come in a set – one for Rosh Hashanah and another for Yom Kippur. We ask that every family participate by purchasing one or more sets of new prayer books into which heart-felt dedication 'bookplates' will be placed.

### Because we hope that everyone will be able to participate in bringing these new prayer books to our community, we have created several options for you and your family:

- ☆ For every donation of \$36, a bookplate placed into one book
- For every donation of \$54, bookplates placed into a set of books (2 book dedications)

### Weekly Torah Portions for September

### Week ending September 2, 2017

**Parashat Ki'Teitze Deuteronomy 21:10-25:19** Parashat Ki'Teitzei contains the greatest number of mitzvot of any single Torah portion, 72 in all, dealing with diverse subjects. The portion concludes with a warning to remember how the Amalekites attacked the weary Israelites in the desert.

#### Week ending September 9, 2017 Parashat Ki Tavo Deuteronomy 26:1-29:8

Ki Tavo addresses the time when the Israelites will settle in the Land of Israel. The Israelites are instructed to express their gratitude to God for their bountiful harvests and freedom from slavery by tithing ten percent of their crops for the Levite, the stranger, the orphan, and the widow. They are also told that if they obey God's mitzvot faithfully, they will receive every blessing imaginable; and if they do not fulfill their brit with God, many curses will descend upon them.

#### Week ending September 16, 2017 (Selichot) Parashiot Nitzavim-Vayeilech Deuteronomy 29:9-31:30

Moses continues his oration to the people of Israel before they enter the Promised Land in Nitzavim.He reminds the Israelites that God's covenant speaks to all of them and, through them, all future generations. Since God has prohibited Moses from entering the land God has promised to the Israelites, Moses prepares the people for his death and tells them that Joshua will succeed him as their leader in parashat Vayeilech. This parasha also assures the Israelites that they will be successful in re-conquering the Land of Israel and that God "will not fail you or forsake you."

#### Week ending September 23, 2017 Parashat Ha'azinu Deuteronomy 32:1-52

Ha'azinu is known as a shir - a song or poem. This parasha reiterates the agreements made between the Children of Israel and God. It reminds the people of the things God gave them in the wilderness, of the things that happened to them when they disobeyed God, and that God wants to protect them even though they do transgress. The message warns and instructs, while at the same time it gives hope as the people are about to enter into "The Land" under the new leadership of Joshua.

Week ending September 30, 2017 (Yom Kippur) Parashat Nitzavim Deuteronomy 29:9-14, 30:11-20 In the final address by Moses to the Children of Israel, we are reminded that each and every one of us is a member of the Covenant. From our ancestors at Sinai to this very day, each of us is the heir to this sacred tradition. Our tradition is neither too difficult to learn nor too cumbersome to follow. Regardless of our station in life, Torah belongs to all of us. Finally, we are exhorted to "choose life," to love God, to walk in God's ways, and to keep God's commandments. By doing so, we open our hearts to God and to each other.

# A Message from our Rabbi



### Sheloshim - The First Thirty Days of Mourning

All human beings are touched by loss; it is the way of the world.

But it isn't the way of the world to go through loss alone, and without love and support.

So many of us have experienced first hand the ever-present wisdom of ancient Jewish tradition during a funeral and in the days following. Jewish families sit shiva ('shiva' is Hebrew for 'seven,' the traditional number of days of mourning.) We stay at home following the funeral, (some for a day, some for three, some for seven) and friends come to visit, to take care of us and to assure us, by their very presence, that life matters - the life of the one they remember, and their lives, too. Many mourners also choose to convene a brief service

at home (a 'shiva minyan'). These prayers connect us to time immemorial, like a tether in the universe, and give us a chance, amid the assuring voices of friends and family, to recite the kaddish. Kol Ami's clergy help lead these services, as does a cadre of incredible, trained volunteers - our shiva minyan leaders.

But then the week of shiva ends - and loneliness sets in. The world reverts to normal; we return to work, carpools, schedules. But of course, nothing is the same as it was before.

Jewish tradition recognizes that mourning doesn't cease with the end of shiva. Jewish practice sets aside the first month (of which shiva is the first week) as a period of mourning - albeit less intense than the first week, but still - we are mourning. Kol Ami has prepared a "ring" of meditations for these first thirty days of mourning. One card for each day: a question, or quote, a thought, or meditation. Grief, for each loss, is uncharted territory. We hope that these reflections will accompany the mourner and strengthen our steps.

This year, we will be gifting these rings at the end of Yom Kippur, following the Yizkor/Memorial and Neilah services - and of course, giving them to each family at the time of a loss.

Following the High Holy Days, you are welcome to come by the office to pick up a ring - for yourself or someone else - if we missed you on Yom Kippur.

We have the power to create a community of loving support, where we deepen our own capacity for giving and where are reminded, when we need it most, how much life matters.

# A Message from our Rabbi

### Who said, "Pray as though everything depends on God. Act as though everything depends on you."

### And does it matter?

It's been a busy year and a crazy time in our nation, and in the world. During the past twelve months, I've been to a number of different gatherings, all convened to focus on fixing the craziness. They took place at a Protestant Church, a Jewish summer camp, The White House, a political rally in DC, and a teachers' gathering in support of LGBTQ students.

Only recently did it occur to me that almost all of the speakers and gatherings had the very same message. It's a message that's well expressed in that wonderful teaching, "Pray as though everything depends on God. Act as though everything depends on you."

I've always appreciated the sentiment behind that great message; but realized I had no idea where it came from. So, I made a quick trip to Google for a definitive answer. Of course, I assumed the source was Jewish. Here's a few of the "answers" I came up with from my search: the quote is attributed to St. Augustine, and Brigham Young, and St. Ignatius as well as Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel.

After a moment of frustration, the beauty of the universality of that message sank in. The above meetings in DC, and in churches and synagogues all concerned crucial issues of social justice: immigration reform, racism, homophobia, anti-Semitism, Israeli-Palestinian tensions and economic injustice. Obama's aides, prominent rabbis, ministers who inhabit the national stage, civil rights leaders, all made the same timely point, a point as poignant and crucial on these High Holy Days as ever before in our lives:

Yes indeed, let's gather and pray and study and meditate, and do acts of T'shuvah, and contemplate our innermost selves, as hard and sincerely as we can.

BUT, none of that will make any significant difference at all unless we leave the safe and comforting walls of our sanctuaries and ACT our convictions with deeds of battling that racism, alleviating that economic injustice, reforming our broken and immoral immigration policies, and educating those homophobic minds and hearts and supporting peace for our Israeli brothers, sisters and their neighbors.

I look forward to PRAYING with you, and then ACTING together.

#### Congregation Kol Ami of White Plains Wins Prestigious Belin Award For Audacious Hospitality in LGBTQ Inclusion Initiatives

White Plains, NY: Congregation Kol Ami, a Reform Jewish Synagogue, is pleased to announce that they have received the *2017 Belin Award from the Union for Reform Judaism*. As part of the URJ's vision of Audacious Hospitality, out of over 900 Reform Congregations in North America, Kol Ami is 1 of only 8 URJ Congregations to receive this award for 2017.

This award is given to synagogues that display exemplary work in engaging current members and welcoming people in thoughtful and creative ways. In order to win this award, Kol Ami showed how dedicated they are to be providing a greater level of understanding and commitment to the LGBTQ community with such things as an Annual Pride Shabbat, gender neutral bathroom facilities, an LGBTQ Bulletin Board full of resources and outreach, and specific new inclusionary prayers in their Shabbat and High Holy Day Prayer Books.

Kol Ami also hosted numerous events in the last two years which were open to not just their congregants, but to anyone in the local Westchester communities. Some of the featured speakers included, *Zachary Drucker*; Producer and Actress in the Golden Globe winning TV series "Transparent", *Marc Solomon*; National Campaign Director for "Freedom to Marry", *Andrew Solomon*; author of the best-selling book "Far From the Tree", and *Max Antman*; Legislative Assistant at the Religious Action Center and an advocate on Capitol Hill.

As Rabbi Tom Weiner said when he spoke to the Kol Ami congregation in his sermon on Rosh Hashanah "In all prayers, songs, Torah Readings, mediations, responsive readings.... The LGBTQ community was invisible. The way women used to be; the way people with disabilities use to be; the way non-Jews use to be. There we'd be, sitting at our meetings of the Board, or the staff, or the clergy, or the school committee patting ourselves on the back at how accepting we are. But apparently we weren't doing a very good job of saying it out loud, saying it clearly enough or often enough, or directly to the people who need to hear it the most. So now we are making sure we are."

Congregation Kol Ami will be recognized for this milestone accomplishment at the 2017 URJ Biennial in Boston, MA this December.

# Social Action Update on Our Refugee Family

As most of you know, Congregation Kol Ami, along with Scarsdale Synagogue Tremont Temple Emanu-el is sponsoring and assisting a Syrian refugee family. We could not have taken on this responsibility without the support and assurance from Rabbi Shira and Jess that Kol Ami was behind us financially and officially.

Our family arrived on June 7, 2017 and they are settling into their new life in the United States. As an introduction for those of you who have not met them, the dad and mom are Salam Shatlo and Amina Ahmad. They have three children, Alan, age 9, Digar, 8, and Layla, 5. They are Kurdish and lived in Aleppo, but they came here from Malaysia where they had been living for a few years after escaping violence in their neighborhood. Everyone in the family speaks English, but the children are more fluent than their parents due to attendance at a UN school for refugees in Malaysia.

When the family arrived here, they were happy to move into a fully furnished and stocked two bedroom apartment very close to downtown White Plains. Many thanks to the various housing committees that made sure all was in place.

The family has established a routine that is helping them acclimate to life here. Amina goes to ESL in the morning and Salam goes in the evening. They get to their classes by bus and they go regularly. Several of you from the Community Connections committee have volunteered to assist by driving them when you can. They are enjoying the classes and don't like to miss them.

The kids enjoyed their regular summer programs as well. Alan and Digar attended Bits N' Pieces Summer Camp held at the Church Street School and Layla attended a program at the Delany Center for Educational Enrichment on the Pace Law School campus. Salam goes to a dental lab on North Broadway by bus where he spends a few hours observing and now beginning to do some hands on work. Salam trained many years ago as a dental technician and thanks to a Kol Ami member in the dental profession, he has had the opportunity to observe in two labs. Salam is very happy with this opportunity. Amina is an experienced seamstress and hopes to work at home around the kids' school schedule. All three kids are registered at Church Street School. Our employment and education committees have been outstanding. Salam and Amina are learning their way around the neighborhood and the markets. They are very familiar with Shop-Rite, Target, and Walmart. Also, CVS, just off of Main St and the optical place where Alan will get his glasses. A generous pediatric ophthalmologist on our health committee

has provided a free medical exam for Alan and free sports glasses for him. The other two kids have upcoming appointments. Medical insurance for the family has just been activated and the family has many scheduled appointments for medical exams. The health committee is coordinating all these appointments.

On Sundays, the family has been going to the Sarah Lawrence family refugee program which everyone enjoys immensely. There are games and activities for the kids, lots of opportunities for the adults to socialize - they have met and connected with other Syrian families - and of course there is food and ice cream.

We have the good fortune to be working with a wonderful HIAS case manager. The family is receiving social service benefits but we need to continue to raise money to cover housing costs and other expenses. Social service benefits are not enough.

Thanks to you all for your efforts and support. Many of you have reached out in kind and unexpected ways and the Shatlos are very grateful. You have made a difference in their lives. Also, special thanks to those of you who have emerged as leaders in your committees and have done outstanding work in providing continuing research into resources and hours of important support for our family. These dedicated and generous people are Rachael Arenstein, Sheryl Brady, Wendy Busch, Nancy Ellis, Lisa Hochman, Amy Kellogg, Melissa Puius, Pam Rubin and Anne Wright.

For those of you in our congregation who would like to help, we are still fundraising on behalf of the Shatlo's and refugee families. Together we have raised nearly \$20,000 for our Refugee Fund. With rent at \$2,250 per month and heavy start-up expenses, we are still in need of additional donations. - \$1,000 donation will purchase a professional sewing machine and sewing supplies

-\$360 donation will fund afterschool programs for 3 kids -\$200 donation will fund bus usage for a month

-\$100 donation will fund one month of internet and cable -\$36 will fund one month of cell phone usage



## "REMEMBER THE DAYS OF OLD ..." Deuteronomy, Chapter 32

On December 10, 1923, at the Fenimore (now Fenway) Country Club in White Plains, the Jewish Community Center was formed and organized. That evening, in the same building in which we are holding our 55th Anniversary Dinner Dance, a Constitution and By-laws were adopted, the first Board of Trustees and the first Officers were elected.

The birth of our Temple was the result of a union between two groups. One was the "White Plains Religious School", founded by a few caring parents who wanted their children educated in Reform Judaism. The other was the "Jewish Center of White Plains," a Reform Temple. Many of our founders belonged to both groups.

A School and a Temple — education and worship — on these two cornerstones of Judaism, the Jewish Community Center was founded. We have built on them through good times and bad, through war and peace for 55 years. In addition to fulfilling our own and our children's Judaic needs, our Temple has been a continuing force in the life of the White Plains-Scarsdale community and a leader in the Reform movement through its membership in the Union of American Hebrew Congregations.


