Weekly Torah Portions for December

Week ending December 7, 2013 Parashat Vayigash Genesis 44:18-47:27

Joseph's brothers are in Egypt to get food to bring back to famine-ridden Canaan. Our *parashah* begins with the brothers standing before Joseph, who is the vizier of Egypt, and Judah asking to be imprisoned in place of his youngest brother Benjamin (whom Joseph framed). Judah, who once convinced his brothers to sell Joseph into slavery rather than kill him, argues for Benjamin (Rachel's only other child) because he fears that any harm to Benjamin would break his father's heart.

Week ending December 14, 2013 Parashat Vayehi Genesis 47:28-50:26

This final *parashah* in the book of *B'reishit* brings the first book of the Torah full circle. The family stories of patriarchs and matriarchs culminate in the blessings of Jacob to his sons and grandsons. The centerpiece of this portion is a sequence of twelve blessings, delivered by Jacob to each of his sons. Jacob brings his entire family together to hear his words.

Week ending December 21, 2013 Parashat Shemot Exodus 1:1-6:1

This week we begin the book of Exodus. In Hebrew, the name of the book and its first *parashah* is *Shemot*, meaning "names," referring to the names of the Israelites who come to Egypt with Jacob. A new Pharaoh who does not have direct experience with Joseph took control of Egypt. The Israelites are enslaved. Moses is born and in turn "gives birth" to the people of Israel.

Week ending December 28, 2013 Parashat Va'era Exodus 6:2-9:35

God speaks to Moses, confirming the covenant that was made with Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. The pleas of the enslaved Israelites have been heard by the Eternal, and God instructs Moses to promise them redemption. God also commands Moses to speak to Pharaoh and demand that he liberate the people of Israel. Pharaoh refuses to release the slaves and God causes plagues on the Egyptians in order to change Pharaoh's mind.

Adult Bar and Bat Mitzvah The Adventure of Learning Never Ends

Members of the Kol Ami community have asked about a new cycle of Adult Bar and Bat Mitzvah (our last class of celebrants became adult b'nai mitzvah in the spring of 2013.) Students participate in a 2-year course of study, meeting every other Tuesday evening throughout the academic year. Students also must learn (or already be able) to read Hebrew. Beginning Hebrew classes are offered on Sunday mornings and Wednesday evenings. There is a fee for the Hebrew classes. The only costs for the Bar/Bat Mitzvah course are for books.

We study the Jewish calendar, the layered and amazing history of Jewish holidays and celebrations, the spiritual and ritual facets of the life cycle, questions about Jewish belief and God. We learn how a service works and why Jews pray—and

each student prepares to read (chant) a portion of Torah. It is a thrilling experience. You will explore the questions of your mind and heart, you will learn, you will get to know other members of this exceptional community—who, like you, are embarking on this journey.

This year marks an historic occasion for our sacred community—Congregation Kol Ami is celebrating its 90th year! It is amazing to think that when Congregation Kol Ami (then known as The Jewish Community Center of White Plains) was founded in August 1923, we were in a period of economic recovery from World War I, we had just lost President Warren Harding to a stroke and women were given the right to vote. From its inception through today, our synagogue, rooted in Torah, worship and acts of loving kindness, has been a foundational progressive Jewish presence in Westchester County for generations.

We all have a story. Ours began in 1921 when two boys, Robert Stein and Martin Barbe, asked their moms for religious instruction like their Christian schoolmates. That humble beginning has evolved into a community centered on joyous worship and connected through social events and dynamic learning opportunities for children and adults of all ages, 2 to 102. Our name, Congregation Kol Ami, translates to "the voice of my people". We, a congregation of almost 800 member families, honor our name by being a voice of creative Judaism that provides contemporary meaning to traditional Jewish values and teachings.

We will be celebrating our 90th year throughout the 2013-14 programming year, culminating with our 90th Anniversary Gala Weekend. The Gala Weekend will start on Thursday, April 24 with our Gala Celebration, and will continue the next night as we honor Nan Blank, our Early Childhood Program Director, and Felice Miller Baritz, our Religious School Director, for their 10th Anniversaries at Kol Ami. 

Bequests Made Easy: Kol Ami's Legacy Fund

When making a bequest to the Kol Ami Legacy Fund, not all bequests are treated equally. Traditional IRAs and qualified retirement accounts like 401(k)s or 403(b)s ("retirement accounts") can be one of the best assets to use when making a charitable bequest as they generally provide the best tax planning opportunities.

As year end approaches, you may wish to consult with your tax-planning specialist to see if it makes sense for you to make a bequest to Kol Ami directly from your IRA, or to name the Kol Ami legacy Endowment Fund as a beneficiary of your IRA. This type of bequest is not taxable to the donor. By virtue of its tax-exempt status, Congregation Kol Ami is also not subject to income tax upon receiving distributions from retirement accounts.

Accordingly, if a donor's estate plan seeks to benefit both individuals and non-profit institution, it is most efficient, from a tax standpoint, to direct that the retirement distributions pass directly from the IRA to the institution (in this case, Kol Ami).

Naming The Kol Ami Legacy Fund as a beneficiary of your retirement account will have no bearing on your right to receive lifetime distributions but it can save your family significant estate and income taxes.

WOMEN OF REFORM JUDAISM — "Sisterhood"

his time of year, a time of increased darkness, when the nights are $oldsymbol{1}$ getting longer and our hours of daylight are diminishing, is the perfect opportunity to reflect on a couple of Jewish heroines who served as beacons of light in our history and whose stories are tied to this season.

As I write this article, our Shabbat parasha is Vayeishev, which includes the story of Tamar, daughter-in-law of Judah (Joseph's brother), widow of his first-born son. Determined not to leave her fate in the hands of male relatives, Tamar takes matters into her own hands and assumes extraordinary risks to secure the family's future and perpetuate the line of Judah by getting pregnant by her fatherin-law. She gives birth to two sons, one of whom will be a forefather of King David, thus creating a legacy that saves Judah's household and protects Israelite destiny, lighting the way for our future. I encourage you to read Genesis 38 for all the details!

Our second heroine is Judith, with whom many of us are unfamiliar. Judith's story, a Jewish story, is written in the Book of Judith, the fourth book of the Apocrypha, but is not part of the Jewish Bible. Although set in the Babylonian period, in the sixth century B.C.E., her story is thought to have been written at the time of the Maccabees, and has been understood in the context of the story of Chanukah, leaving a legacy of faith and courage, of overcoming a larger force, that changed the course of history. (In oral tradition, Judith often became the aunt or daughter of Judah Maccabee.) Judith is a brave and pious young Jewish widow whose town of Bethulia is under siege by Assyrian emperor Nebuchadnezzar's top general, Holofernes. If Bethulia falls, the entire country would come under Assyrian control. Another Jewish woman who takes matters into her own hands, Judith dresses in beautiful garments, enters the enemy camp, seduces the general with salty cheese and wine, and when he succumbs to the effects of the alcohol, beheads him. She sneaks out, taking the head with her and hangs it on the town's walls. In the morning, the "headless" enemy is routed, and the town, the people, and the country are saved. Light is also a theme in this story as when Judith returns to her village, the people greet her carrying lamps and torches; there is a huge collection of fires to celebrate her victory.

In paying tribute to our foremothers, Tamar and Judith, the Women of Reform Judaism focused on light and legacy at this season as well, with our Latkes and Latte event. In addition to the delicious food

and drink, our guest presenter spoke on the theme of legacy and decisions regarding who should receive one's personal property, with the goal of fostering positive, loving relationships. And a Saturday evening event would not be complete without the light of a beautiful Havdallah ceremony.

But light and legacy are not one-time occurrences for our Kol Ami Sisterhood. The support and care that we provide for one another and the positive influence that we have on the Temple and our community create a lasting legacy. We invite you to share in the warmth of our light and be a part of Sisterhood.
