

UNITY DINNER AND SHABBAT PROGRAM
Friday, June 3 at 8:15 pm

To the credit of our community, the Unity Dinner is now sold out.

We regret that we can no longer accept reservations.

However, we welcome you to join us for the program starting at approximately 8:15pm.

Early in the summer of 2014, three innocent Israeli boys were kidnapped and murdered. At that time, we in the White Pains synagogues learned that there is something deep that holds us together. The families of the three young men have reached out to the Jewish world, and asked us all to work to keep that sense of unity strong. And on the Shabbat evening of June 3rd, one of those parents will be joining us in White Plains.

Shabbat morning, June 11th

Kol Ami is privileged to welcome Avner Gvaryahu, of Breaking the Silence. Both Rabbis Tom and Shira have spoken about this remarkable group of Israeli soldiers (Tom most recently last High Holidays). This is a group of Israeli soldiers who have served in the Occupied Territories and have provided a vehicle for soldiers (upon the conclusion of their military service) to express the impact of this experience upon them. On Yom HaShoah a few weeks ago, then Minister of Defense Moshe Yaalon delivered a nationally broadcast speech in which he encouraged soldiers to speak their own truths. A few days ago, Moshe Yaalon was dismissed as minister of defense by Prime Minister Netanayahu and replaced by Avigdor Leiberman. Avner Gvaryahu, who is presently in NY, completed an MA in the Institute for the Study of Human Rights at Columbia University.

WEEKLY TORAH PORTIONS FOR JUNE

Week ending June 4, 2016

Parashat B'chukotai Leviticus 26:3-27:34 The book of Leviticus is completed this week with B'chukotai, which is filled with God's promises and warnings to the people depending upon whether or not they faithfully follow or disobey God's commandments. The parasha also includes brief discussions of the payment of vows and gifts made to the sanctuary.

Week ending June 11, 2016

Parashat B'midbar Numbers 1:1- 4:20 This Shabbat we begin reading the book of B'midbar, (in the wilderness). The book is called "Numbers" in English because it begins with a census of all male Israelites in the camp who are eligible to bear arms, as well as those responsible for the duties in the Tabernacle.

Week ending June 18, 2016

Parashat Naso Numbers 4:21-7:89 The second parasha in the Book of Numbers completes the census with a counting of the Levitical families and the enumeration of their responsibilities in the porterage of the Tabernacle and the Tent of Meeting. The parasha's concluding section begins with the Priestly Blessing and ends with a list of the offerings brought by the tribal heads for the ceremony of the dedication of the Tabernacle.

Week ending June 25, 2016

Parashat B'haalot'cha Numbers 8:1-12:16 In this parasha God instructs Moses to appoint elders to share the burden of ruling the people and settling their many issues. The parasha concludes with Aaron and Miriam saying disparaging things about their younger brother Moses. As a result, Miriam is struck with a skin disease, manifested as white, itchy scales. Aaron appeals to Moses, who offers a prayer to God on his sister's behalf.

WEEKLY TORAH PORTIONS FOR JULY AND AUGUST

Week ending July 2, 2016

Parashat Sh'lach L'cha Numbers 13:1-15:41 This week's parasha continues the story of the Israelites wandering through the desert. Moses sends twelve emissaries to scout out the land of Israel. Only two, Joshua and Caleb, return with a message of hope. The other ten spies report that the land is filled with giants, and the people react to their terrifying account with fear and panic. As a result of this behavior, the members of this generation will not be allowed to enter the "promised" land and will wander the desert for another 38 years.

Week ending July 9, 2016

Parashat Korach Numbers 16:1-18:32 Four rebels hatch an ill-fated "coup-d'état" against the leadership of Aaron and Moses in this week's parasha. Two dreadful punishments await the rebels: for Dathan, Abiram, and their group, the earth bursts asunder, swallowing them. For Korach and his followers, fire and plague bring death and havoc.

Week ending July 16, 2016

Parashat Chukat Numbers 19:1-22:1 This week's parasha begins with the death of Miriam, Moses' & Aaron's sister, at Kadesh. When the people complain that they have no water to drink, God instructs Moses to take his rod & order a rock to bring forth water. In his anger against the cantankerous people, instead of ordering the rock to produce water, Moses strikes the rock with his rod. As a result, God tells Moses that he will not be allowed to lead the people into the Land of Israel. This responsibility will ultimately be given to Joshua. Aaron dies at Mount Hor and Aaron's son, Eleazer becomes his successor.

Week ending July 23, 2016

Parashat Balak Numbers 22:2-25:9 In this week's parasha, Balak, the king of Moab, persuades the prophet Balaam to curse the Israelites so that he can defeat them and drive them out of the region. However, Balaam blesses the Children of Israel and prophesies that Israel's enemies will be defeated, saying "Ma Tovu, ohalecha Ya-akov, mishk'notecha Yisrael – How lovely are your tents O Jacob, your dwelling places, O Israel." The parasha ends with God punishing the Israelites with a plague when an Israelite man consorts with a Moabite woman. The plague ends when Pinchas kills them.

Week ending July 30, 2016

Parashat Pinchas Numbers 25:10-30:1 The parasha begins with God rewarding Pinchas for his actions with a covenant of peace for all time, and continues with the taking of a second census. Moses allocates the land to each tribe according to its size. The daughters of Zelophehad appeal to Moses to inherit their father's land since he died leaving no sons. God confirms their claim and instructs Moses to change the laws of inheritance. The parasha concludes with a description of the sacrificial ritual for all festival occasions.

Week ending August 6, 2016

Parashat Matot-Masei Numbers 30:2-36:13 In the first part of this double parasha the laws for making vows are described; and Moses agrees to allow the tribes of Gad and Reuben to stay in the land east of the Jordan than enter the land of Israel, as long as they lend their support in settling the land. Masei recounts the forty years of journeys (mas'ey) that the Israelites have made since leaving Egypt. The Book of Numbers concludes with Moses providing instructions for conquering the land of Israel, defining its borders, and dividing it among the tribes.

Week ending August 13, 2016

Parashat Devarim Deuteronomy 1:1-3:22 Devarim is the first parasha in the Book of Deuteronomy, which begins a series of speeches by Moses to the Israelites as they are preparing to enter the Land of Israel. In this parasha, Moses who will die in Moab, reminds this generation that they are about to take possession of the land that was promised to Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob. He recounts the route of travel and the challenges, chastisements, and triumphs that occurred along the way.

Week ending August 20, 2016

Parashat Va'Etchanan Deuteronomy 3:23-7:11 In this parasha, Moses' appeal to God to allow him to enter the Land of Israel is again denied. Moses continues his oration to the people, reminding them of the covenant at Sinai and the Ten Commandments, and exhorting them to follow the laws given by God. Specific areas of the land are set aside to serve as cities of refuge for those who commit unintentional homicide.

Week ending August 27, 2016

Parashat Ekev Deuteronomy 7:12-11:25 Moses continues to tells the Israelites that, if they maintain their covenant with God by observing all the commandments, God will make them fruitful and victorious over their enemies; and reminds them of the times that the Israelites disobeyed God's commandments and the consequences that befell them. Moses continues by saying that the land will flow with milk and honey if the people obey God's commandments and teach them to their children.

A Message from our Rabbi TOM WEINER



Talking the Talk, then Most Surely Walking the Walk

(From Rabbi Weiner's Address at the Annual Meeting; May 17, 2016)

I I thought it might be helpful this year if I did something a little different. Usually my annual reports are a list of activities, projects and programs - each with a short description.

Instead, let's look this year at just one piece of our collective work, but in full detail. This way you can see how, at Kol Ami, an idea becomes a reality. Let this be a model of the way in which an issue or project moves from inception to fruition.

For the past several years Kol Ami has been involved in a number of LGBT initiatives. Some of you have even commented – a bit tongue in cheek – at the plethora of LGBTQ programs. And I've enjoyed that gentle teasing, because that feeling of saturation is a sign of success. The first step was thinking together with all those interested to see if there is broad conviction that a particular issue is valid and deserves synagogue-wide attention.

So the conversations began with the various arms of synagogue life. Members, lay leadership, adult-ed, religious school and ECP, the youth group, worship committee, facilities, and administration. Discussions took place with our Educators, Clergy, Youth Director, High School students, and certainly parents.

Then, to make sure the message gets out, we make a point of reaching people in as many ways as possible:

- High Holiday Sermons
- Teacher training
- Youth Group programs
- Synaplex speakers
- High School teaching
- adult ed series on Gender and Spirituality
- We examined the paperwork, forms and applications of the synagogue to find where we could be more sensitive and in clusive
- We looked at our facility itself and saw we needed a gender neutral bathroom and then designated and labled one as such
- The worship committee became aware of the dearth of any liturgy in our prayer book that overtly mentions and includes our LGBTQ members. One was created and then physically added to all of the congregations' siddurim.
- Barbara Block has made sure that over the past several years we as a synagogue have observed and celebrated Pride Shabbat

•Our member Susan Ross recognized that no literature or photos or announcements could be found in our hallways and she created a beautiful bulletin board for Kol Ami LGBT information

And how do we know if any of this is working, or if we are just spinning our wheels? Perhaps we begin to know something positive is happening when real people, L or G or B or T or Q folks, adults, and kids and families start to celebrate their journeys, or struggle or explore or seek counsel or advocacy here at their home synagogue, at Kol Ami.

And they have.

Following a High Holiday sermon, a family proudly came forward with their their gay son to offer generous funds and their valuable time to work with us to create more programming

And we know something good is happening when, after transgender speaker addressed the congregation, a number families with gender-fluid young children came forward, and we are doing what we can do to make Kol Ami a place where they each feel fully welcome, recognized, valued and safe.

After that bathroom was designated as gender neutral; families expressed profound gratitude that it is there, and shared the great relief and sense of acceptance and recognition that their children feel.

We knew we were making headway when, at a recent Youth Group event, the high school leaders asked the kids to break into two groups to answer a question, one group for boys and one for girls. Three kids, with slight hesitation pulled themselves aside and said, "We don't know that we belong in either of those groups." Without missing a beat, a couple of our high school leaders said, "Great, let's have a third group!" And the program continued without any fuss.

A lot of good headway has been made, and there is work left to be done. Many of you have been involved in similar work on similarly important issues: Flowering from Shira's preaching on hunger was the creation and work of the Food Pantry, and it's connection to the many parts of Kol Ami life; just as her preaching and teaching on alcoholism and drug addiction led to our hosting weekly AA meetings in the Chapel in the Woods and other resources and counseling. The Green Initiative has led to brilliant and extensive work on our entire facility and increasingly on our daily life as a synagogue.

It is so satisfying and I am so proud to be a part of a community that can so convincingly and passionately talk the talk; and then so brilliantly and effectively walk the walk.

So what's next?

"WHERE ARE YOU MOST 'YOU'?"

When we ask our students, "Where are you most 'you': at home, at school, or at camp?" – what do you think most kids answer? Most kids answer "at camp." As we enter summer days, it's good to think about why so many kids feel that way. What is it about camp – or summer days – that bring out the best in us? What is it that connects us more truly to

ourselves?

I don't know the answer; indeed, the answers may vary from person to person. But based on my own experiences, I could venture a few guesses. Camp draws on a wide range of experiences. Unlike school (which is narrowed to an academic focus), camp draws upon and develops so many different parts of ourselves (some of which we may be discovering for the first time!): arts, drama, singing, sports, camping, the outdoors. Camp relies on cooperation (unlike school, in which we are largely in competition with one another.) Camp encourages independence (unlike school, which depends on the authority of teachers and administration.) And of course, we shift from performance and judgment (grades grades grades) to appreciation and being. The intensity of feeling.

There are two months of camp – and ten of everything else. I remember the first two days of being home after camp. The crying, the weeping – oh, the sadness at the end of everything wonderful

and worth living for!! Is there anything we, as adults, can learn from the power of these summer experiences to bring in to the other ten months? We think about that here at Kol Ami. I will tell you that one of the goals of our Kol Ami Religious School is to transform school into something that is more like camp. There are weekend retreats for our 4th-6th graders and for our Confirmation students, trips for our middle school and high school students. I listened to our graduating 12th grade students speaking to the incoming high school students about their years in the youth group. I heard, "No matter how much homework I had, I would never want to miss one of these Wednesday nights." "I've been at Kol Ami since the ECP. My whole life has been here. This place is part of who I am – and who I've become." "I made friends for life here."

By the time this Connection is in your hands, or on your screen, Memorial Day weekend will have passed - and more than 125 people from Kol Ami will have spent parts of the weekend together – at camp! Kids, adults, families, grandparents with their grandchildren, friends with friends, all of us with each other. Time alone by the lake, drinks on porches, s'mores and Havdalah by the campfire, music, dance, boating, games, Shabbat – life with time to enjoy.


Hey, that must be one of the things that makes camp so different than school – or sometimes, even home. Life – with time to enjoy it.

A Message from Our President

HANK ROUDA



We had another very successful Annual Meeting last month and I wanted to give you some updates from the meeting. We had a very good turnout at the meeting and we had the most proxies that we've ever had. Our first major item of business was to elect the Rabbis, as their contracts expire

at the end of this fiscal year. Both Rabbi Milgrom and Rabbi Weiner agreed to new four year contracts. The financial terms are contained in the Budget. I'm extremely pleased to announce that both Rabbi Milgrom and Rabbi Weiner were unanimously elected to new four year contracts!

Second, we presented the Budget for the 2016 - 17 fiscal year. In addition, our Treasurer, Jonathan Litt, updated those present on the current year's budget and some updates to the immediate prior year's final financial statements. We had a challenging fiscal year that started with a discovery that about 25 families who we thought were members, were, in fact no longer members, with some of them having left the temple years ago. While this discovery enabled us to clean-up some outstanding receivables, the loss of this revenue (about \$80,000) created a shortfall that was only overcome by the hard work of the Board, our Executive Director, Jess Lorden, and all of the temple staff. It, however, created a problem as we created this coming year's Budget, as our expense structure is predicated on there being about 25 more members than we actually have. I want to thank Jonathan Litt and the Budget Committee, Jeff Gelfand, Howard Geller and Andrew Levinson, for their incredibly hard work to help us find a path to creating a balanced budget. The Board and professional staff worked diligently to ensure that we can still provide the programming that makes Kol Ami such a special community, while being fiscally prudent. Overall, the proposed budget more clearly reflects the actual revenue available and the actual costs anticipated to run our congregation. The budget also passed with a large majority.

The only major change in the Budget was the introduction of a \$135 per family unit Security Fee. As you're aware, we've been adding armed security during services. The Board made the decision that it was important to add the same security during school hours. The implementation of the Security Fee is designed to defray the cost of providing this necessary security. Both the Kodomono Kuni Japanese School and the non-member ECP families are also paying a Security Fee.

Finally, our immediate Past Presidents, Ronnie Cohn and Mark Seiden, as co-chairs of the Nominating Committee, on behalf of the Nominating Committee, presented the slate of Trustees and Officers for election. We have five Trustees whose terms are up and the Nominating Committee proposed six new Trustees – Judi Brown, Danielle Gecht, Bonnie Hagen, Liz Mayeri, Pam Millian and Jeff

Rothschild. The Nominating Committee also had to replace two Vice Presidents, Lori Abrams and Ellen Kurtz. The Executive Committee for next year will consist of Vice Presidents Gerri Sommers, Scott Musoff and Susan Kohn Arovas; Secretary Rachel Eckhaus; and Treasurer Jonathan Litt. In addition, I was honored to be nominated to serve another term as your President. The slate as proposed by the Nominating Committee was unanimously approved. The Board and the Officers deeply appreciate the support that you have shown us by giving us the opportunity to continue our work of leading this wonderful community.

We have some exciting changes coming in the next year, starting with Rosh Hashanah. Watch your e-mail and mail for more details. I hope that you all have a wonderful summer and I hope to see you at Kol Ami!

In the course of those months of publication in "Connections," our readers have been introduced to a variety of members' stories and evaluations of those identities. Each writer had joined Kol Ami based upon recommendations by relatives, friends or clergy. However the route to Kol Ami by the writers, the results were the same, spiritual harmony and cultural fulfillment.

Here are their discoveries.

FOR MYRNA BARZELATTO:

The catalyst that drew Myrna to Kol Ami was Rabbi Shira Milgrom who was welcoming and embracing nd invited Myrna to participate at whatever level that she felt comfortable. As a result, Myrna's experiences and sense of gratification are amazing and far greater than she could have ever anticipated or imagined. For her, Kol Ami is a warm, committed and responsive Jewish community where everyone is welcome and opportunities are limitless. While she sings, prays, works and learns along with other members, most of all, she is appreciative of the many new friendships, since she became a member. She is clearly grateful to be part of something bigger than herself.

FOR SARA ELKIN:

There were many factors that drew Sara to Kol Ami, the strongest of which was the temple's openness. The clergy's accessibility to her family speaks to the importance of children in the congregation. With that in mind, her children are developing respect for the clergy and deep personal relationships with them as well. Her older son pretends to be Rabbi Shira or Cantor David and sings songs around the house, while Rabbi Tom got down on the floor to play trains with her younger son and looks for him each day. From attending Friday night programs to becoming an active congregational volunteer, Sara, along with her family, will continue the Jewish journey at Kol Ami.

FOR ANNE D'ORAZIO:

Her Jewish journey began in Venice, Italy while reading a faded newspaper clipping describing the Jewish Ghetto. That event led to a life altogether different from the one that she had planned. For years, after reading the article, she visited the Jewish Ghetto, until she was accepted into the National Endowment For The Humanities. That five week summer program led to a teaching position at Westchester Community College's Collegium focusing on the Jewish Ghetto. Anne's catalyst for joining Kol Ami was Rabbi Shira Milgrom whose talks with Anne led to a permanent life decision. From uplifting music and singing, to stirring sermons by Rabbis Tom and Shira, to warm receptions by the congregants, Anne has found a home at Kol Ami. A journey of seemingly random pieces of life's adventures has led her to Kol Ami's warm embrace.

FOR PATRICIA HASKEL:

Barbara Wexler was the catalyst for Patricia's introduction to Kol Ami. The Saturday morning's studies, with the depth of the Torah's analysis and discussions by the members, fascinate her. 
