Weekly Torah Portions for October

Week ending October 4, 2014 (Yom Kippur) Parashat Nitzavim Deuteronomy 29:9-14; 30:11-20

In *Parashat Nitzavim*, Moses continues his oration to the people of Israel before they enter into the Promised Land. He tells them that God is making a covenant with them and, through them, with all future generations.

Week ending October 11, 2014 (The Shabbat during Sukkot) Parashat Ki Tisa Exodus 33:12-34:26

This portion of *Ki Tisa* relates the story following the incident of the Golden Calf. Moses is beset by doubt and anxiety over his own ability to lead the Israelites, and asks for the ultimate reassurance – to behold the Divine Presence. God does not grant this request, but does reveal the nature of God's attributes. The *parashah* ends with a restoration of mutual faith and with Moses carving a second set of tablets inscribed with Ten Commandments.

Week ending October 18, 2014 Parashat B'reishit Genesis 1:1-6:8

B'reishit, our first *parashah* in the Torah cycle, begins with the creation of the world. God creates the world in seven days, concluding with the first Shabbat. In a second version of the creation story, Adam is created from the dust of the earth rather than as a result of a divine breath. Adam and Eve are expelled from the Garden of Eden for eating from the tree of knowledge of good and evil. Their son Cain kills his brother Abel. Adam and Eve have another son named Seth, from whom Noah descends.

Week ending October 25, 2014 Parashat Noach Genesis 6:9-11:32

In this *parashah* God expresses disappointment with human corruption and destroys all life on earth in a flood. God finds favor in Noah's character and spares his family. God commands Noah to build an ark for himself, his family, and the pairs of animals who survive with Noah on the ark that he builds.

Personal Reflections on Moons, Cycles and Blessings



 B^{y} the time you are reading this Connection, the new year of 5775 will have begun. The crescent moon of the year's beginning will wax to fullness in a dark sky—as we hope that in the darkness of a world of con-

flict will see greater light in the coming months.

Moon and sun and sky and season. The Jewish year, in its lunar month calendar, falls behind the 365 day year of our solar calendar. In order keep the calendars from spinning apart (think how the Muslim month of Ramadan moves throughout the year), the Jewish calendar adds a leap month 7 times every nineteen years. That means that every 19 years, the solar and lunar calendars line up.

This year, Yom Kippur falls on October 4th. My first born, Talia, was born on October 4th—and it was Yom Kippur morning. (I wasn't yet even thinking of becoming a rabbi in those days.) And yes—this year she will be 38 (19 x 2) on October 4th/Yom Kippur. Feel free to wish her happy birthday if you see her!

As the moon of this first Hebrew month nears its fullness, we—all of us—will be celebrating the festival of Sukkot—the season of our rejoicing and thanksgiving. We'll build Sukkot, fill them with decorations, sit around tables inside and eat and sing, host a Sukkot Harvest Festival (that's Sunday October 12th in the morning - at Kol Ami) and give thanks for our abundant blessings.

David (my husband) and I will also be celebrating on Shabbat— together with our children and grandchildren—the naming of our newest grandchild, the first daughter of our youngest child, Liore—and her husband David,—during Shabbat services. We invite you to join us at services in the Schulman Chapel in the Woods:

The Jazz Singer

Like many cantors and rabbis, I too have developed my own set of rituals and routines that help to prepare me for the Yamim Noraim. One of my favourite rituals is my annual viewing of "The Jazz Singer" on the morning of Kol Nidre. I am sure that many of you have seen this movie in one of its three reproductions, the first (and original) starring Al Jolson (also my personal favourite), followed by Danny Kaye and Neil Diamond in subsequent re-makes.

For those of you who have never seen the movie before, the story follows a young boy named Jakie Rabinowitz who lives with his family in a little "shtetl" somewhere in New York City in the 1920's. The son of a cantor, Jakie is taught from a young age how to chant the liturgy of the Jewish people. It is expected that he will follow in his father's footsteps and the several generations of cantors that preceded him.

Blessed with a sweet voice, Jakie's true passion was singing, but not on a bima. Instead, Jakie loved the stage and theatre and enjoyed singing jazz and other secular music of his time. After an unfortunate disagreement with his father, Jakie leaves home in his late teens and attempts to make a name for himself in the secular world. His dream is to one day star in a Broadway show. Along the way, Jakie falls in love with one of his non-Jewish co-stars and it is only a matter of time before he gets his big break on the Broadway stage.

On the morning of Jakie's Broadway debut (which happened to be Erev Yom Kippur), Jakie's dad falls gravely ill and he is not able to chant the Kol Nidre prayers. Nachum, the gabbai of the synagogue, accompanies Jakie's mother to the dress rehearsal in an attempt to convince Jakie to return to the synagogue for one evening to cover for his ailing father. Risking his reputation and career as an actor and Broadway performer, Jakie decides to return to synagogue this one time, much to the satisfaction of his father, his family and the congregation.

Upon hearing the first few measures of the Kol Nidre prayer, Jakie's father passes peacefully into his final resting place, knowing that his son has returned to his roots and his community in a significant way.



"The Jazz Singer" speaks to us on a multitude of levels. It is a reminder of our history and our roots, regardless of whether or not these were pleasant experiences. What was it that made Jakie Rabinowitz return to the synagogue for that one evening? A connection to God? A connection to his community? An obligation to his family? Regardless of the reason, on that Kol Nidre eve, there was something that tugged on Jakie Rabinowitz's heart. There was something that was beyond explanation or a calculated risk that made him return to his people and his past, even if only for a brief moment in time.

There is a beautiful song composed by Shlomo Carlebach that we will sing together on Yom Kippur entitled "Return Again". Yom Kippur is our opportunity to figure out what it is that tugs on each of our hearts and helps us to feel a connection to our families, our history and our people. Together we stand and pray as a community to reach for those moments that define us as individuals and help to shape and strengthen the relationships we will create with those around us.

May we, like Jakie Rabinowitz, find our voice and our connection to what cannot be explained.

From Our President

L'shanah tovah! I hope that all of you have a healthy, fulfilling, sweet and enriching new year. As usual, getting ready for the High Holy Days is a herculean effort and I want to thank Jane Friedberg and the entire staff on, once again, doing such a great job. Please take a moment to thank them when you see them, as they do so much to make it possible for us to worship as a community.

As we move into a new programming year, I wanted to share some thoughts on the year that has just ended and the year to come. While on the Chinese calendar, this is the Year of the Horse, at Kol Ami, it's definitely been the Year of Change! I hope that you all have had a chance to at least say hello to our new Cantor, Cantor David Rosen. David's sense of compassion and humanity (not to mention his terrific voice) has already made him a treasured member of our community. Cantor Rosen's installation will be held later this year and we will be sending out more information soon. Lenora Eve, who many of you may remember from her past participation with Kol Ami, is our new accompanist and is already providing us with such beautiful music.

The changes don't stop on the bimah, but continue into the office. As you probably know by now, Jane Friedberg, our Executive Director of over 22 years, has announced her retirement. She will be staying with us until her successor is in place. We will be honoring Jane at an event in January, so stay tuned for further details. The Executive Director Search Committee, led by Past President, Ronnie Cohn, hopes to complete their work in the coming weeks. We are also pleased to welcome Rebecca Reuben, who is the new Clergy Administrative Assistant.

While change can be disconcerting, it also opens up opportunities. No one will be able to replace Jane or Janet Hershey, but their leaving presents us with the unique opportunity to completely reimagine how the office works. Along with adding Rebecca in the clergy office, we are poised to make the most out of these changes and look for different ways to work together.

Yom Kippur is at the end of this week and it presents us with two great chances to perform acts of tzedakah. First, as always, we are having our food drive to assist local food pantries. Last year, we collected 2,777 pounds of food, the most that we've

ever collected! Let's see if we can do even better this year. Also, last year we were the only synagogue in lower Westchester who participated in the Gift of Life cheek swab campaign to register people to be bone marrow donors. We signed up over 150 people and we're hoping to add even



more this year. You need to be between the ages of 18 and 60. If you signed up last year (or at any other such event), then you don't need to do it again. As we focus on repairing ourselves and the world at this time of year, these two events give us an opportunity to provide a tangible benefit to our community.

So, what else lies ahead? As I mentioned in my remarks on Rosh Hashanah, the Board is going to be spending the coming year examining how our congregants interact with Kol Ami and each other. We have a great opportunity to reimagine our temple to meet our needs and the needs of our future generations. Communication is key to this effort and you will see some changes in how we get the word out to everyone. I hope that you've already "Liked" Kol Ami's Facebook page, as we're using this social communication tool more and more. We hope to add other social communication tools as we expand our communication efforts. We would love to hear from you if you have any expertise in this area or if you just have some good ideas that you'd like to share.

There are so many wonderful programs coming this year and I hope that you take advantage of at least one. Please pick up the new Adult Education brochure on Yom Kippur and find just one program that speaks to you. My guess is that you can find even more than just one! Or come one Shabbat morning to the Lift Service to see the beautiful newly refurbished Chapel in the Woods (and don't forget that you can still sponsor a chair; just call the office and they'll help you out). Or come early one Erev Shabbat and join our youngest generation at Shabbat in the Woods. Or...well, you get the idea. There are so many "entrances" to Kol Ami. We look forward to greeting you as you walk through them.





Ritual Riches - Meditation before Yom Kippur for One who Cannot Fast

On this Day of Atonement, this Sabbath of Sabbaths,

Jews around the world join in

Refusing food and drink for one day

So that we may focus on correcting our misdeeds,

On acknowledging our mortality,

While reaching for a life closer to Torah
through mitzvot and loving kindness.

Creator and source of all life,

It is not my intent to be apart from my people and our tradition.

My current state makes it unsuitable for me to keep the
traditional fast.

Dear God, I turn to you now in sincerity and openness:
Help me in the coming year to guard my health with wise choices.
Help me to protect my body from harm.
I thank you for the breath that is in me.
May I be blessed with the opportunity to help those who suffer.
Grant me the ability to do THIS mitzvah with love and devotion.
And may my eating, then, be as a fast.
May it be dedicated to T'shuvah
To the renewal and restoration of my relationship to You,
to others, and to myself.

Amen

This prayer was prepared by the Worship Committee last year for inclusion in the High Holy Day Song Sheet where it appears again during our Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services. The Torah tells us that for those who are required to eat on Yom Kippur for medical reasons, such eating is a mitzvah, just as fasting is a mitzvah for those whose health allows them to fast.

We hope that if you are one to whom this meditation applies, it is as meaningful and important to you as to those congregants who shared their appreciation with us last year. One of our members described the guilt and awkwardness she felt in not being able to take part in what for her had always been a critical part of Yom Kippur and the sense of relief and validation she experienced in reading the meditation and understanding her changed practice and observance were authentic as well. Another congregant, who had fasted out of a sense of obligation and to demonstrate to her children, grandchildren, and great-grandchildren what one is "supposed to do for the holiday", lost some of her sense of purpose when she was unable to fast any longer. However, the meditation above provided her with the opportunity to tap into a new source of obligation and to continue in her worship and observance in a meaningful way, acknowledging that she is indeed part of our community, "praying along with everyone else and still doing what she is supposed to be doing".

May those of us who cannot fast and worry that our observance of Yom Kippur is thus diminished, frame the experience of the day with a new sense of obligation, strength, and purpose, enriched by connection to our community and to God.

As this article is being written, the *parasha* is *Nitzavim-Vayeilech*, almost at the end of the book of Deuteronomy, and it contains some of the most beautiful lines in the Torah. "Surely, this instruction which I enjoin upon you this day is not too baffling for you, nor is it beyond reach...No, the thing is very close to you, in your mouth and in our heart, to observe it." (*Deuteronomy 30:11-14*). "...Choose life – if you and your offspring would live –" (*Deuteronomy 30:19*).

Please join with the Kol Ami Sisterhood this Yom Kippur in choosing life and promote life for ourselves and for others less fortunate. We will be sponsoring our annual High Holy Days Food Drive which will support the Food Bank for Westchester. Last year, we collected over 7,000 pounds of food, a new record for our synagogue. We would love to surpass that amount, so we ask that you be as generous as you can. Bags were distributed at Rosh Hashanah services. If you did not receive one, they are still available at Kol Ami – or bring your own bag(s) filled with non-perishable food items (no glass, please) when you join us for services on Yom Kippur Day.

Last year, for the first time, the Women of Reform Judaism facilitated Kol Ami's participation in the **Gift of Life Bone Marrow Drive**. We will be partnering again with this organization to provide the gift of life. Our donor recruitment drive will be held on Yom Kippur Day in the Petschek Gallery from 9:00 a.m. to 4 p.m. Potential donors (between ages 18 and 60) will be entered into the Gift of Life's registry, and from the time you join until your 61st birthday, you could help save a life! All that is required is a quick cheek swab and completion of a consent form. If you participated in last year's drive, you are already registered and do not need to sign up again.

Neither of these initiatives is too baffling for us—nor beyond our reach. A filled bag of groceries and a cheek swab is all it takes—we can do it, and in doing these mitzvot, we will choose life for ourselves —and help others to live.

A story from Midrash

An old man was observed planting a tree. When asked if he expected to live long enough to consume the fruits of his labor he replied: "My ancestors planted for me and now I plant for my children..."

We hope that during the High Holy Days you had a chance to look out the windows of our beautiful sanctuary and notice the new gardens in front of the evergreen hedge. Funded by a generous gift from a congregant, these new beds help complete a goal of the sanctuary design to bring the beauty of the outside into our sacred space.

In considering the design and plants for the space, we became aware that much of the area outside our main building had become overgrown with weeds and poorly cared for trees and shrubs.
