Here, our members- of every age and with diverse backgrounds and identities- are our heartbeat.


Here, we cultivate relationships with family, friends, staff, and clergy.



Weekly Torah Portions for October

Week ending October 6, 2018

Parashat B'reishit Genesis 1:1-6:8

B'reishit, our first parashah in the Torah cycle, begins with the creation of the world. God creates the world in seven days, concluding with the first Shabbat. In a second version of the creation story, Adam is created from the dust of the earth rather than as a result of a divine breath. Adam and Eve are expelled from the Garden of Eden for eating from the tree of knowledge of good and evil. Their son Cain kills his brother Abel. Adam and Eve have another son named Seth, from whom Noah descends.

Week ending October 13, 2018

Parashat Noach Genesis 6:9-11:32

In this parashah God expresses disappointment with human corruption and decides to destroy all life on earth in a flood. God finds favor in Noah's character and spares his family. God commands Noah to build an ark for himself, his family, and the pairs of animals who will join Noah and his family on the ark. A rainbow symbolizes the first covenant between God and the people.

Week ending October 20, 2018

Parashat Lech L'cha Genesis 12:1-17:27

The story of our ancestors begins in earnest in Lech L'cha. Abram is promised he will be the father of a great multitude if he follows God's call. Abram and Sarai leave their home in Haran for Canaan, along with Abram's nephew Lot. As a sign of God's covenant, Abram and Sarai receive new names, Abraham and Sarah. When it seems Sarah is unable to conceive a child, Sarah gives her handmaid, Hagar, to Abraham to bear a son for him. Then, sensing Hagar's arrogance at becoming pregnant, Sarah asks Abraham to send Hagar away. Abraham is ninety-nine years of age when God promises him (and Sarah) a son of their own. It is through this son, Isaac, that the covenant will be fulfilled.

Week ending October 27, 2018

Parashat Vayera Genesis 18:1-22:24


Parashat Vayera opens with Abraham receiving a visit from messengers who bring predictions of Isaac's birth. When God threatens to destroy the settlements of Sodom and Gomorrah because of the wicked behaviors occurring there, Abraham stands up to God to protest that annihilation. This parashah also includes the long-awaited birth of Sarah's and Abraham's son, Isaac. The final scene in this parashah tells the story of the "Binding of Isaac" where God tests Abraham, instructing him to sacrifice his son Isaac.





A Message from Rabbi Milgrom

The Most Important Jewish Holiday

As we emerge from the very high High Holidays - in all their spiritual power and magnificence and intensity - it's quite amazing to be reminded of a different source of spiritual power and magnificence and intensity. It is Shabbat. We don't have to wait it for a whole year. It's there for us week in and week out.

Years ago, a Kol Ami congregant was shopping with her kids during December. The sales person leaned over the counter and asked her little one, "What do you want for Christmas?" The child answered, "I don't celebrate Christmas; I celebrate Shabbat." That child got it! Neither Rosh Hashanah, nor Yom Kippur, nor Hanukkah, top the list of the one most important Jewish holiday.

Your children need and deserve to be blessed - at least once a week.

Your partner or spouse needs to be hugged and reminded that you love them - at least once a week. And you need it, too.

We are all so busy - with jobs, with work, with emails, with deadlines, with carpools, with house repairs, with homework, with schedules. And life is so precious.

A Message from Cantor Rosen

Feeekeh—The Middle Eastern Alternative to Quinoa

On my family's recent trip to Israel, I was reacquainted with a food that I had completely forgotten about, Freekeh. What is Freekeh you ask?

Freekeh, pronounced "free-kah" is a grain. The word is arabic in nature and means "coming from that which is rubbed," referring to the technique in which it is harvested.

Essentially it is a grain of wheat that is harvested while young and green. After being roasted over an open fire, the straw and chaff are burned and rubbed off. Because the grain on the inside is too young and moist to burn, you end up with a firm, slightly chewy grain with a distinct flavor that's earthy, nutty, and slightly smoky. It is harvested early in the spring, making it an ideal grain-food for that time of year, when stores of grains from the previous season have been used up during winter.

Freekeh is first mentioned as early as the 13th century in a Baghdad cook book as "farikiyya." It is said to have roots in ancient Egypt and Syria. There is a legend or story that is told that in 2300 B.C. a nation in the Eastern Mediterranean was anticipating an attack on their city. Worried about losing their crop, they picked the early green heads of wheat and stored them. When their city was attacked and came under fire, they discovered the process for making freekeh despite the disastrous destruction of the country. Freekeh is widely used now in the middle east and is making a comeback on the food scene in North America.

Aside from being super delicious, Freekeh also comes with tremendous health benefits that rival its superfood counterpart, Quinoa. Packed with vitamins like iron, calcium and zinc, Freekeh also functions as a prebiotic by promoting the growth of good bacteria in your gut. It is lower on the glycemic index than Quinoa and contains more protein than Quinoa as well as twice as much fiber. Unfortunately, if you are gluten free, freekeh will not be in your repertoire of grains...Freekeh is traditionally servec with meat or fish, but it is such a delicious grain that can be added to salads, used as a side dish or even added to your favorite soup or yogurt.

Here is a recipe from the Food Network to try. By the way, if you are wondering where to buy the supergrain, check out Yarramush on Central Avenue in White Plains....

Happy Eating, Cantor David Rosen

Triple-Herb Freekeh Ingredients I cup cracked freekeh

1/2 a small red onion, finely diced (about 1/2 cup)

- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh basil
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh dill
- 2 tablespoons chopped fresh parsley
- 2 tablespoons extra-virgin olive oil

Juice of 1 medium lemon (about 2 tablespoons) Kosher salt and freshly ground black pepper

Directions

- · Add 8 cups water and freekeh to medium saucepan. Boil until tender, about 20 minutes. Strain.
- · Meanwhile, soak the onions in ice water in a small bowl for 10 minutes. Strain well.
- · Whisk together the onions, basil, dill, parsley, oil, I tablespoon of the lemon juice, I teaspoon salt and 1/4 teaspoon pepper in a large bowl. Add the cooked freekah and toss to coat. Season with salt and pepper if needed. Transfer to a serving bowl and add the remaining I tablespoon lemon juice. Serve warm or at room temperature. (Alternatively, serve chilled, adding an additional tablespoon of lemon juice just before serving.)



Hi everyone,

As we come to the end of the 16th month since the arrival of the Shatlo family in the United States and as the need for our involvement lessens, we wanted to give those of you who contributed to the family's resettlement a final update on how they're doing. It is really a testament to your dedication and hard work along with the ongoing efforts of the Shatlos that they are as settled as they are at this time.

Salam continues to work at Elcan Industries Inc. in Tuckahoe. He has been there for about 5 months and will soon be eligible for health care benefits for his family and for a raise. As of the last conversation with him, he is happy there, his boss is "very kind" and he feels good about his job. Amina is hard at work sewing for her own customers as well as for Scott who has his own mobile cleaning and alterations business bringing Amina many fancy dresses to be altered, and Iffat whose shop is in Rye. Iffat, who Amina met at an AMWA event, taught her some of the finer points of alterations and calls on Amina for help when she is very busy. Amina has two sewing machines that do a variety of special stitches, but not everything. With help from Wendy she is about to shop for a third machine capable of additional stitches giving her many more options. Amina is very hardworking and ambitious and dreams of her own shop. She has a website. Please do try accessing it. A search with – Amina, White Plains, seamstress – should bring it near the top of the queue.

The children are currently set in their second year at Church Street School in White Plains - 5th grade for Alan, 4th grade for Digar and 1st grade for Layla. They had a great summer at the White Plains Youth Bureau's Bits and Pieces Camp and the YMCA Camp. They are also registered for after school programs courtesy of the Youth Bureau and with the help of Sheryl. All three children will go to PGT Drama program located across the street from their apartment and all three will begin karate on September 19 at Bushido School of Karate. Alan will continue with boxing lessons.

During the summer, in addition to camp, the family attended the Sunday program for refugees at Sarah Lawrence College. Also, available to the family was a pass for the Gardella swimming pool near their camp provided by Lisa and bicycles for the whole family provided by Pam M. Alan and Rena took the family swimming at Scarsdale pool and to the Botanical Gardens.

Currently the Shatlos are on the list for affordable housing in Tuckahoe and White Plains. Meanwhile they are comfortable and able to afford their current apartment, but if they do make it to the top of the list, their rent would be much easier to manage. Accompanied at different times by Erin, Natasha, and Amy, the Shatlos made the necessary trips to the city to apply for their green cards.

Amina's brother who lives in Toronto has visited a couple of times, most recently a couple of weeks ago. It is a great comfort to Amina that there are family members nearby and accessible. Amina has been invited to speak about her refugee and resettlement experience at a September Welcome Week event sponsored by Hearts and Homes for Refugees.

We would like to thank all of you who have helped the Shatlo family resettle in White Plains over the past year and a half. The family would not have progressed in the way they have without your contributions, large and small. We would also like to acknowledge the leadership and support from the folks at HIAS, particularly fabulous Erin who was always there when we needed her. As mentioned in a previous email, although we are no longer officially responsible for the family's resettlement, a few of you have remained in contact with the family and are continuing to help in important ways. Paul and I will also be in touch with the Shatlos periodically, so you can contact us if you have any questions, but feel free to contact the Shatlos directly. And especially feel free to contact Amina if you have anything that needs to be altered – she can do anything.

Several of our congregants no longer drive or have difficulty getting to services and special events. Kol Ami Cares maintains a database of members willing and able to provide transportation as needed.


Offering a ride even once in a while is hugely appreciated.




