We feel extremely proud to have been able to host in our sanctuary the county-wide gathering of our inter-religious community on October 28th, 2018 in response to the violence at The Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh. It was a service of prayer, of kaddish, of song, silence and sacred solidarity.

We have received a virtual outpouring of words of comfort, of shared grief, of worry and of hope. The most important thing that we have learned, however, is that our strength is in our coming together. We demonstrated that power in the hours following the tragic shooting in Pittsburgh as more than two thousand of us gathered in our sanctuary from all across the Jewish community and across lines of faith and race. We were joined by elected officials, the American Jewish Committee, the Westchester Jewish Council, and clergy and congregants from Muslim, Christian, Buddhist and Shinto communities - and rabbis and cantors from all streams of the Jewish community. "We'll fight hate together," we sang. And that is the way - together! "We may have come on different ships, but we're all in the same boat now." Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

Weekly Torah Portions for November

Week ending November 3, 2018

Parashat Chayei Sarah Genesis 23:1-25:18

The first words of this parashah translate as "the life of Sarah," but it begins with her death. Abraham purchases land in which to bury his wife, and then sends his servant to the village of his brother to acquire a wife for his son Isaac. The servant observes Rebekah, who offers water to him and to his camels to drink. Rebekah follows Abraham's servant back home and becomes Isaac's wife. Abraham dies at the age of 175 years, and Isaac and Ishmael bury him with Sarah in the cave of Machpelah.

Week ending November 10, 2018 Parashat Toldot Genesis 25:19-28:9

Isaac marries Rebekah, and after 20 childless years they become parents to twin boys, Esau and Jacob. The brothers are quite different from one another and are at odds with each other well into adulthood. Rebekah favors Jacob, whereas Isaac seems aligned with Esau. Rebekah and Jacob conspire to deceive Isaac into giving the blessing due his firstborn son, Esau, to Jacob. The sibling rivalry between Esau and Jacob reaches a feverish pitch, and becomes a recurring theme in Genesis.

Week ending November 17, 2018 Parashat Vayetze Genesis 28:10-32:3

Vayetze, meaning "and he went out," refers to Jacob's journey to Haran, his mother Rebekah's birthplace, to escape his brother Esau's wrath over stealing his blessing. On his journey, Jacob dreams of a ladder reaching from earth to heaven, and is given the same promise that God gave Abraham and Isaac, i.e., that he will inherit the land and be blessed. Jacob meets Rachel at the well and works for her father (his uncle Laban) for seven years in order to marry her. Jacob, who deceived his brother Esau, is himself the victim of deception. Laban substitutes Leah (his older daughter) for Rachel. Jacob must serve Laban an additional seven years in order to wed his intended spouse Rachel. Jacob eventually has a total of twelve sons and decides to return to his homeland.

Week ending November 24, 2018 Parashat Vayishlach Genesis 32:4-36:43

Jacob is now ready to return home after fleeing twenty years earlier, and realizes he will have to reconcile with his brother Esau. On the way, Jacob once again has a dream and encounters a divine messenger. After the dream, Jacob is renamed Israel, meaning "struggles with God." Our narrative leaps forward in time to the moment when Jacob's children are now adults and his daughter, Dina is raped. Two of Jacob's sons Simeon and Levi avenge the crime.





A Message from Rabbi Milgrom

Moving Toward the Heat

I've had the opportunity twice in the month of October to participate in workshops whose focus is to engage others over issues that divide us. The first workshop was sponsored by the Westchester Board of Rabbis: "Resetting the Table – Building a Culture of Dialogue on Israel, Speaking Across Differences." Israel was once the subject that unified us; it's painful that talking about Israel now often divides us. The second workshop, sponsored by the MLK Institute for Nonviolence, is "Undoing Racism" – a 3-day workshop.

As I write this, I am only in Day 1 of this workshop. So far, I gather that the workshops – created in different cultural settings and for different communities – share an essential methodology. You might not think (as I didn't) that when in dialogue with a person of a different perspective, the more important conversation may not be seeking common ground and finding what we share (Does it really matter that we both like tortilla chips?) – but rather, moving toward the heat – moving toward the serious issues that divide us.

Of course, getting to the place where we can move toward the heat will require several other essential steps: establishing safety, learning deep listening, coming to the conversation without judgment or agenda. We are being asked to be "at the growing edge" – the place at our edges where we might do the most growing, where we could stretch ourselves with new learning.


I will certainly need to cultivate and take this new learning with me to Israel – as we seek to immerse ourselves in the complicated, varied and painful stories we will undoubtedly encounter. The promise of this method is that we will reconnect to our humanity – a goal I will keep front and center – as we move toward the heat.

INTERGENERATIONAL BRILLIANCE

Wednesday: 4th, 5th, 6th Grade Tefilla/Services: (10, 11 & 12 year olds) The question was asked to the hundred or so 4th, 5th and 6th graders at Tefilla this past Wednesday; "Why does the Amidah begin with 'Blessed are you, the God of Abraham, God of Isaac, God of Jacob, God of Sarah,



But our 9, 10 and 11 year olds got it! "God is different to different people", one said. "God felt different to each of the first Jews", said another. "Even within one family, people can have different thoughts about God." They so beautifully grasped the idea that God has a different relationship with each individual and is differently experienced by each of us. And may not be experienced at all by others! God may well have been experienced quite differently by Sarah than by Abraham then by their son Isaac. Out of the mouths of babes.

Thursday's Wisdom of the Sages Class: (From 50 to 99 years old)

We were reading a 9th century Midrash asking, "What exactly did God reveal to Moses on Mt. Sinai during his 40 days up there?" Was it only 10 words, just the 10 commandments, the entire Torah (Five Books of Moses), or the whole Tanakh (the whole Jewish Bible)?"

Through the variety of wise answers offered by the members of the class, they showed us that Judaism never has had one, single, correct answer to these very basic questions. Even in the 9th century the Jewish discussion included that wide variety of possibilities of what exactly Moses received on Mt. Sinai; and who actually wrote the Bible? Such wisdom from our own Kol Ami sages!

That was just Wednesday and Thursday! What will Friday bring?



We give thanks.

A Message from our Executive Director

WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE PART OF THE JEWISH COMMUNITY?

Jewish law teaches us about our obligations as Jews. One of these sacred obligations is performing acts of love and kindness. Another is consoling the bereaved. Being part of a minyan at a funeral service, encompasses both of these. Being part of this minyan when reciting the kaddish prayer helps to ensure that the mourner is not alone, but is surrounded by community.


This past summer Rabbi Shira received an email from a woman named Ellen Marcus, who lives in Texas. Ellen explained that she found Kol Ami on the internet while searching for a Reform temple near Ferncliff Cemetery, where her Uncle Albert was currently interred in an unmarked grave. She wanted to know if Shira would officiate at her great uncle Albert's reinterment service. She also asked if Shira could gather a minyan for this service. Ellen explained to Shira that Albert Blumlein was her mother's half-uncle and was born in Nuremberg, Germany in 1876. When he was twenty, Albert stowed away on a ship to America and made his home in New York City. When the Nazis came to power in Germany in 1933, Uncle Albert sponsored Ellen's mother so that she could escape the Nazis. Ellen's mother was able to celebrate her eighteenth birthday on the ship that took her to America.

Uncle Albert never married or had children of his own; but he often visited Ellen and her family when Ellen was a little girl. Uncle Albert died when Ellen was only 5 ½ years old, and it wasn't until she was an adult, that she learned about the circumstances of Uncle Albert's death. Ellen engaged a genealogist who learned that Uncle Albert had been cremated and that his remains were buried in a pauper's grave at Ferncliff Cemetery in Hartsdale, NY. Ellen felt that Uncle Albert, who had saved her mother's life, deserved a proper funeral and burial; so, Ellen hired an attorney in New York in order to get a court order to allow her to have Albert's remains disinterred and reinterred in a proper grave in the same cemetery. Once Ellen's request was granted by the court, she searched the internet for a synagogue near Ferncliff Cemetery. Her search led her to Congregation Kol Ami, she found Shira.


I was privileged to be among an amazing group of Kol Ami members who joined Shira at Ferncliff Cemetery on October 11th to be part of this beautiful interment ceremony. Until that moment, Ellen Marcus, her husband, one of Ellen's cousins, and the attorney who assisted Ellen in her case had been strangers to us. We introduced ourselves, Ellen shared her uncle's story, and Shira led all of us in a beautiful and meaningful funeral service. Following the service, we joined together for lunch and got to know each other even more. Ellen thanked us for our kindness and generosity of spirit, and we all left that lunch with the feeling that we would see each other again.

In her Yom Kippur remarks, Co-President Susan Kohn Arovas shared that, to her community is "living and breathing" and that "we have responsibilities to our communities, and our communities have responsibilities for us. We look out for each other, we share in each other's successes and joy, and we comfort each other in times of loss and sorrow." We generally understand that within the Kol Ami community; but what about our responsibility to the broader Jewish community?

Before October 11th, Ellen Marcus was a stranger to us. I was proud that we at Kol Ami appreciate our responsibility to the larger Jewish community and that we came together to provide comfort and support to Ellen. I was honored and privileged to be part of the minyan present for Ellen when she gave her uncle a proper burial. I was humbled that at Kol Ami it is not only understood, but also practiced, that we have responsibilities to the Kol Ami community, the broader Jewish community, and the world at large.

A Message from our Religious School

Moving forward by going back...to basics.



We have all encountered times in our busy lives when we feel an unequivocal and inevitable need to hit our internal "reset" button. When we do this, it brings us back to our unburdened self – reminding us that we needn't make things so complicated; that, if we just take a step back and regroup, our goals once again will become clear.

As a new Religious School year gets underway, our teachers and staff have adopted this approach with regard to the education of your children. Taking us all back to basics seems fitting – we start everything fresh...again, only to be renewed by the wonderful familiarity of established routines and surprised by new practices we hadn't considered in the past.

This year, our Religious School staff will refresh, renew, and rediscover the basic ideas and beauty of Judaism, along with your children. Using this creative approach, I am confident we will be able to engage and excite your children with a dynamic curriculum. We will focus on the following 6 building blocks:

Hebrew: Decoding our ancient language and understanding our tefillot (prayers) to build a personal connection

Holidays: The customs and rituals, their meaning and significance in our lives, how we can personalize our experiences, and how holidays are celebrated around the world

Jewish History: Where we came from, how our history informs and enriches us, and how we carry it forward

Jewish Values: The richness or Judaism's beautiful mitzvot (commandments) that illustrate how we should treat ourselves, each other and the world around us (far beyond do's and don'ts)

Israel: Her ancient history and beauty; why she is important/relevant to us today; and the current issues she faces that make it even more important to be informed and connected (our shinshinit (gap-year Israeli ambassador), Carmel, will really bring Israel to life for us!)

Torah: As it says in Entrances to Holiness, the green siddur we use for Shabbat prayer: "And the study of Torah is equal to them all, because it leads to them all."

In addition to discussing these six basics individually, we will also explore how they all intertwine; how they work together to create the whole picture in each of us, in our Kol Ami community, and in our people.

In short, when we make things simpler, our vision becomes unencumbered thus allowing us to focus on what's most important. To me, educating your children in the beauty of Jewish basics gives them a wide and clear view of who they are and what they can learn—and practice—throughout their lives. Pam Pass





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Under a new New York State law, every employer in New York State is required to establish a sexual harassment prevention policy. Although Kol Ami has had an abuse prevention policy in place for several years, we updated our policy to comply with the requirements of the new law. At Kol Ami we are committed to ensuring a workplace that is free of discrimination or harassment of any kind. Our policy prohibits sexual harassment of both employees and volunteers. We are publishing our new policy in the Connection to ensure all congregants are made aware of our policy against sexual harassment.

Congregation Kol Ami Policy Against Sexual Harassment (Oct. 2018)

As part of its commitment to ensuring a workplace that is free of discrimination or harassment of any kind, Congregation Kol Ami ("Kol Ami") prohibits sexual harassment of any employee, Trustee, volunteer, applicant for employment, intern, contractor, subcontractor, vendor, consultant, or other person providing services in the workplace, or any employee of such contractor, subcontractor, vendor, consultant, or other person providing services in the workplace. This prohibition includes inappropriate conduct by any supervisor, employee, Trustee, volunteer, client, third-party contractor, vendor or visitor based on sex or gender. Such conduct will not be tolerated by Kol Ami. The purpose of this policy is to ensure that at Kol Ami, all individuals are provided with a work environment free from harassment based on sex or gender.

While it is not easy to define precisely what types of conduct could constitute sexual harassment, examples of prohibited behavior include unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, obscene gestures, displaying sexually graphic magazines, calendars, or posters, sending sexually explicit text messages, e-mail or voice mail and other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature, such as uninvited touching of a sexual nature or sexually-related comments. Depending upon the circumstances, the conduct can also include sexual joking, profanity, vulgar or offensive conversation or jokes, commenting about an employee's physical appearance, conversation about your own or someone else's sex life, or other conduct directed toward a person because of his or her gender that creates an unprofessional and hostile working environment. Sexual harassment also includes the threat or promise of certain benefits or job actions by a person in a position of authority in exchange for participation in or acquiescence to sexual conduct.

If you believe you have been subjected to or if you have witnessed any conduct that may violate this policy, we encourage you to immediately report the matter to your manager, the Executive Director (914-949-4717, ext. 101), or (Co-) President(s) (President @nykolami.org). Individuals who wish to make a complaint under this policy may, but are not required to, utilize the sexual harassment complaint form that can be found at the end of this document. Kol Ami will conduct a prompt, thorough, and unbiased investigation into the facts and circumstances of any sexual harassment complaint. All parties involved in the investigation will be afforded a fair opportunity to provide any information or documents they believe to be relevant to the investigation. To the extent practicable, both the identity of any individuals involved in the investigation as well as any information obtained during the investigation will be kept confidential. All employees are encouraged to cooperate with any investigation. Where appropriate, the complainant will be advised as to when an investigation has been completed, whether Kol Ami was able to determine if any policy violation(s) occurred, and whether any remedial measures have been or will be implemented.

If you are unsure with whom to raise a complaint about sexual harassment, or if you have not received a response within five business days after submitting a complaint about what you believe to be sexual harassment, please immediately contact any Officer of the Board of Trustees. A listing of the Officers of the Board of Trustees may be found at the Kol Ami website (www.nykolami.org). All supervisors and managers who receive a complaint or information about sexual harassment are required to report such information to the Executive Director or, if the Executive Director is the subject of the complaint, the (Co-) President. Any supervisory or managerial employee who knowingly allows such conduct to occur or continue will be subject to appropriate corrective action, up to and including termination. Kol Ami considers any violation of this policy to be a form of misconduct. Anybody, regardless of position or title, whom Kol Ami determines has engaged in sexual harassment of any kind in violation of this policy, will be subject to prompt, appropriate corrective action, up to and including termination.

In addition, Kol Ami will not allow any form of retaliation against individuals who report or complain about sexual harassment, who cooperate in the investigation, or who otherwise participate in any proceeding under the law. Retaliation means adverse conduct taken because an individual reported an actual or perceived violation of this policy, opposed practices prohibited by this policy, or participated in the reporting and investigation process described below. Such retaliatory conduct is a separate violation of this policy and applicable law.

Sexual harassment is a form of unlawful discrimination under Title VII of the Civil Rights Act and Section 296 of the New York Executive Law. Similar local laws might also prohibit sexual harassment in the workplace. We are firmly committed to providing all individuals with a work environment that is free of any unlawful sexual harassment. As such, anyone who wishes to make a complaint regarding sexual harassment is encouraged to utilize the internal complaint mechanism provided so that Kol Ami may investigate the matter and take appropriate remedial measures. Nonetheless, anyone who wishes to file an administrative complaint regarding perceived sexual harassment may do so by contacting the United States Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, the New York State Division of Human Rights, or, in some cases, a local human rights agency. Such individuals may also elect to pursue their claims in the New York State court system. Individuals subjected to unwelcome sexual harassment may be entitled to recover damages, ncluding reinstatement and/or monetary damages for any job loss or loss in wages incurred a result of the sexual harassment, as well as compensatory damages for emotional distress and attorneys' fees. Under certain circumstances, an individual subjected to sexual harassment may also be entitled to recover punitive damages. Under certain circumstances, sexual harassment may also be considered criminal conduct. Anyone who believes he or she has been the victim of a crime should contact his or her local police department.

Sexual Harassment Complaint Form

New York State Labor Law requires all employers to adopt a sexual harassment prevention policy that includes a complaint form to report alleged incidents of sexual harassment. If you believe that you have been subjected to sexual harassment, you are encouraged to complete this form and submit it to the Executive Director or (Co-) President(s). You will not be retaliated against for filing a complaint.
