Here, our members- of every age and with diverse backgrounds and identities- are our heartbeat.


Here, we cultivate relationships with family, friends, staff, and clergy.

Weekly Torah Portions for February

Week ending February 2, 2019 Parashat Mishpatim Exodus 21:1-24:18

The word mishpatim means "case laws." This week's parasha continues the presentation of Divine legislation (the Torah) and includes many decrees - comprising civil, criminal, and cultic regulations. The parasha ends with a covenant ceremony on Mount Sinai.

Week ending February 9, 2019

Parashat Teruma Exodus 25:1-27:19

Parashat Teruma describes the construction of the Tabernacle. God gives meticulously detailed instructions regarding the elements and design of the Tabernacle, particularly the Holy Ark. Each individual is asked to contribute towards its building materials and furnishings as he or she is motivated.

Week ending February 16, 2019

2019 Parashat T'tzaveh Exodus 27:20-30:10

The rituals surrounding the priests and sacrifices are described, and the obligations of Aaron and his sons are enumerated in Parashat T'tzaveh. This parashah has the distinction of being the only parashah in the last four books of the Torah in which the name of Moses does not appear.

Week ending February 23, 2019

Parashat Ki Tisa Exodus 30:11-34:35

Moses lingers on Mount Sinai for forty days. The people become agitated during Moses' long absence and persuade Aaron to fashion a golden calf. Upon returning with the 10 Commandments, Moses sees the Israelites cavorting around the calf and he smashes the tablets of God's law. Joined by the Levites, Moses executes a campaign to root out the offenders. Moses then pleads with God to secure divine mercy for the people. The parashah ends with a restoration of mutual faith and Moses carving a second set of tablets inscribed with Ten Commandments.





A Message from Rabbi Milgrom

HOT AND COUD

David and I have just returned from several weeks of travel to China and Vietnam. The trip started in the northeast corner of China and ended in the southern tip of Vietnam – a trip spanning 100 degrees Fahrenheit. We had chosen to go Harbin, China for its world-renowned ice and snow festival, the largest on this planet. Harbin is in Manchuria, near the border with Russia – and averages temperatures of -30 degrees Fahrenheit in the winter. Harbin is a relatively new city, barely a century old in a civilization that boasts a



many-millennia history. It was the base for the building of the trans-Siberian railroad, a project headed by a Russian engineer, born into a Jewish family. The early 1900's were a time of pogroms against Jews in Russia, and many Jewish families sought refuge in this new town – moving into the cold – and building up this pioneer town. Harbin became a center of intellect and culture, as Jews (comprising as much as 30% of the city by the mid-1920's) built hospitals, schools, synagogues, homes for the elderly, soup kitchens, businesses and homes. With the invasion of Japan in the 1930's, life became dangerous and then intolerable, and Jews left for Palestine, Europe and America. The Jewish community officially closed in 1965; the last Jew left in the 1980's.



Today, Harbin honors its Jewish past. The Old Synagogue is now a concert hall, called "The Old Synagogue Concert Hall. The synagogue building is completely preserved, and the sanctuary is intact – with pews (for concert goers), bima, (a piano now on the bima), the holy ark and a mezuzah at the entrance. Lovingly preserved. The new synagogue has been renovated into a spectacular museum honoring the history of the Jews of Harbin.



And – the old Jewish neighborhood is now the center of the elegant downtown of Harbin, a beautiful pedestrian mall, lined with gorgeous buildings. Plaques on buildings honor the past of each historic edifice, home or business – many of them of Harbin's original Jewish residents. None of this would have been possible without the present support of the Chinese government nor the financial support of the descendants of these Harbin Jewish families.

In the cold of Harbin, for David and for me, we found such warmth. Harbin provided a refuge for our people and our people reciprocated, creating in Harbin a cultural and intellectual center. And all around us, a legacy of appreciation.


The Ice and Snow Festival, by the way? AMAZING!!

A Message from Rabbi Weiner

I'm proud to offer these wonderful words written by our Secretary, Rachel Eckhaus as her D'var Torah to the Board of Trustees last month. Although the Torah Portion is from last month, her words are as timely as ever and worth sharing. Thank you, Rachel!

"This weeks portion is Va-y'chi 'And Jacob Lived'. It is the final parashah in Genesis where Jacob is 147 years old and doesn't have much longer to live. Jacob sends for Joseph to give him clear instructions about his burial. "Do not bury me in Egypt. When I am laid to rest



As he got closer to death, Jacob summoned all of his sons so he could give them each a blessing – thereby setting in motion the establishment of the 12 tribes of Israel. Jacob made sure his family knew what he wanted and what everyone's role would be after he died. These conversations were the beginning of the tradition of creating an Ethical Will. Explaining what we might want for our burial and what hopes we have for our loved ones who survive us.

We should all consider writing an Ethical Will so our families understand who we really were and what we really want. The biggest question to ask ourselves when writing an ethical will is 'what does my good death look like'? Many of us already have a 'living will' which answers the questions about immediate end of life care - extreme life saving measure or not; but does your family know if you want to donate your organs or just specific ones or not at all? Do they know what kind of burial or cremation you want? Where do you want to be interred?

Your Ethical Will should also consider some of these questions:

- Are there any values or beliefs that are particularly important to you?
- Is there a spiritual component to your life that is dear to you?
- Do you have any hopes or dreams for the generations that will follow you?
- Do you want to forgive anyone or want anyone to forgive you?
- Is there a particular event that helped shape the person you became?
- Do you have any regrets?

We are so afraid of having these conversations with ourselves let alone our families – that we might leave important things unsaid, an Ethical Will might be the vehicle to say them. I have so many friends who have been left directionless when a family member is sick or suddenly dies. What a gift it would've been for them to have some guidance from their loved one.

I am fortunate that my parents have made their wishes abundantly clear, including prepaying for their cremation services including transport home if they were to die away from home – although that would require actually leaving Chapel Hill. There are stickers on the back of all the artwork in their house with who gets what. As much as my siblings and I made fun of our parents when they did this – there's comfort in knowing that there will be very few unanswered when the time comes – and more importantly – no fighting within the family about what our parents intentions were.

Perhaps if we begin talking within our Kol Ami community about the process of creating an Ethical Will it will become a normal part of the life conversation. A regular part of everyone's portfolio of documents – the legal will, the living will and the ethical will.

I wonder if Joseph and his brothers realize how lucky they were to have heard Jacob's true final wishes before he died. How peaceful Jacob must've been knowing he was able to tell his family, in his own words, what his vision of the future of his family and thereby Judaism looked like. We should all be so fortunate. **Rachel Eckhaus**



A Message from Cantor Rosen

Reflections on the Trip of a Lifetime

As I write this article, it has been a little over three weeks since Idan and I returned from leading a High School trip of Kol Ami Teens to Israel. For those of you that attended services on January 4th, you heard firsthand the perspective of some of our participants and saw a wonderful slide show that included some of the highlights of the trip.

For those of you who have travelled to the holy land, you probably recall and reminisce about some of your first memories there. For many, myself included, it is difficult to put into words the feelings and reactions that one has when visiting the Kotel for the first time or taking your first bite of falafel in the shuk. And yet, these memories are ones that can truly last an entire lifetime, evoking a feeling of connection or belonging that is often hard to explain.

Two of the higlights for me on this trip were of a more personal nature. One of these was when we visited Idan's home town of Afula, where we met his mother and tried what I now consider to be some of the best falafel in Israel! Afula is not a tourist destination. Instead, it was a taste of Israeli life on a more authentic level. Another highlight was on one of the evenings in Tel Aviv, where we met my cousin, Jeff, who made Aliyah to Israel ten years ago. Jeff co-founded a major digital marketing firm and gave all of us a tour of his offices while giving the kids a lecture /personal story about what it was like to make Aliyah and work as a North American in Israel.

The trip included so many highlights. From the Western wall tunnels, to the City of David, to our volunteer opportunities at Yad Sarah and Leket Yisrael, to soaking in the Dead Sea. There was very little down time (aside from sleep) during our ten day voyage. For myself, there was no greater joy than watching Israel through the eyes of our teens, who were experiencing it for the first time. The sounds, the smells, the people watching, the cultural differences were all so interesting to watch through the eyes of our next generation. But perhaps the greatest thing to observe from our teens was their realization of what it means to be a Reform Jew in Israel. As Reform Jews in America, we are part of a community and living in part of the world where we are accepted and celebrated with open arms. While in Jerusalem, we visited an orthodox synagogue and a reform synagogue and found ourselves in dialogue about the hard facts about Jewish law and government or the lack of "church and state." This discussion left our teens questioning how such a Jewish place like Israel can be so intolerant and non equitable to all forms of Judaism. It made them realize that their Judaism is truly a gift and that in many ways, it is the Judaism in the diaspora that can have the most positive influence on a progressive voice for Judaism in Israel.

Finally (and I could go on), for me there is nothing better than the action of the Shuk, whether it be at Machane Yehude in Jerusalem or Carmel Market in Tel Aviv. Both markets did not disappoint and I think all of our students would agree that this was a true highlight of their time in the holy land!

I would be remiss if I did not take a moment to thank those who contributed generously to help make this trip a reality. Our teens benefited from your generous contributions and a trip like this would not be possible without your support!



A Message from our Co-President

The Progressive Paradox

- "Peace for Israel means security, and we must stand with all our might to protect its right to exist, its territorial integrity. I see Israel as one of the great outposts of democracy in the world, and a marvelous example of what can be done, how desert land can be transformed into an oasis of brotherhood and democracy. Peace for Israel means security and that security must be a reality."
- "The whole world must see that Israel must exist, and has the right to exist, and is one of the great outposts of democracy in the world."
- "Israel's right to exist as a state of [with] security is incontestable."
- "I solemnly pledge to do my utmost to uphold the fair name of the Jews -- because bigotry in any form is an affront to us all."



Among other things, Ms. Alexander, for example, attributes congressional support for Israel to the so-called Israel lobby rather than allegiance to a long-standing U.S. ally that might be attributed to a set of shared democratic and strategic values in a region long devoid of them. The column further calls for a "right of return" for Palestinians, which would threaten the very existence of Israel, and supports the BDS movement. Moreover, as a past president of the Central Conference of American Rabbis wrote to the New York Times, she "conveniently omits a single reference to decades of Palestinian terrorism, the murder of countless Jewish children, some while sleeping in their beds, the bombing of restaurants and attacks on aircraft. Nor does she mention Palestinian glorification of suicide bombers by naming streets for them and lifetime "thank you" payments to their families." I would add that she also fails to mention, among other things, the rejected peace attempts by Israel (including shortly after the 1967 War), the use of funds by Palestinians to build terror tunnels rather than schools, the withdrawal of Israel from Gaza and Egypt's treatment of its border with Gaza. In essence, Ms. Alexander purposely ignores the complexity and nuances of the Israeli-Palestinian situation painting a deliberately distorted view. And while "injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere," I struggle with why out of all the civil rights issues and injustices in this country and throughout the world did Ms. Alexander singularly cite Israeli issues in recognizing Dr. King.

I feel it is imperative that supporters of progressive causes call out anti-Semitism as quickly and decisively, and with equal vigor, that we call out racism and other forms of bigotry and hate. Calling this out does not mean you are undermining these progressive causes, it actually strengthens them. This arose in connection with the mounting accusations of anti-Semitism and anti-Israel advocacy that roiled the national Women's March movement. As Rabbi Ammiel Hirsch of the Stephen Wise Free Synagogue announced in disassociating from Women's March Inc., "We are not disassociating from the original goals of Women's March. To the contrary, we are joining other progressive organizations that have also been critical of Women's March Inc. and share the same concerns we have: that its current leadership has distorted the values and thwarted the goals articulated on that amazing January day in 2017."

So to end with one more quote from Dr. King, we should all remember that "We may have come on different ships, but we're all in the same boat now."



A Message from our Executive Director

One of the many aspects of serving as Kol Ami's Executive Director which I enjoy is the opportunity to engage in a wide range of social justice efforts encompassing an array of issues. In 2017 the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ) invited member congregations to sign a Brit Olam. This gave us an opportunity to publicly reaffirm our commitment to meaningful social just work grounded in our core Jewish values. In signing the Brit Olam, we joined a growing network of congregations working in concert to repair our world.



As a congregation, we have done an extraordinary job on social action initiatives. Two examples of how we have stood in solidarity with vulnerable populations are: our work with the Coachman Family Center and our Kol Ami Food Pantry. Many of us have come together to participate in numerous marches and lobbied at local, state, and federal levels. As a community we have also engaged in social justice work, addressing the root causes of some of the injustices we see, through advocacy initiatives in the political process.

For nearly six decades the RAC, the Religious Action Center of the URJ, has been the hub of social justice work in the Reform movement. The RAC mobilizes around federal, state, and local legislation; supports and develops congregational leaders; and organizes communities to create a world in which all people experience compassion, justice and wholeness. RAC-NY, is a statewide, locally led network of the 104 Reform Jewish communities across New York State working together to make New York a more merciful and just place. Under RAC-NY, Reform congregations across New York State are organizing powerfully and standing in solidarity with vulnerable populations and working to advance Jewish values in the public sphere.

I am proud that Congregation Kol Ami has chosen to participate in RAC-NY. On January 8th a group of Kol Ami members met with the lead organizer of RAC-NY. Subsequently, on January 13th, the same day on which we hosted the annual Interfaith Concert in honor of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., we hosted a meeting of seven Reform congregations in Westchester. This meeting was designed to build relationships with other URJ member congregations and to be educated about important issues on which we could take action. These meetings gave us an opportunity to be educated on many issues of concern - including immigration, criminal justice reform, women's reproductive rights, gun control, affordable housing, food instability, mental health, health insurance, education, LGBTQ, and the environment. We decided to narrow our focus based on three factors – 1) issues which resonate within our community and reflect our core Jewish values; 2) the opportunity to engage in a timely and impactful way; and 3) the likelihood of success based on input from New York State legislative aides. With these criteria in mind, our initial efforts will focus on bail reform, a critical criminal justice reform issue, and an immigration reform issue.

By mid-February, we anticipate having more specific information about the issues on which we will be lobbying. We plan to gather together as a community of Reform Jews from throughout New York State to meet with our legislators in Albany in late March.

When we were asked to sign the Brit Olam in 2017, we were told that "Working individually, each Reform congregation can make positive change in our world. Working together, powerfully and as a movement, we can achieve our collective vision of the world we want—one filled with wholeness, justice, mercy and compassion." If you are interested in joining us in this initiative and meeting legislators to talk about urgent issues facing us in New York State I encourage you to call me at 914 949-4717, ext. 101.

FEBRUARY IS NATIONAL INCLUSIVE EDUCATION MONTH

Congregation Kol Ami is proud of our Yad b'Yad program, which is a part of our Religious School. Created in 2007, Yad b'Yad is a one-of-a-kind academic and life skills inclusion program for teens and young adults (ages 13-21) with learning, cognitive, and emotional developmental challenges. This program provides a curriculum that increases their "social savvy," knowledge, and integration of critical life skills.

When children reach adolescence, the gap widens significantly between those with developmental challenges and their mainstream peers. A key part of our program is to have Yad b'Yad students paired with middle and high school peer mentors to bridge this gap. Whether it's over dinner, in the classroom, as a part of our Youth Group, or on trips into the community, the bonds created by this partnering are priceless. Graduates of our program are thriving with the social skills foundation they have acquired through Yad b'Yad. Many have made successful transitions to colleges, vocational programs, independent living, and jobs.

The success of our program relies on your support!

We know there are many more teens and young adults in our area who could benefit significantly from our program...

A Message from our Director of Youth Engagement

9 high school students, 2 college students, one Youth guy and a Cantor went to Israel for 10 days... No, this is not a beginning of a joke.

This is just some statistics about our amazing youth trip to Israel last December. 


