Week ending March 2, 2019 Parashat Vayak'heil Exodus 35:1-38:20

In this parashah, Moses reminds the people that God commanded them to keep Shabbat, not to do work on the seventh day and to make the day holy. The parashah continues with Moses asking the Israelites to donate materials for the building of the Mishkan (sanctuary).

Week ending March 9, 2019 Parashat P'kudei Exodus 38:21-40:38

P'kudei is the last parashah in the book of Exodus. Moses describes the specifications for the building of the Mishkan (sanctuary) for God. Every article needed, every attribute of the structure, every manner of work, and every detail for the altar is specified. As the building of the sanctuary and its holy objects are completed, Moses blesses all of the people who took part in its creation.

Week ending March 16, 2019

Parashat Vayikra Leviticus 1:1-5:26

We begin the third book of the Torah (Vayikra – Leviticus) with a description of five types of sacrifices offered in the Temple. They are: burnt offering, meal offering, sacrifice of well-being, sin offering, and guilt offering. While the burnt offering, meal offering, and sacrifice of well-being are voluntary, the sin offering and guilt offering are mandatory for guilty individuals. One remnant of these practices is the importance of our intentions when we enter into prayer.

Week ending March 23, 2019

Parashat Tzav Leviticus 6:1-8:36

Tzav, the second parashah in the book of Leviticus, continues with the regulations for sacrifices, and then outlines the ritual of priestly ordination for Aaron and his sons Limitations on the consu,ption of meat are given, and the preparation of the Tabernacle as a holy place are given.

Week ending March 30, 2019


Parashat Sh'mini Leviticus 9:1-10:20

Shemini refers to the eighth (shemini) day of the ordination ritual. The priestly ordination of Aaron and his sons is described. Two of Aaron's sons, Nadab and Abihu, offer "alien fire" to God on their own initiative and are immediately consumed by fire. Moses, Aaron, and his surviving sons are forbidden to mourn their deaths. The parasha also stipulates the dietary laws concerning which animals are fit and which are unfit for consumption; and concludes with a rationale for being holy and distinguishing between the impure and the pure.

A Message from Rabbi Milgrom

Can We Save This Marriage? Therapy session: March 30th

God said to Moses: "Bring forward your brother, Aaron, with his sons, from among the Israelites, to serve Me as priests. Next you shall instruct all who are skillful, whom I have endowed with the gift of skill, to make Aaron's vestments for consecrating him to serve Me as priest. These are the vestments they are to make: a breastpiece, an ephod, a robe, a fringed tunic (fringed with bells and pomegranates), a headdress and a sash." The ephod? "They shall make the ephod of gold, of blue, purple and crimson yarns, and of fine

twisted linen, worked into designs. It shall have two shoulder-pieces attached. Then take two lazuli (or onyx) stones and engrave on them the names of the tribes of Israel: six of their names on the one stone, and the names of the remaining six on the other stone. Attach the two stones to the shoulder pieces of the ephod — so that Aaron shall carry these names upon his two shoulder-pieces for remembrance before the Eternal. [excerpted Exodus 28: 1-12]

Two thousand years ago saw the destruction of the Second Temple – the Temple in Jerusalem. And with its destruction came the end of the priesthood. Our homes became the mikdash – the sanctuary in miniature. And the priesthood? That's us. In our homes, we are the ones who recite blessings and "officiate" at our meals and holidays. And in the synagogue – there is no one person who wears the sacred garments. Each of us (each adult) can wear a tallit and kipah. Each educated adult can lead a service, or read from the Torah.

And the breastplate and the crowns and the bells and pomegranates? They found their way to the Torah. The Torah that belongs to each of us now carries the beautiful jewelry that once adorned the High Priest, and the High Priest alone.

But what about those names? Once, it was the High Priest who literally shouldered the responsibility of carrying the names of the tribes of Israel. Who carries that responsibility today? Clearly, that is also us. We are the ones who must remember the tribes of Israel, the communities of our people, wherever they are scattered around the globe.

And now, more than ever, we also carry responsibility for our brothers and sisters

in the land of Israel. No, we don't own responsibility for the decisions of the government of Israel. We don't vote in Israel's elections and we don't pay taxes and we don't serve in the army. So what is the responsibility which is ours?

Two weeks after we returned from the Kol Ami trip to Israel, this article appeared in Haaretz: "To save their troubled marriage. Israel and American Jews should consider a trial separation." And by January, a related article in the NY Times: "American Jews and Israeli Jews are headed for a Messy Breakup." Both articles frame the "Israel issue" as one of relationship. Both articles confirm what some of us fear and worry about: our relationship is troubled. And when a relationship is troubled, whatever that relationship, we can walk away, we can pretend all is okay, we can shout and blame - or we can take responsibility. We can begin to talk openly, honestly, lovingly.

These past months have also seen unnerving evidence of the rise of anti-Semitism, and anti-Zionism on the left as well as on the right. Perhaps the stakes for saving this marriage have taken on additional urgency. It's been several months since our Israel trip, and it's taken us this long to be ready to talk about our experiences and to consider the many implications of what and how we feel. We have put together six articles (including the two that I mentioned). All of them focus on the relationship between Israel and American Jews - less on the policies, and mostly on the relationship. The articles are available on line at the Kol Ami Virtual Library; you can get a hard copy of them from the clergy office. We invite – we encourage – you to read the articles, mark them up, think about them - and then join us on Shabbat morning, March 30th. Click below to find the articles.

Our Israel travelers will moderate a conversation about them - and reflect on their experiences.

There is no High Priest to carry the names of the tribes of Israel; there is no one - but us - to shoulder that responsibility.

Please remember that in the months and years to come, no matter the news and the work we need to do to keep ourselves safe and educate our neighbors; that we let our lives be full of both the Oy and the Joy.

A Message from our Co-President

A Message from our Executive Director

Seventh grade students in our Religious School are able to choose from a variety of electives. It's been three years since I was asked to choose a topic of interest to me to offer as one of these 7th grade electives. I asked my husband, Dave, who is the "real" teacher in our family, to join me in this endeavor. (See our class photo on Page 22).

One of our shared passions is cinema, so Dave and I decided to offer an elective focusing on Jewish movies. In this, our third year, we watched: Keeping the Faith, Remember the Titans, Hidden Figures, Wonder Woman, and Black Panther. While their story lines and

characters may not be Jewish, these movies allowed us to examine Jewish practices, holidays, customs, ancient Jewish history, and more modern history. They also provided a wonderful starting point for us to discuss our involvement in the civil rights movement, social justice, social action, and Tikkun Olam – all decidedly foundations of Reform Judaism.

Keeping the Faith, features three childhood friends. One becomes a Rabbi, one a Priest, and the third, a non-Jewish woman, pursues a career in finance. Both the Priest and the Rabbi fall in love with the woman, creating unique challenges based on their respective religions. Through this movie we examined Jewish practices and holidays, discussed the differences between Jewish and Christian beliefs, considered the concepts of "faith" and "forgiveness" from a Jewish perspective, and explored interfaith relationships.

On the Sunday of the interfaith concert in memory of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. we watched the movie *Remember the Titans.* This movie, set in Virginia in the early 1960s, follows a football team forced to integrate. This movie contains powerful messages about acism, prejudice, leadership, and the core Jewish values of respect, social justice, and Tikkun Olam.

After watching *Hidden Figures*, we explored whether the movie offered a realistic look at racial tensions and sexism during the civil rights era. We also considered the character Dorothy's thought-provoking line which she uttered upon learning of her colleague Katherine's promotion, **"Any upward movement is movement** for us all. It's not just movement for me." Dorothy verbalized that one pillar of discrimination was being knocked down but that countless more remained. As a group, we read and discussed *"Why We Went: A Joint Letter* from the Rabbis arrested in St. Augustine" which they wrote in June 1964. Using the letter as a launching point, we pondered the experiences of these Rabbis, how Jewish values influenced their participation in the civil rights movement, and the broader involvement of Jews in the civil rights movement, then and now.


Wonder Woman offered us the opportunity to discuss issues surrounding women in society and the workplace, feminism, equality for women, the "#Me Too" movement, and the Jewish perspective on all of these issues. Wonder Woman wasn't able to ignore the injustices she saw, so she found ways to overcome a variety of obstacles and do what was "right" when others gave up. Wonder Woman is also a great tool to discuss Tikkun Olam. Consider these quotes from the movie:• Early in the movie Captain Steve, the male lead, said: "If you see something wrong in the world, you can do nothing or something." Steve chose to do something. • Shortly thereafter, Wonder Woman says it is her responsibility to "fight for those who cannot fight for themselves."• Later on, Wonder Woman says: "Only love can truly save the world."• Wonder Woman also says: "I fight for the world I know can be" at the end of the movie.

Dave and I chose *Black Panther* for our last class, and explored tenets of both African and Jewish cultures, including: all humans have God within them and are a reflection of God; prayer is one conduit to spiritual growth; women play an important role in our families and our culture; and the power of families and unity. These statements from the movie reflect our Jewish obligation to repair the world: •"We are strong enough to help others and protect ourselves at the same time." •"We cannot turn our back on the world...we must right the wrongs we created as it is our obligation to repair the world." The women in this movie are powerful and smart, continuing the theme of exploring strong women. They lead the military as well as conducting the research behind scientific and technological advancements. Towards the end of the movie, the black panther who served as King for only a short period of time, said "I would rather die a free man than live in bondage" when he was faced with the choice of life in prison or death. That quote is reminiscent of our own history at Masada and the Jewish stronghold against Roman invasion.

Our students impressed Dave and me with their willingness to engage in meaningful discussions and their insights. Together we all enjoyed popcorn and candy; and learned important lessons viewing these movies through a Jewish lens.

You don't have to be a student in our Religious School to have these conversations. The next time you go to the movies with family or friends think about the Jewish themes that might be reflected in the screenplay.

A Message from our Director of Youth Engagement

Dear Friends,

I am writing this from beautiful Singapore. This is my third visit to this very special place and I am here with my family visiting my in-laws and my wife's extended family. Overcoming the weather is always a challenge (it's 90 F) but once I get used to it (usually it takes about a week) I get into the Singaporean groove; which means I get to enjoy the fabulous Singaporean cuisine: Malay, Indian and Chinese food and some special local dishes I like. Going to the neighborhood's market is how I start most of my days here. It's a busy round structure, full of food venders and sitting areas where the locals (usually retirees) begin their day. Occasionally, I spot someone who sits by themselves being approached by a stranger who is asking to join the table. The friendly exchange is short and the two strangers sit and eat together. Sometimes we sit with others at a table. It's the norm here and I like it because it has something to do with this country's core value: tolerance and acceptance of the other. You see, it's a very small place (278.5 square miles). Its founding father Mr. Lee Kuan Yew instilled within its people that they have to live together, or it just won't work. It's a government policy really. As a result, for example, each public housing block has a quota of how many Chinese, Indian and Muslim families should dwell there according to their percentage in the population. By the way, public housing is good here. Specious, clean and well maintained with gardens and local community centers. Kids of all races and backgrounds go to the local kindergartens/schools and play together in the neighborhoods' playgrounds. It's the culture of tolerance. Yes, it is dictated by the state. But it works! And so I can't stop but thinking what can America learn from it. What can Israel learn from it?

Speaking of which; there is a connection here. Singapore gained independence in 1965. Because, just like Israel, it is surrounded by not so friendly countries that are much bigger, it needed immediate help in military training. Since Israel is facing ongoing similar security challenges, Singapore based its Army's structure on the IDF and got help in training from Israel. The two nations have a history of overcoming great challenges, building fantastic infrastructure quickly, being entrepreneurial and innovative and even share a common rule by the British Empire in their past.

Another strong experience I had here this time is celebrating the Chinese New Year. This was the first time my father-in-law's family gathered for the traditional meal without his mom, Nei Nei, who passed in November. The family gathering is warm and welcoming. The food is special; Hokkien dishes, Singaporean coffee (made in a sock). We all posed for a picture together. Similar pictures are hanging on the wall in the small apartment. This time the family is missing its matriarch, and has a new member, our daughter. An old picture with the great grandfather, my wife as a baby and many other family members is dominating the main wall in the living room, as well as individual pictures of the grandparents and great grandparents who are long gone. A New Year has come, a new picture will soon be added to the wall.

As part of welcoming the year we went to the columbarium to pay our respects. It's a different kind of cemetery. There are two stories with walls full of small holes for the urns of ashes to be placed. The ceremony is simple and does not require any priest or fixed prayer. Some of my wife's grandparent's favorite food is being offered together with fruits and incense. Three bows are performed by each of the 8 siblings and their families and then a quick visit to the adjacent temple to burn paper money.

I found some similarities between the Chinese mourning rituals and our tradition: there is a year of no celebration in both. The value of family at the time of mourning and thinking of loved ones who are no longer with us during major holidays are important in both cultures. I look at the family at this moment, knowing how each of the siblings has accepted a different faith, most are Christians of different denominations, the others like my father-in-law, have no particular religion at all. And yet, they all pay respect in a traditional way that is thousands of years old. Fascinating.

While here, I managed to complete a book by Adi Shwartz and Dr. Einat Wilf called The War of Return. I highly recommend this eye opening book which should be out in English soon. Dr. Wilf and Mr. Shwartz offer a new and important insight into the Israeli/Palestinian conflict, an insight that is new to me and makes me question my own understanding of the history of this ongoing challenging matter.

In other news, I hope to see many of you at our Purim Carnival; there will be food, kids activities and Rock music during our Carnival. Good times.

What Is Our Responsibility to Future Generations?

A Story from the Talmud......

One day, Choni the Circle Maker was walking along his path, when he saw a man planting a carob tree. Curious, Choni asked the man, "This tree, how long will it take for it to bear fruit?"

The man responded dutifully and honestly, "Seventy years." Choni was appalled. Seventy years? That's a really long time for a tree to grow. Why would anyone plant a tree that wasn't even going to bear fruit in his lifetime? When Choni asked the planter this question, the man responded, "My grandparents planted a carob tree so that I would be able to reap its fruit. Now I shall do the same for my grandchildren."

Choni, perplexed by the man's perspective on the future, did what anyone would do after such a confusing conversation: He sat down for a nice meal and then settled in for a quick nap. His "quick nap," however, morphed into a 70-year deep sleep. When he woke up, he saw a young man plucking fruit from a fully grown carob tree. Rubbing his eyes, he sauntered over to the man. "Hey," he said. "did you plant this tree?"

The man shook his head. "My grandfather planted it for me, knowing that 70 years later, it would be something I could cherish and use."

Choni's story not only teaches us that we have a responsibility to make the world as good a place as we can while we are alive, but also that it is our responsibility to plant carob trees: to grow them and take care of them for the generations to come. The story instills in the Jewish people the importance of having respect and compassion for the people who will be the future.
