Katharine Henderson, President of Auburn Seminary

Rev. Dr. Henderson has led innovative educational programs that infuse mainstream media with compelling faith voices on issues such as a moral economy, sex trafficking, immigration, gun violence, LGBT equality, Islamophobia, and antisemitism. She is president of Auburn Seminary, a multifaith leadership

development institute that equips leaders to build communities, bridge divides, pursue justice, and heal the world. She is writing her second book, Fighting for the Heart of America: How the Prophets of our Time are Bringing Our Nation's Future to Birth.



Tobias Cremer, PhD candidate at the Department of Politics and International Studies (POLIS) at Peterhouse, Cambridge

Tobias Cremer focuses on the relationship between religion and right-wing populism in Western Europe and North America. His work aims to understand the ways traditionally secularist right-wing populist parties are seeking to

employ Christian symbols and language as cultural identity markers. He was a McCloy Fellow at the Harvard Kennedy School and is a frequent analyst and commentator on right-wing populism and religion in British radio and newspapers.



C. Colt Anderson, Full Professor of Christian Spirituality in the Graduate School of Religion and Religious Education at Fordham University *C.* Colt Anderson has a long-standing interest in the intersection between religion and politics, between entitledity and longership, and between institu

religion and politics, between spirituality and leadership, and between institutional organizational psychology and pastoral ethics. He has been engaged in

ecumenical and interfaith dialogue and has been studying the roots of Catholic Nationalism in Europe and the United States. He served as Academic Dean in the Graduate School of Religion and Religious Education at Fordham University from 2012 to 2017.



Dr. David Elcott, Moderator

David Elcott is the Taub Professor of Practice in Public Service and Leadership at the Wagner School of Public Service at NYU, where he also co-directs the Dual Degree Program in Jewish Studies, and associate faculty at the Research Center for Leadership in Action. David's goal is to offer NYU students the opportunity

to learn the skills, tools and theories of social justice transformation. He has written A Sacred Journey: The Jewish Quest for a Perfect World and numerous articles and monographs on power and war, minority civic engagement, and cross-cultural pluralism. Part of his current research addresses how religious leaders affect civil discourse and democracy. In 2013, Dr. Elcott received NYU's Martin Luther King Faculty Award.

Dr. Josh Garroway, Assistant Professor of Early Christianity and Second Commonwealth at HUC-JIR's Skirball Campus

Dr. Garroway has been named to the Rabbi Michael Matuson Professorship for an Emerging Scholar. The VP for Academic Affairs said of him that "his excellence has already positioned him as a significant scholar of early Christianity." Rabbi

Garroway was ordained at HUC-JIR in 2003. He has published on Jewish identity in antiquity, the Historical Jesus, Paul's Epistle to the Romans and the Gospel of Mark. His current project investigates the representation of Jewish opposition in the book of Acts.





Torat Chayim–The Living Torah

For thousands of years, the 613th commandment has kept Torah-and Judaism-alive.

LEGEND HAS IT THAT EACH PERSON OF THE COMMUNITY OF ISRAEL IS A LETTER IN THE TORAH.

The Torah is made up of each of us. Our lives, our stories, our memories and our dreams are part of the unfolding of Torah, even as the Torah itself helps shape our sense of who we are and who we are destined to become. The Torah burst into Jewish consciousness thousands of years ago, changing forever the ways that people might view themselves and the expectation to be God's partners in making this world a more just and compassionate place.

Torah unfolds in us as we connect to holiness: the endless ways we see wonder, express gratitude and bless the life around us. And, we can fold ourselves into the Torah.

This year is filled with experiences of Torah—from the writing of a complete scroll of Torah (yes, you can participate!) to study and conversation about the complex legacy of sacred scripture. "With all your heart, with all your soul and with all your might." These Torah words are part of the Sh'ma that we recite daily. We will bring all of it our hearts, our talents, our hands; our minds, our music and our arts, as we venture together in the creation and celebration of the unfolding of Torah in our lives.

Julie Seltzer

Julie Seltzer is one of a small group of women Torah scribes, and became enamored with the Hebrew language when she took her first trip to Israel at the age of 18. She began to further explore the meaning of Hebrew letters and the scribal arts while working at the Isabella Freedman Jewish Retreat Center in northwest Connecticut.

Julie studied scribal arts with Jen Taylor Friedman, the first woman we know of to write a sefer Torah. During a subsequent trip to Israel. Julie studied with Shoshana

Guggenheim, the lead scribe of the Women's Torah Project (a women's collective Torah scroll), and Shoshana's teacher Dov Laimon, an Orthodox man who teaches women despite his own adherence to Orthodox Judaism's prohibition to use a scroll written by a woman.

Upon returning to the United States, Julie apprenticed with Reform scribe Neil Yerman in Westchester. Her first scroll was a Shir Hashirim—a Song of Songs scroll. Julie's first complete Torah was written while on display at the Contemporary Jewish Museum in San Francisco, where she worked as a Scribe-in-Residence.



Julie enjoys the discipline and meditative practice that being a Soferet STa"M, a scribe, provides. She says that, "Writing itself is what interested me most: how a finite number of letters can combine into an infinite number of unique sentences, and function as a means for communication between people across time and space."


